1	A BILL TO BE ENTITLED
2	AN ACT TO MODIFY THE CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS APPROPRIATIONS FOR
3	NORTH CAROLINA FOR THE 1992-93 FISCAL YEAR AND TO MAKE
4	OTHER CHANGES IN THE BUDGET OPERATION OF THE STATE.
5	The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:
6	
7	PART 1. INTRODUCTION
8	
9	Section 1. The appropriations made by the 1992 General Assembly for
10	capital improvements are for constructing, repairing, or renovating State buildings,
11	utilities, and other capital facilities, for acquiring sites for them where necessary, and for
12	acquiring buildings and land for State government purposes.
13	
14	PART 2. TITLE
15	
16	Sec. 2. This act shall be known as "The Capital Improvements
17	Appropriations Act of 1992".

- 19 PART 3. PROCEDURES FOR DISBURSEMENTS
- 20

21 Sec. 3. The appropriations made by the 1992 General Assembly for capital 22 improvements shall be disbursed for the purposes provided by this act. Expenditure of

funds shall not be made by any State department, institution, or agency, until an 1 2 allotment has been approved by the Governor as Director of the Budget. The allotment 3 shall be approved only after full compliance with the Executive Budget Act, Article 1 of 4 Chapter 143 of the General Statutes. Prior to the award of construction contracts for 5 projects to be financed in whole or in part with self-liquidating appropriations, the Director of the Budget shall approve the elements of the method of financing of those 6 7 projects including the source of funds, interest rate, and liquidation period. Provided, 8 however, that if the Director of the Budget approves the method of financing a project, 9 he shall report that action to the Joint Legislative Commission on Governmental 10 Operations at its next meeting. 11 Where direct capital improvement appropriations include the purpose of 12 furnishing fixed and movable equipment for any project, those funds for equipment 13 shall not be subject to transfer into construction accounts except as authorized by the Director of the Budget. The expenditure of funds for fixed and movable equipment and 14 15 furnishings shall be reviewed and approved by the Director of the Budget prior to 16 commitment of funds. 17 Capital improvement projects authorized by the 1992 General Assembly shall 18 be completed, including fixed and movable equipment and furnishings, within the limits 19 of the amounts of the direct or self-liquidating appropriations provided, except as 20 otherwise provided in this act. 21 22 PART 4. 3	(c) <u>The Commission shall meet upon the call of the chair.</u>
4	(d) The Secretary of Administration shall provide staff support for Commission
5	activities and travel reimbursement for Commission members.
6	(e) The Commission may recommend a schedule of uniform fees for the North
7	Carolina Aquariums to the Secretary of the Department of Administration who may
8	adopt the schedule. The schedule may be revised from time to time by the same
9	procedure.
10	(f) The North Carolina Special Aquariums Fund, hereafter 'Fund', is hereby
11	created, and shall be a special and nonreverting fund. The Fund shall be used only for
12	repair, maintenance, and educational exhibit construction at existing aquariums. The

36	SCHOOL CRITICAL NEEDS FUNDS
37	Sec. 12. The General Assembly finds that when the Commission on School
38	Facility Needs established a schedule in 1988 for making grants from the Critical
39	School Facility Needs Fund, in accordance with G.S. 115C-489.2(b), the data, although
40	lawful, that the Commission used to determine per capita income was not the most
41	current data available at the time that the Commission established the schedule. As a
42	result of discrepancies in the data, the Tyrrell County School Administrative Unit was
43	
44	ranked 57th on the schedule instead of 32nd, and the Tyrrell County School Administrative Unit has not received the grant it would have received had the most

current data been used. At the discretion of the Director of the Budget, any balances in the project reserve fund shall revert to the original source. 11

(b) Notwithstanding any modifications by this act in the amounts appropriated, except where expressly repealed or amended, the limitations and directions for the 1992-93 fiscal year in Chapters 689, 761, and 900 of the 1991 Session Laws that applied to appropriations to particular agencies or for particular purposes apply to the newly enacted appropriations and budget reductions of this act for those same particular purposes.
