2	AN ACT TO REGULATE THE PRACTICE OF DIETETICS/NUTRITION.
3	The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:
4	Section 1. The General Statutes are amended by adding a new Chapter to
5	read:

7	<b>''DIETETICS/NUTRITION.</b>
8	"§ 90D-1. Short title.
9	This Chapter shall be known as the Dietetics/Nutrition Practice Act.
10	" <u>§ 90D-2. Purpose.</u>
11	It is the purpose of this Chapter to safeguard the public health, safety and welfare
12	and to protect the public from being harmed by unqualified persons by providing for the
13	licensure and regulation of persons engaged in the practice of dietetics/nutrition and by
14	the establishment of educational standards for those persons.
15	"§ 90D-3. Definitions.
16	As used in this Chapter, unless the context otherwise requires, the term:
17	(1) 'Board' means the North Carolina Board of Dietetics/Nutrition.
18	(2) 'Dietetics/nutrition' means the integration and application of principles
19	derived from the science of nutrition, biochemistry, physiology, food,
20	management, and behavioral and social sciences to achieve and
21	maintain a healthy status. The primary function of dietetic/nutrition
22	practice is the provision of nutrition care services as herein defined.

19	After evaluation of the application and of any other evidence submitted, the Board
20	shall notify each applicant that the application and evidence submitted are satisfactory
21	and accepted, or unsatisfactory and rejected. If rejected, the notice shall state the
22	reasons for the rejection.
23	" <u>§ 90D-10. Examinations.</u>
24	Competency examinations shall be administered at least twice each year to qualified
25	applicants for licensing. The examinations may be administered by a national testing
26	service. The Board shall prescribe or develop the examinations which may include an
27	examination given by the Commission on Dietetic Registration of the American Dietetic
28	Association or any other examination approved by two-thirds vote of the entire Board.
29	"§ 90D-11. Granting license without examination.
30	The Board may grant, upon application and payment of proper fees, a license
31	without examination to a person who at the time of application holds a valid license as a
32	licensed dietitian/nutritionist issued by another state or any political territory or
33	jurisdiction acceptable to the Board if in the Board's opinion the requirements for that
34	license are substantially the same as the requirements of this Chapter.

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1	(a) A license issued by the Board is the property of the Board and must be			
2	surrendered to the Board on demand.			
3	(b) The licensee shall display the license certificate in the manner prescribed			
4	by the Board.			
5	(c) The licensee shall inform the Board of any change of the licensee's			
6	address.			
7	(d) The license shall be reissued by the Board annually upon payment of a			
8	renewal fee if the licensee is not in violation of this Chapter at the time of application			
9	for renewal and if the applicant fulfills current requirements of continuing education as			
10	established by the Board.			
11	(e) Each person licensed under this Chapter is responsible for renewing his			
12	license before the expiration date. The Board shall notify licensee of pending license			
13	expiration at least 30 days in advance thereof.			
14	(f) The Board may provide for the late renewal of a license upon the payment of			
15	a late fee in accordance with G.S. 90D-15, but no such late fee renewal may be granted			
16	more than five years after license expires.			
17	(g) Under procedures and conditions established by the Board, a licensee may			
18	request that his license be declared inactive. The licensee may apply for active status at			
19	any time and upon meeting the conditions set by the Board shall be declared in active			
20	status.

23	license, or may impose probationary conditions on a license if the licensee or applicant

26	attempting to obtain a license, or the renewal thereof;			
27	(2) Committing an act or acts of malpractice, gross negligence or

29	(3) Practicing as a licensed dietitian/nutritionist without a current license;			
30	(4) Engaging in conduct that could result in harm or injury to the public;			
31	(5) Conviction of or a plea of guilty or <b>nolo contendere</b> to any crime

33	(6) Adjudication of insanity or incompetency, until proof of recovery from			
34	the condition can be established;

38	(b) Denial, refusal to renew, suspension, revocation or imposition of

42	if the revocation has been in effect for at least one year.
