A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

2 AN ACT TO REQUIRE LOCAL HEALTH DEPARTMENTS TO PROVIDE 3 WRITTEN NOTICE TO PROPERTY OWNERS UPON DENIAL OF A SEWAGE 4 SYSTEM IMPROVEMENT PERMIT, AND TO REQUIRE THAT LOCAL 5 HEALTH DEPARTMENTS NOTIFY THE COUNTY ASSESSOR WHEN A

SEWAGE SYSTEM IMPROVEMENT PERMIT HAS BEEN DENIED FOR

CERTAIN PROPERTY.

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The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:

Section 1. Chapter 130A of the General Statutes is amended by adding a new section to read:

"§ 130A-336.1. Denial of improvement permit; notice to property owner and county assessor.

- (a) If a local health department denies the issuance of an improvement permit based on field test inspection results which indicate that the inspected land is unsuitable for installation of a sanitary sewage system, the local health department shall, within 30 days of the date of inspection, provide written notification to the property owner of the inspected land indicating the reasons for denial of the improvement permit. Written notification by the local health department shall indicate that the property owner may appeal the denial of the permit to the local board of health and shall set out the procedures for appeal as provided in G.S. 130A-24.
- (b) If the property owner does not make a timely appeal of the denial of an improvement permit, or if the denial of the improvement permit is affirmed on appeal, then the local health department shall, not later than 30 days after the decision on appeal or after the time for appeal has expired, provide written notification to the county

- 2 improvement permit for a sanitary sewage system on the inspected land has been
- 3 denied, and shall state the reasons for the denial."
- 4 Sec. 2. This act shall become effective October 1, 1989.
