Technical Considerations/Comments

The proposed agency bill would authorize Superfund Activities that the Department has been involved in for several years; as well as, provide the necessary language to allow the State the ability to contract with the United States Environmental Protection Agency for site cleanups. There is no anticipated additional cost to the state.

The Superfund Program is a federal initiative which began over a decade ago to address the cleaning up of uncontrolled hazardous waste sites. North Carolina works with the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency to identify the most serious sites in the State known as National Priority List Sites. The Department of Human Resources, has had a contractual agreement with the EPA for a number of years. The contract obligates the State to perform site investigations, assessments and feasibility studies, emergency response, remedial and removal action; and enforcement activities. The Superfund Branch in the Department of Human Resources has a budget totalling almost \$1 million in federal funds, for its role in identifying potentially hazardous waste sites.

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
