A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

1
2 AN ACT TO MAKE APPROPRIATIONS TO PROVIDE CAPITAL
3 IMPROVEMENTS FOR STATE DEPARTMENTS, INSTITUTIONS, AND
4 AGENCIES, EXCEPT FOR AID TO CERTAIN GOVERNMENTAL AND
5 NONGOVERNMENTAL ENTITIES.

6 The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:

8 ---TITLE/PURPOSES

9
10 Section 1. This act shall be known as the "Capital Improvement
11 Appropriations Act of 1989".

12
13 An outline of the provisions of the act follows this section. The outline
14 shows the heading "---CONTENTS/INDEX---"and it lists by general category the
15 descriptive captions for the various sections and groups of sections that make up the act.

21 ---TITLE/PURPOSES

18 Sec. 2. The appropriations made by the 1989 General Assembly for capital
19 improvements are for constructing, repairing or renovating State buildings, utilities, and
20 other capital facilities, for acquiring sites for them where necessary, and for acquiring
21 buildings and land for State government purposes.

23 PART I.—PROCEDURES FOR DISBURSEMENTS

24

25 Sec. 3. The appropriations made by the 1989 General Assembly for capital
26 improvements shall be disbursed for the purposes provided by this act. Expenditure of
27 funds shall not be made by any State department, institution or agency, until an
28 allotment has been approved by the Governor as Director of the Budget. The allotment
29 shall be approved only after full compliance with the Executive Budget Act, Article 1 of
30 Chapter 143 of the General Statutes. Prior to the award of construction contracts for
31 projects to be financed in whole or in part with self-liquidating appropriations, the
32 Director of the Budget shall approve the elements of the method of financing of those
33 projects including the source of funds, interest rate, and liquidation period. Provided,
34 however, that if the Director of the Budget approves the method of financing a project,
35 he shall report that action to the Joint Legislative Commission on Governmental
36 Operations at its next meeting.

37

38 Where direct capital improvement appropriations include the purpose of
39 furnishing fixed and movable equipment for any project, those funds for equipment
40 shall not be subject to transfer into construction accounts except as authorized by the
41 Director of the Budget. The expenditure of funds for fixed and movable equipment and
42 furnishings shall be reviewed and approved by the Director of the Budget prior to
43 commitment of funds.

44

44 Capital improvement projects authorized by the 1989 General Assembly shall
be completed, including fixed and movable equipment and furnishings, within the limits

1 of the amounts of the direct or self-liquidating appropriations provided, except as
2 otherwise provided in this act.

—COMMUNITY COLLEGE CAPITAL FUNDS/PERMANENT

Sec. 9. Funds appropriated for the 1989-90 fiscal year to the Department of Community Colleges and allocated to local institutions for capital projects shall remain available until expended and may not revert to the General Fund.

—EXPANDED FOCUSED INDUSTRIAL TRAINING PROGRAM

Sec. 10. Notwithstanding the provisions of G.S. 96-5(f), there is appropriated from the Worker Training Trust Fund to the Department of Community Colleges the sum of \$350,000 for the 1989-90 fiscal year and the sum of \$500,000 for the 1990-91 fiscal year to expand the Focused Industrial Training Program administered by the Department of Community Colleges.

The Department shall report on the use of these funds to the chairmen of the Senate and House of Representatives committees on appropriations and appropriations on education, the Joint Legislative Commission on Governmental Operations, and the Fiscal Research Division, prior to January 1, 1991.

1 —UNC EXTENSION FEES/CHARGES REVIEW

2 Sec. 11. The Board of Governors of The University of North Carolina shall
3 review its policies on fees and charges for extension courses offered at any of its
4 constituent institutions to ensure that the fees provide reasonable access to exclusive
5 degree offerings in geographic areas, that the fees are consistent with statutes providing
6 for different charges for residents and nonresidents, and that the fees do not lead to
7 unnecessary competition among colleges in the same geographic services area. The
8 Board shall report to the General Assembly by May 1, 1990, on its findings and on any
9 changes or proposed changes in its extension course fees policies.

- 36 (2) The establishment of revolving loan programs for private investment
37 in a designated downtown area;
- 38 (3) The subsidization of interest rates for these revolving loan programs;
- 39 (4) The establishment of facade incentive grants in connection with
40 private investment in a designated downtown area;
- 41 (5) Market studies, design studies, design assistance, or strategic planning
42 efforts, provided the activity can be shown to lead directly to private
43 investment in a designated downtown area;

- 1 (6) Any approved project that provides construction or rehabilitation in a
2 designated downtown area and can be shown to lead directly to private
3 investment in the designated downtown area; and
4 (7) Public improvements and public infrastructure within a designated
5 downtown area, provided these improvements are necessary to create
6 or stimulate private investment in the designated downtown area.

7 (d) Any North Carolina city affiliated with the North Carolina Main Street Center
8 Program may apply for moneys from the Main Street Financial Incentive Fund by
9 submitting an application to the Main Street Center in the Division of Community
10 Assistance, Department of Natural Resources and Community Development. Any city
11 affiliated with the North Carolina Main Street Center Program may apply for a grant
12 equal to ten percent (10%) of the projected cost of the proposed project. A city may
13 apply for additional moneys as one or more loans from the Fund. Specifically, a city
14 may apply for a loan for:

- 15 (1) Up to fifteen percent (15%) of the projected cost of the proposed
16 project in excess of the amount to be received as a grant, subject to
17 repayment within fifteen years at five percent (5%) interest;
18 (2) Up to twenty percent (20%) of the projected cost of the proposed
19 project in excess of the amount to be received as a grant, subject to
20 repayment within ten years at eight percent (8%) interest; and
21 (3) Up to thirty-five percent (35%) of the projected cost of the proposed
22 project in excess of the amount to be received as a grant, subject to
23 repayment within seven years at ten percent (10%) interest.

24 The application shall list:

- 25 (1) The proposed activities for which the moneys are to be used and the
26 projected cost of the project;
27 (2) The amount of grant moneys and any loans requested for these
28 activities;
29 (3) Projections of the dollar amount of private investment that is expected
30 to occur in the designated downtown area as a direct result of the city's
31 proposed activities;
32 (4) Whether local public dollars are required to match any grant plus any
33 loan moneys according to the provisions of subdivision (h)(2) of this
34 section, and if so, the amount of local public dollars required;
35 (5) An explanation of the nature of the private investment in the
36 designated downtown area that will result from the city's proposed
37 activities;
38 (6) Projections of the time needed to complete the city's proposed
39 activities;
40 (7) Projections of the time needed to realize the private investment that is
41 expected to result from the city's proposed activities; and
42 (8) Identification of the proposed source of funds to be used for repayment
43 of any loan obligations.

44 The applicant shall furnish additional or supplemental information upon written request.

1 (e) A committee, comprised of representatives of: the Division of
2 Community Assistance of the Department of Natural Resources and Community
3 Development, the North Carolina Main Street Program, the Local Government
4 Commission, and the League of Municipalities shall:

5 (1) Review a city's application,

6 (2) Determine whether the activities listed in the application are activities
7 that are eligible for a loan, and

8 (3) Determine which applicants are selected to receive moneys from the
9 Main Street Financial Incentive Fund.

10 A city whose application is denied may file a new or amended application.

11 (f) A Main Street City that is selected may not receive a grant plus any loans
12 pursuant to this act totaling less than one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000) or more
13 than three hundred thousand dollars (\$300,000).

14 (g) The Department of Natural Resources and Community Development may
15 not disburse moneys for any loans until the city has confirmed a method of repayment
16 of the loan. The terms for repayment established for a given loan shall apply throughout
17 the period of that loan.

18 The Department of Natural Resources and Community Development shall
19 establish an account in the amount of the grant plus any loans for each city that is
20 selected. These moneys shall be disbursed as expended through warrants drawn on the
21 Department of Natural Resources and Community Development.

22 (h)(1) A city that has been selected to receive a grant plus any loans
23 shall use the full amount of the grant plus any loans for the
24 activities that were approved pursuant to subsection (e) of this
25 section. Moneys are deemed used if the city is legally committed
26 to spend the moneys on the approved activities.

27 (2) If a city has received approval to use the grant plus any loans
28 for public improvements or public infrastructure, that city shall
29 be required to raise, before moneys for these public
30 improvements may be drawn from the city's account, local
31 public funds to match the amount of the grant plus any loans
32 from the Main Street Financial Incentive Fund on the basis of at
33 least one local public dollar (\$1.00) for every one dollar (\$1.00)
34 from the Main Street Financial Incentive Fund. This match
35 requirement applies only to those moneys received for public
36 improvements or public infrastructure and is in addition to the
37 requirement set forth in subdivision (1) of this subsection.

38 (3) A city that fails to satisfy the condition set forth in subdivision
39 (1) of this subsection shall lose any moneys that have not been
40 used within three years of being selected. These unused
41 moneys shall be credited to the Main Street Financial Incentive
42 Fund. A city that fails to satisfy the conditions set forth in
43 subdivisions (1) and (2) of this subsection may file a new
44 application.

1 (4) Any moneys repaid or credited to the Main Street Financial
2 Incentive Fund pursuant to subdivision (3) of this subsection
3 shall be available to other applicants as long as the Main Street
4 Financial Incentive Fund is in effect.

5 (i) Each city is authorized to agree to apply any available revenues of that
6 city to the repayment of a loan obligation to the extent the generation of these revenues
7 is within the power of that city to enter into covenants to take action in order to generate
8 these revenues; provided:

9 (1) The agreement to use this source of funds to make repayment or the
10 covenant to generate these revenues does not constitute a pledge of the
11 city's taxing power; and

12 (2) The repayment agreement specifically identifies the source of funds to
13 be pledged.

14 (j) After a project financed in whole or in part pursuant to this act has been
15 completed, the city shall report the actual cost of the project to the Department of
16 Natural Resources and Community Development. If the actual cost of the project
17 exceeds the projected cost upon which the grant plus any loans were based, the city may
18 submit an application to the Department of Natural Resources and Community
19 Development for a grant or loans for the difference. If the actual cost of the project is
20 less than the projected cost, the city shall arrange to pay the difference to the Main
21 Street Financial Incentive Fund according to terms set by the Department.

22 (k) Inspection of a project for which a grant plus any loans have been
23 awarded may be performed by personnel of the Department of Natural Resources and
24 Community Development. No person may be approved to perform inspections who is
25 an officer or employee of the unit of local government to which the grant plus any loans
26 were made or who is an owner, officer, employee, or agent of a contractor or
27 subcontractor engaged in the construction of any project for which the grant plus any
28 loans were made.

29 (l) The Department of Natural Resources and Community Development may
30 adopt, modify, and repeal rules establishing the procedures to be followed in the
31 administration of this act and regulations interpreting and applying the provisions of this
32 act, as provided in the Administrative Procedure Act.

33 (m) The Department of Natural Resources and Community Development and
34 cities that have been selected to receive a grant plus any loans from the Main Street
35 Financial Incentive Fund shall prepare and file on or before July 31 of each year with
36 the Joint Legislative Commission on Governmental Operations a consolidated report for
37 the preceding fiscal year concerning the allocation of grants plus any loans authorized
38 by this act.

39 The portion of the annual report prepared by the Department of Natural
40 Resources and Community Development shall set forth for the preceding fiscal year
41 itemized and total allocations from the Main Street Financial Incentive Fund for grants
42 and loans. The Department of Natural Resources and Community Development shall
43 also prepare a summary report of all allocations made from the fund for each fiscal year;

1 the total funds received and allocations made; the total amount of loan moneys repaid to
 2 the Fund, and the total unallocated funds in the Fund.

3 The portion of the report prepared by the city shall include:

- 4 (1) The total amount of private funds that were committed and the amount
 5 that were invested in the designated downtown area during the
 6 preceding fiscal year;
- 7 (2) The total amount of local public matching funds that were raised, if
 8 required by subdivision (h)(2) of this section;
- 9 (3) The total amount of grant plus any loans received from the Main Street
 10 Financial Incentive Fund during the preceding fiscal year;
- 11 (4) The total amount of loan moneys repaid to the Main Street Financial
 12 Incentive Fund during the preceding fiscal year;
- 13 (5) A description of how the grant and loan moneys and funds from
 14 private investors were used during the preceding fiscal year;
- 15 (6) Details regarding the types of private investment created or stimulated,
 16 the dates of this activity, the amount of public money involved, and
 17 any other pertinent information, including any jobs created, businesses
 18 started, and number of jobs retained due to the approved activities.

5 ---CENTER FOR COMMUNITY SELF-HELP FUNDS

6 Sec. 41. (a) Of the funds appropriated in Section 8 of this act to the Office of
7 State Budget and Management to the Center for Community Self-Help, \$2,000,000 for
8 the 1989-90 fiscal year shall be used for the purpose of furthering a revolving loan
9 program of lending, to be leveraged at a 24 to 1 ratio with other funds, for home
10 ownership for low and moderate income families in North Carolina. Loans made under
11 the program shall be conditioned on the unavailability of mortgage loans for the same
12 purposes from private lenders upon reasonably equivalent terms and conditions.

31 (a) There is created in the Department of Commerce the Industrial Development
32 Fund to provide funds to assist the local government units of the most economically

42 industrial buildings to be used for manufacturing and industrial
43 operations, or (iv) in the case of counties designated as severely
44 distressed counties under G.S. 105-130.40(c) or G.S. 105-151.17(c) or

1 units of local government within those counties, construction of or
2 improvement to new or existing water, sewer, gas, or electrical utility
3 distribution lines or equipment to serve new or proposed industrial
4 buildings to be used for manufacturing and industrial operations. To
5 be eligible for funding, the water, sewer, gas, or electrical utility lines
6 or facilities shall be located on the site of the building or, if not located
7 on the site, shall be directly related to the operation of the specific
8 manufacturing activity. However, the Secretary of Commerce may use
9 up to one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000) to provide emergency
10 economic development assistance in any county which is documented
11 to be experiencing a major economic dislocation.

12 (2) The funds shall be used by the city and county governments for
13 projects that will directly result in the creation of new jobs. The funds
14 shall be expended at a rate of one thousand two hundred dollars
15 (\$1,200) per new job created up to a maximum of two hundred fifty
16 thousand dollars (\$250,000) per project.

17 (b) Each year, on or before December 31, the Secretary of Commerce shall
18 designate the most economically distressed counties in the State; this designation shall
19 remain effective for the following calendar year. The Secretary of Commerce shall
20 determine which counties are the most economically distressed counties in the State
21 based on (i) rate of unemployment, (ii) per capita income, and (iii) relative population
22 and work force growth or lack of growth, as determined by the Secretary of Commerce.

23 (c) The Department of Commerce shall report annually to the General Assembly
24 concerning the applications made to the fund and the payments made from the fund and
25 the impact of the payments on job creation in the State. The Department of Commerce
26 shall also report quarterly to the Joint Legislative Commission on Governmental
27 Operations and the Fiscal Research Division on the use of the moneys in the fund,
28 including information regarding to whom payments were made, in what amounts, and
29 for what purposes.

30 (d) As used in this section, 'major economic dislocation' means the actual or
31 imminent loss of:

32 (1) 500 or more manufacturing jobs in the county; or

33 (2) A number of manufacturing jobs which is equal to or more than ten
34 percent (10%) of the existing manufacturing workforce in the county."

Funds which become available by gifts, excess patient receipts above those budgeted at University of North Carolina Hospitals at Chapel Hill, federal or private grants, receipts becoming a part of special funds by act of the General Assembly or any other funds available to a State department or institution may be utilized for advance planning through the working drawing phase of capital improvement projects, upon approval of the Director of the Budget. The Director of the Budget may make allocations from the Advance Planning Fund for advance planning through the working drawing phase of capital improvement projects, except that this revolving fund may not be utilized by the Board of Governors of The University of North Carolina or the State Board of Community Colleges.

—APPROPRIATIONS LIMITS/REVERSION OR LAPSE

Sec. 50. Construction of all capital improvement projects enumerated by the 1989 General Assembly shall be commenced, or self-liquidating indebtedness with respect to them shall be incurred, within 12 months following the first day of the fiscal year in which the funds are available. If construction contracts on those projects have not been awarded or self-liquidating indebtedness has not been incurred within that period, the direct appropriation for those projects shall revert to the original source, and the self-liquidating appropriation shall lapse; except that direct appropriations may be placed in a reserve fund as authorized in this act. This deadline with respect to both direct and self-liquidating appropriations may be extended up to an additional 12 months if circumstances and conditions warrant such extension.
