2	AN ACT TO ESTABLISH A STATE LOTTERY AFTER A BINDING
3	REFERENDUM.
4	The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:
5	Section 1. The General Statutes are amended by adding a new Chapter to
6	read:
7	" <u>CHAPTER 143C.</u>
8	<u>"STATE LOTTERY.</u>
9	<u>"ARTICLE 1.</u>
10	''GENERAL PROVISIONS AND DEFINITIONS.
11	" <u>§ 143C-101. Citation.</u>
12	This Chapter shall be known and may be cited as the State Lottery Act.
13	" <u>§ 143C-102. Purpose and intent.</u>
14	The General Assembly declares that the purpose and intent of this Chapter is to
15	provide additional monies to benefit the public purpose described in this Chapter
16	without the imposition of additional or increased taxes through the implementation of a
17	State-operated lottery.
18	" <u>§ 143C-103. Laws not affected.</u>
19	Nothing contained in this Chapter shall be construed to repeal or modify any
20	existing State law with respect to gambling, except that the State-operated lottery
21	established by this Chapter shall not be subject to those laws.
22	" <u>§ 143C-104. Prohibition on use of State funds.</u>
23	It is the intent of this Chapter that the State-operated lottery established by this
24	Chapter shall be a self-supporting revenue-raising agency of State government. No

appropriations, loans, or other transfer of State funds shall be made to the Commission 1 2 except for the appropriation for initial start-up costs of the lottery as provided by this 3 act. 4 "§ 143C-105. Public purpose to benefit from lottery. 5 The net revenues of the lottery shall be used to benefit the public purposes set forth 6 in G.S. 143C-175. It is the intent of this Chapter that the net revenues generated by the State-operated lottery established by this Chapter shall supplement rather than be used 7 8 as substitute funds for the total amount of money allocated for the public purpose. 9 "§ 143C-106. Allocation of revenues. 10 At least eighty-four percent (84%) of the total annual revenues from the sale of lottery tickets or shares, as described in this Chapter, shall be returned to the public in 11 12 the form of prizes and net revenues benefiting the public purposes set forth in G.S. 143C-175. At least fifty percent (50%) of the total annual revenues, as described in this 13 14 Chapter, shall be returned to the public in the form of prizes as described in this 15 Chapter. Unclaimed prize money, as described in this Chapter, shall revert to the benefit of the public purpose as described in this Chapter. No more than sixteen percent 16 17 (16%) of the total annual revenues as described in this Chapter shall be allocated for 18 payment of expenses of the lottery as described in this Chapter. To the extent that the expenses of the lottery are less than sixteen percent (16%) of total annual revenues, any 19 20 surplus funds shall also be allocated to the benefit of the public purpose as described in 21 this Chapter. "§ 143C-107. Definitions. 22 23 As used in this Chapter, unless the context requires otherwise: 24 'Commission' or 'Lottery Commission' means the five-member body (1)appointed by the Governor pursuant to this Chapter to oversee the lottery and the 25 26 Director. 27 (2) 'Commissioner' means one of the members of the Lottery Commission appointed by the Governor pursuant to this Chapter to oversee the State lottery. 28 29 (3) 'Director' means the Director of the State lottery appointed by the Governor 30 pursuant to this Chapter as the chief administrator of the State lottery. 'Game' or 'Lottery game' means any procedure authorized by the 31 (4) 32 Commission whereby prizes are distributed among persons who have paid, or 33 unconditionally agreed to pay, for tickets or shares that provide the opportunity to win these prizes. 34 (5) 'Lottery' or 'State lottery' means the State lottery established and operated 35 36 pursuant to this Chapter. (6) 'Lottery contractor' means a person with whom the lottery has contracted for 37 38 the purpose of providing goods and services to the State lottery. 39 (7) 'Major procurement' means a procurement for a contract for the printing of tickets for use in any lottery game, for any goods or services involving the receiving or 40 41 recording of number selections in any lottery game, or for any goods or services 42 involving the determination or generation of winners in any lottery game. 43 'Person' means any natural person or corporation, trust, association, (8)partnership, joint venture, subsidiary, or other business entity. 44

1	(9) 'Retailer' or 'Lottery retailer' means a person with whom the Lottery
2	Commission has contracted for the purpose of selling tickets or shares in lottery games
3	to the public.
4	(10) 'Vendor' or 'Lottery vendor' means any person who submits a bid, proposal,
5	or offer as part of a procurement for a contract for goods or services for the State lottery.
6	§ 143C-108 and 143C-109. Reserved for future codification purposes.
7	"ARTICLE 2.
8	"STATE LOTTERY COMMISSION.
9	" <u>§ 143C-110. Creation of Commission.</u>
10	There is created a State Lottery Commission.
11	" <u>§ 143C-111. Commission membership; appointment; vacancies; removal.</u>
12	(a) The Commission shall consist of five members appointed by the Governor
13	who shall serve at the pleasure of the Governor.
14	(b) The Commissioners shall be appointed for the following initial terms: one
15	member shall be appointed for a term of two years, one member shall be appointed for a
16	term of three years, one member shall be appointed for a term of four years, and two
17	members shall be appointed for terms of five years. All succeeding appointments shall
18	be for terms of five years.
19	(c) All initial appointments shall be made within 30 days of the effective date
20	of this Chapter.
21	(d) Vacancies shall be filled within 30 days of their occurrence by the
22	Governor for the unexpired portion of the term in which they occur.
23	" <u>§ 143C-112. Qualifications of commissioners.</u>
24	At least one of the Commissioners shall have a minimum of five years experience in
25	law enforcement, and at least one of the other Commissioners shall be a certified public
26	accountant. No person shall be appointed as a Commissioner who has been convicted
27	of a felony. No more than three members of the Commission shall be of the same
28	political party.
29	" <u>§ 143C-113. Compensation and expenses.</u>
30	Commissioners shall be compensated at the rate of one hundred dollars (\$100.00)
31	for each day engaged in Commission business. Commissioners shall be reimbursed for
32	actual expenses incurred on Commission business, including necessary travel expenses.
33	" <u>§ 143C-114. Powers and duties of the Commission.</u>
34	The Commission shall exercise all powers necessary to effectuate the purposes of
35	this Chapter.
36	" <u>§ 143C-115. Annual selection of chairman.</u>
37	The Commission shall annually select a chairman from its membership.
38	" <u>§ 143C-116. Meetings; records.</u>
39	Meetings of the Commission shall be open and public in accordance with Article 3C
40	of Chapter 143 of the General Statutes. Records of the Commission shall be open and
41	available to the public in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 132 of the General
42	Statutes. The Commission shall meet with the Director at least monthly to make
43	recommendations and set policy, to approve or reject reports of the Director, to adopt
44	rules in accordance with Chapter 150B of the General Statutes, and to transact any other

1	business that may properly be brought before it. The chairman or a majority of the
2	members of the Commission shall have the power to call special meetings of the
3	Commission upon advance written notice to all of the members of the Commission and
4	the Director.
5	" <u>§ 143C-117. Quorum; voting.</u>
6	A majority of the members of the Commission constitutes a quorum. All decisions
7	of the Commission shall be made by a majority vote.
8	" <u>§ 143C-118. Reports.</u>
9	The Commission shall make quarterly and annual reports on the operation of the
10	lottery to the Governor, Attorney General, State Treasurer, and to the General
11	Assembly. The reports shall include full and complete statements of lottery revenues,
12	prize disbursements, expenses, net revenues, and all other financial transactions
13	involving lottery funds.
14	§143C-119. Reserved for future codification purposes.
15	<u>"ARTICLE 3.</u>
16	"STATE LOTTERY DIRECTOR.
17	" <u>§ 143C-120. Appointment and removal of Director.</u>
18	The Governor shall appoint a Director within 30 days of the effective date of this
19	Chapter. The Director shall direct the operations of the State lottery. The Governor
20	may remove the Director upon notification to the Commission. The Director shall be
21	exempt from the State Personnel Act.
22	" <u>§ 143C-121. Qualifications of the Director.</u>
23	The Director shall be qualified by training and experience to direct the operations of
24	a State-operated lottery. No person shall be appointed Director who has been convicted
25	<u>of a felony.</u>
26	" <u>§ 143C-122. Salary.</u>
27	The Director shall be compensated at a salary set by the Commission. The Director
28	shall render full-time attention to the duties of the office.
29	" <u>§ 143C-123. Duties and powers of the Director.</u>
30	The Director shall, subject to the approval of the Commission, perform all duties,
31	exercise all powers, assume and discharge all responsibilities, and carry out and effect
32	all purposes provided by this Chapter. The Director shall act as the Secretary and
33	Executive Officer of the Commission. The Director shall act in accordance with this
34	Chapter, the rules adopted by the Commission, and under the guidance of the
35	Commission.
36	" <u>§ 143C-124. Power to hire.</u>
37	The Director shall hire, subject to the approval of the Commission, the professional,
38	clerical, technical and administrative personnel needed to carry out the provisions of
39	this Chapter. No person shall be employed by the lottery who has been convicted of a
40	felony. Each person employed by the lottery shall execute an authorization to allow an
41	investigation of his background.
42	"§ 143C-125. Assistant directors.
43	The Director may appoint, and prescribe the duties for, up to four assistant directors.
44	The assistant directors shall be exempt from the State Personnel Act. The compensation

1	of each assistant director shall be set by the Commission. The Director may designate
2	one of the assistant directors as the deputy director.
3	" <u>§ 143C-126. Assistant director for security.</u>
4	One of the assistant directors shall be responsible for a security division to assure the
5	security, honesty, fairness, and integrity in the operation and administration of the
6	lottery, including an examination of the background of all prospective employees,
7	lottery vendors, and lottery contractors. The assistant director for security shall be
8	qualified by training and experience including at least five years of law enforcement
9	experience and knowledge and experience in computer security. The assistant director
10	for security may, in conjunction with the Director, confer with the Attorney General or
11	his designee, to promote and ensure the security, honesty, fairness, and integrity of the
12	operation and administration of the lottery. The assistant director for security, in
13	conjunction with the Director, shall report any alleged violation of law to the
14	appropriate law enforcement authority for further investigation and action. The
15	assistant director for security shall have peace officer status in this State.
16	" <u>§ 143C-127. Criminal identification information available to lottery; peace officer</u>
17	<u>status.</u>
18	Upon the request of the assistant director for security the Attorney General and the
19	Secretary of Crime Control and Public Safety shall furnish to the Director and the
20	assistant director for security information to assure the security, honesty, fairness, and
21	integrity in the operation and administration of the lottery which they have in their
22	possession, including computerized or other information and data. For the purpose of
23	requesting and receiving this information, the State lottery shall be considered to be a
24	<u>'criminal justice agency' and its enforcement agents to be 'peace officers'</u> . State lottery
25	enforcement agents shall have the same authority with respect to service and execution
26	of arrest warrants and search warrants as is conferred on other peace officers of this
27	State.
28	" <u>§ 143C-128. Coordination with commission.</u>
29	The Director shall confer as frequently as necessary, but not less than monthly, with
30	the Commission on the operation and administration of the lottery. The Director shall
31	make available for inspection by the Commission all books, records, files, documents,
32	and other information of the lottery and shall make recommendations for the improved
33	operation and administration of the lottery.
34 25	" <u>§ 143C-129. Study of lottery systems; recommendations for improvement.</u> The Director shall make an engaging study of the energian and administration of the
35	The Director shall make an ongoing study of the operation and administration of the
36 37	lotteries that are in operation in other states and countries, of available literature on the subject of lotteries, of federal laws which may affect the operation of the lottery, and of
37 38	subject of lotteries, of federal laws which may affect the operation of the lottery, and of the reaction of the aitizane of the State to existing or proposed features in lettery games
30 39	the reaction of the citizens of the State to existing or proposed features in lottery games. The Director shall conduct this research in order to recommend improvements that will
39 40	serve the purposes of this Chapter. The Director may make recommendations to the
41 42	<u>Commission, to the Governor, and to the General Assembly on any matters concerning</u> the secure and efficient operation and administration of the lottery and the convenience
42	of the purchasers of tickets and shares.
43 44	"§ 143C-130. Accountability; books and records.
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1	The Director shall make and keep books and records that accurately and fairly
2	reflect each day's transactions, including the distribution of tickets or shares to lottery
3	game retailers, receipt of funds, prize claims, prizes paid directly by the Commission,
4	expenses, and all other financial transactions involving lottery funds necessary to permit
5	preparation of daily financial statements in conformity with generally accepted
6	accounting principles, in order to maintain daily accountability.
7	"§ 143C-131. Monthly financial reports.
8	The Director shall make a monthly financial report to the Commission, to the
9	Governor, to the State Treasurer, and to the General Assembly. The report shall include
10	a statement of all lottery revenues, prize disbursements, expenses, net revenues, and all
11	other financial transactions involving lottery funds for the preceding month.
12	" <u>§ 143C-132. Independent study of demographics of lottery players.</u>
13	After the first six months of sales of tickets or shares to the public, the Director shall
14	engage an independent firm experienced in demographic analysis to conduct a special
15	study to ascertain the demographic characteristics of the players of each lottery game,
16	including their income, age, sex, education, and frequency of participation. This report
17	shall be presented to the Commission, to the Governor, and to the General Assembly.
18	Similar studies shall be conducted on a continuing, periodic basis.
19	" <u>§ 143C-133. Independent study of effectiveness of lottery communications.</u>
20	After the first full year of sales of tickets or shares to the public, the Director shall
21	engage an independent firm experienced in the analysis of advertising, promotion,
22	public relations, and other aspects of communications to conduct a special study of the
23	effectiveness of the communications activities undertaken by the lottery and make
24	recommendations to the Commission on the future conduct and future rate of
25	expenditure for these activities. This report shall be presented to the Commission, to the
26	Governor, and to the General Assembly. Until the presentation of the report and action
27	by the Commission, the lottery shall expend as close to four percent (4%) as practical of
28	the projected sales of all tickets and shares for advertising, promotion, public relations,
29	public disclosures of odds and numbers of winners in games, and other aspects of
30	communications. Similar studies shall be conducted on a continuing, periodic basis.
31	" <u>§ 143C-134. Independent audit of lottery security.</u>
32	The Commission shall, in addition to all other security measures, engage an
33	independent firm experienced in security procedures, including computer security and
34	systems security, to conduct a continuing comprehensive study and evaluation of all
35	aspects of security in the operation of the lottery. The study shall include:
36	(1) Personnel security;
37	(2) Lottery game retailer security;
38	(3) Lottery contractor security;
39	(4) Security of manufacturing operations of lottery contractors;
40	(5) Security against ticket counterfeiting, alteration, and other means of
41	fraudulently winning; security of drawings among entries or finalists;
42	(6) Computer security;
43	(7) Data communications security;
44	(8) Database security;

1	(9) Systems security;
2	(10) Lottery premises and warehouse security;
3	(11) Security in distribution;
4	(12) Security involving validation and payment procedures;
5	(13) Security involving unclaimed prizes;
6	(14) Security aspects applicable to each particular lottery game;
7	(15) Security of drawings in games where winners are determined by drawings of
8	numbers;
9	(16) Security against locating winners in lottery games with pre-printed winning
10	tickets by persons involved in their production, storage, distribution, administration, or
11	sales; and
12	(17) Any other aspects of security applicable to any particular lottery game and
13	to the lottery and its operations.
14	The portion of the security audit report containing the overall evaluation of the lottery in
15	terms of each aspect of security shall be presented to the Commission, to the Governor,
16	and to the General Assembly. The portion of the security audit report containing
17	specific recommendations shall be confidential and shall be presented only to the
18	Director, to the assistant director for security, and to the Commission. Similar audits of
19	security shall be conducted biennially thereafter.

22	''OPERATION OF LOTTERY.
23	" <u>§ 143C-140. Initiation and operation of lottery.</u>
23 24	" <u>§ 143C-140. Initiation and operation of lottery.</u> The Commission shall initiate operation of the lottery on a continuous basis at the

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1	(b) It is the intent of this Chapter that the Commission may authorize the use
2	of any type of lottery game that has been conducted by any state government-operated
3	lottery in the United States or any other type of lottery game that will achieve the
4	revenue objectives of the lottery consistent with the public good.
5	" <u>§ 143C-142. Number and value of prizes.</u>
6	Upon the recommendation of the Director, the Commission shall adopt rules as
7	prescribed by Chapter 150B of the General Statutes that specify the number and value
8	of prizes for winning tickets or shares in each lottery game including cash prizes,
9	merchandise prizes, prizes consisting of deferred payments or annuities, and prizes of
10	tickets or shares in the same lottery game or other lottery games conducted by the
11	lottery, provided:
12	(1) In lottery games using tickets with pre-printed winners, the overall estimated
13	odds of winning prizes shall be printed on each ticket; and
14	(2) A detailed tabulation of the estimated number of prizes of each particular
15	prize denomination that are expected to be awarded in each lottery game, or the
16	estimated odds of winning these prizes, shall be available at the offices of the lottery at
17	the time that lottery game is offered for sale to the public.
18	" <u>§ 143C-143. Method of determining winners.</u>
19	(a) Upon the recommendation of the Director, the Commission shall adopt rules
20	as prescribed by Chapter 150B of the General Statutes, which specify the method for
21	determining winners in each lottery game, provided:
22	(1) No lottery game shall be based on the results of a horse or dog race;
23	and
24	(2) If a lottery game uses a drawing of winning numbers, a drawing
25	among entries, or a drawing among finalists:
26	a. <u>The drawings shall always be open to the public;</u>
27	b. <u>The drawings shall be witnessed by an independent certified</u>
28	public accountant;
29	c. <u>Any equipment used in the drawings shall be inspected by the</u>
30	independent certified public accountant and an employee of the
31	lottery both before and after the drawings; and
32	d. <u>The drawings and inspections shall be recorded on both video</u>
33	and audio tape.
34	(b) It is the intent of this Chapter that the Commission may authorize the use
35	of any of a variety of existing or future methods or technologies in determining winners.
36	" <u>§ 143C-144. Sale price of tickets and shares.</u>
37	Upon the recommendation of the Director, the Commission shall adopt rules as
38	prescribed by Chapter 150B of the General Statutes, specifying the retail sales price for
39	each ticket or share for each lottery game, provided:
40	(1) No ticket or share shall be sold for more than the retail sales price established
41	by the Commission; and (2) The minimum rateil price of each ticket, share, or transaction in any lettery.
42	(2) The minimum retail price of each ticket, share, or transaction in any lottery
43	game shall be fifty cents (50¢), except to the extent of any discounts authorized by the
44	Commission for a particular lottery game.

1	"§ 143C-145. Validation and payment of prizes.
2	Upon the recommendation of the Director, the Commission shall adopt rules as
3	prescribed by Chapter 150B of the General Statutes, to establish a system of verifying
4	the validity of tickets or shares claimed to win prizes and to effect payment of those
5	prizes, provided:
6	(1) For the convenience of the public, lottery retailers may be authorized by the
7	Commission to pay winners of up to six hundred dollars (\$600.00) after performing
8	validation procedures on their premises appropriate to the lottery game involved;
9	(2) No prize shall be paid to any person under the age of 21 years;
10	(3) No prize may be paid arising from claimed tickets or shares that are stolen,
11	counterfeit, altered, fraudulent, unissued, produced or issued in error, unreadable, not
12	received or recorded by the lottery by the applicable deadlines, lacking in captions that
13	conform and agree with the lottery play symbols as appropriate to the lottery game
14	involved, or not in compliance with any additional specific rules and regulations and
15	public or confidential validation and security tests of the lottery appropriate to the
16	particular game involved;
17	(4) No particular prize in any lottery game may be paid more than once, and in
18	the event of a binding determination that more than one claimant is entitled to a
19	particular prize, the sole remedy for these claimants is the award to each of them of an
20	equal share in the prize;
21	(5) The Commission may specify that winners of twenty-five dollars (\$25.00) or
22	less shall claim the prizes from either the same lottery game retailer who sold the
23	winning ticket or share or from the lottery itself and that the lottery game retailer who
24	sold the winning ticket or share shall be responsible for paying that prize;
25	(6) Holders of tickets or shares shall have the right to claim prizes for 180 days
26	after the drawing or the end of the lottery game or play in which the prize was won.
27	The Commission may define shorter time periods for eligibility for entry into drawings
28	involving entries or finalists. If a valid claim is not made for a prize payable directly by
29	the Commission within the applicable period, the unclaimed prize money will revert to
30	the benefit of the public purpose as described by this Chapter;
31	(7) After the expiration of the claim period for prizes for each lottery game, the
32	Commission shall make available a detailed tabulation of the total number of prizes of
33	each prize denomination that were actually claimed and paid directly by the
34	Commission;
35	(8) The right of any person to a prize shall not be assignable, except that
36	payment of any prize may be paid to the estate of a deceased prizewinner or to a person
37	designated pursuant to an appropriate judicial order. The Director, Commission, State
38	lottery, and the State shall be discharged of all liability upon payment of a prize; and
39	(9) No ticket or share in a lottery game shall be purchased by, and no prize shall
40	be paid to a member of the Commission, the Director, an assistant lottery director, or
41	employee of the lottery or to any spouse, parent, or child living in the same household
42	as a person disqualified by this provision.
43	" <u>§ 143C-146. Lottery game play rules and winner validation procedures.</u>

1	All prizes contemplated in each lottery game by its prize structure for a given level
2	of sales shall be paid to the players of the lottery game. Conversely, in order to preserve
3	the fiscal integrity of the lottery and to protect public funds, no prizes shall be paid
4	which are invalid and not contemplated by the prize structure of the lottery game
5	involved. By purchasing a ticket or share in a lottery game, a player agrees to abide by,
6	and be bound by, the lottery's game play rules developed by the Director, and approved
7	by the Commission, to apply to any particular lottery game involved. An abbreviated
8	form of the game play rules may appear on tickets in lottery games using tickets. In
9	particular a player acknowledges that the determination of whether the player is a
10	winner is subject to the game play rules and the winner validation procedures and
11	confidential validation tests established by the lottery for the particular lottery game
12	involved. The game play rules shall not be considered to be rules or regulations for the
13	purpose of Chapter 150A of the General Statutes.
14	" <u>§ 143C-147. Distribution of tickets and shares.</u>
15	Upon the recommendation of the Director, the Commission shall adopt rules as
16	prescribed by Chapter 150B of the General Statutes, specifying the manner of
17	distribution, dissemination, or sale of lottery tickets or shares to lottery game retailers or
18	directly to the public, and the incentives, if any, for any lottery employees engaged in
19	these activities. In lottery games using electronic computer terminals or devices, the
20	lottery may employ or engage persons with experience in the repair, maintenance, or
21	operation of comparable equipment. The lottery shall assure security against locating
22	winners in lottery games with pre-printed winning tickets or shares by persons involved
23	in their production, storage, distribution, administration, or sale.
24	<u>§ 143C-148 and 143C-149.</u>
25	Reserved for future codification purposes.
26	<u>"ARTICLE 5.</u> "IL OTTEDN CAME DETAILEDS
27	<u>"LOTTERY GAME RETAILERS.</u>
28	" <u>§ 143C-150. Contracting with lottery game retailers.</u>
29	<u>Upon the recommendation of the Director, the Commission shall adopt rules as</u> prescribed by Chapter 150B of the General Statutes, specifying the terms and conditions
30	· · · ·
31	for contracting with lottery game retailers to provide adequate and convenient
32	availability of tickets or shares to prospective buyers of each lottery game. The rules
33	shall not preclude the State lottery from selling tickets or shares directly to the public.
34	" <u>§ 143C-151. Selection of lottery game retailers.</u>
35	(a) The Director shall select as lottery game retailers those persons deemed best
36	able to serve the public convenience and to promote the sale of tickets or shares. No
37	natural person under 21 years shall be a lottery game retailer. In the selection of a
38	lottery game retailer the Director shall consider:

12	their premises. The Director may contract with lottery retailers on a permanent,
