1 2	A BILL TO BE ENTITLED AN ACT TO REGULATE THE PRACTICE OF DIETETICS/NUTRITION.
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3	The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:
4	Section 1. Chapter 90 of the General Statutes is amended by adding a new
5	Article to read:

7	<b>''DIETETICS/NUTRITION.</b>
8	" <u>§ 90-350. Short title.</u>
9	This Article shall be known as the Dietetics/Nutrition Practice Act.
10	" <u>§ 90-351. Purpose.</u>
11	It is the purpose of this Article to safeguard the public health, safety and welfare and
12	to protect the public from being harmed by unqualified persons by providing for the
13	licensure and regulation of persons engaged in the practice of dietetics/nutrition and by
14	the establishment of educational standards for those persons.
15	" <u>§ 90-352. Definitions.</u>
16	As used in this Article, unless the context otherwise requires, the term:
17	(1) 'Board' means the North Carolina Board of Dietetics/Nutrition.
18	(2) 'Dietetics/nutrition' means the integration and application of principles
19	derived from the science of nutrition, biochemistry, physiology, food,
20	and management and from behavioral and social sciences to achieve
21	and maintain a healthy status. The primary function of
22	dietetic/nutrition practice is the provision of nutrition care services.

1	(a) A license issued by the Board is the property of the Board and must be
2	surrendered to the Board on demand.
3	(b) The licensee shall display the license certificate in the manner prescribed
4	by the Board.
5	(c) The licensee shall inform the Board of any change of the licensee's
6	address.
7	(d) The license shall be reissued by the Board annually upon payment of a
8 9	renewal fee if the licensee is not in violation of this Article at the time of application for renewal and if the applicant fulfills current requirements of continuing education as
10	established by the Board.
10	(e) Each person licensed under this Article is responsible for renewing his
12	license before the expiration date. The Board shall notify a licensee of pending license
12	expiration at least 30 days in advance thereof.
13	(f) The Board may provide for the late renewal of a license upon the payment of
14	a late fee, but no such late fee renewal may be granted more than five years after a
16	license expires.
17	(g) Under procedures and conditions established by the Board, a licensee may
18	request that his license be declared inactive. The licensee may apply for active status at
19	any time and upon meeting the conditions set by the Board shall be declared in active
20	status.

22	(a) The Board may deny or refuse to renew a license, may suspend or revoke a
23	license, or may impose probationary conditions on a license if the licensee or applicant
24	for licensure has engaged in any of the following conduct:
25	(1) Employment of fraud, deceit or misrepresentation in obtaining or
26	attempting to obtain a license, or the renewal of a license;
27	(2) Committing an act or acts of malpractice, gross negligence or
28	incompetence in the practice of dietetics/nutrition;
29	(3) Practicing as a licensed dietitian/nutritionist without a current license;
30	(4) Engaging in conduct that could result in harm or injury to the public;
31	(5) Conviction of or a plea of guilty or nolo contendere to any crime
32	involving moral turpitude;
33	(6) Adjudication of insanity or incompetency, until proof of recovery from
34	the condition can be established;
35	(7) Engaging in any act or practice violative of any of the provisions of
36	this Article or any rule adopted by the Board, or aiding, abetting or
37	assisting any person in such a violation.
38	(b) Denial, refusal to renew, suspension, revocation or imposition of
39	probationary conditions upon a license may be ordered by the Board after a hearing held
40	in accordance with Chapter 150B of the General Statutes and rules adopted by the
41	Board. An application may be made to the Board for reinstatement of a revoked license
42	if the revocation has been in effect for at least one year.

17		governmental duties, he or she must be licensed.

19		when that retailer furnishes nutrition information to customers on food,
20		food materials, dietary supplements and other goods sold at his retail
21		establishment in connection with the marketing and distribution of
22		those goods at his retail establishment.

25		change can be initiated without prior approval of:
