8	The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:		
9	Section 1. G.S. 20-51 reads as rewritten:		
10	"§ 20-51. Exen	npt from registration.	
11	The following shall be exempt from the requirement of registration and certificate of		
12	title:		
13	(1)	Any such vehicle driven or moved upon a highway in conformance	
14		with the provisions of this Article relating to manufacturers, dealers, or	
15		nonresidents.	
16	(2)	Any such vehicle which is driven or moved upon a highway only for	
17		the purpose of crossing such highway from one property to another.	
18	(3)	Any implement of husbandry, farm tractor, road construction or	
19		maintenance machinery or other vehicle which is not self-propelled	
20		that was designed for use in work off the highway and which is	
21		operated on the highway for the purpose of going to and from such	
22		nonhighway projects.	
23	(4)	Any vehicle owned and operated by the government of the United	
24		States.	

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- (5) Farm tractors equipped with rubber tires and trailers or semitrailers when attached thereto and when used by a farmer, his tenant, agent, or employee in transporting his own farm implements, farm supplies, or farm products from place to place on the same farm, from one farm to another, from farm to market, or from market to farm. This exemption shall extend also to any tractor, implement of husbandry, and trailer or semitrailer while on any trip within a radius of 10 miles from the point of loading, provided that the vehicle does not exceed a speed of 35 miles per hour. - 14 (6) Any trailer or semitrailer attached to and drawn by a properly licensed 15 motor vehicle when used by a farmer, his tenant, agent, or employee in 16 transporting unginned cotton, peanuts, soybeans, corn, hay, tobacco, 17 silage, cucumbers, potatoes, fertilizers or chemicals purchased or 18 owned by such farmer or tenant for personal use in implementing 19 husbandry or irrigation pipes and equipment owned by such farmer or 20 tenant from place to place on the same farm, from one farm to another, 21 from farm to gin, from farm to dryer, or from farm to market, and 22 when not operated on a for-hire basis. The term 'transporting' as used 23 herein shall include the actual hauling of said products and all 24 unloaded travel in connection therewith. 25
 - (7) Those small farm trailers known generally as tobacco-handling trailers, tobacco trucks or tobacco trailers when used by a farmer, his tenant, agent or employee, when transporting or otherwise handling tobacco in connection with the pulling, tying or curing thereof.
 - (8) Any vehicle which is driven or moved upon a highway only for the purpose of crossing or traveling upon such highway from one side to the other provided the owner or lessee of the vehicle owns the fee or a leasehold in all the land along both sides of the highway at the place or crossing.
 - (9) Mopeds as defined in G.S. 20-4.01(27)d1.
- (10) Devices which are designed for towing private passenger motor
 vehicles or vehicles not exceeding 5,000 pounds gross weight. These
 devices are known generally as 'tow dollies.' A tow dolly is a twowheeled device without motive power designed for towing disabled
 motor vehicles and is drawn by a motor vehicle in the same manner as
 a trailer.
- 41 (11) Devices generally called converter gear or dollies consisting of a
 42 tongue attached to either a single or tandem axle upon which is
 43 mounted a fifth wheel and which is used to convert a semitrailer to a

3	(12)	Motorized wheelchairs or similar vehicles not exceeding 1,000 pounds
4		gross weight when used for pedestrian purposes by a handicapped
5		person with a mobility impairment as defined in G.S. 20-37.5.
6	<u>(13)</u>	Any vehicle registered in another state and operated temporarily within
7		this State by a public utility, a governmental or cooperative provider of
8		utility services, or its contractor for the purpose of restoration of utility
9		services in an emergency outage."
