1 A JOINT RESOLUTION HONORING THE WOMEN'S SOCCER PROGRAM AT  
2 THE UNIVERSITY OF NORTH CAROLINA AT CHAPEL HILL.

3       Whereas, the women's soccer program at the University of North Carolina at  
4 Chapel Hill should be recognized and commended for its outstanding record of  
5 excellence; and

6       Whereas, the UNC women's soccer program has won 11 national  
7 championships in 12 years, including 10 of 11 tries for the National Collegiate Athletic  
8 Association (NCAA) Division I Championship; and

9       Whereas, the UNC women's soccer program has won more NCAA titles than  
10 any other women's program in Division I history and has won more NCAA titles than  
11 any of the Atlantic Coast Conference schools, male and female programs combined; and

12       Whereas, in 1992, the UNC women's soccer team defeated Duke University  
13 by a score of 9-1 to gain its seventh consecutive NCAA title; and

14       Whereas, the UNC women's soccer program has set some impressive NCAA  
15 records; and

16       Whereas, during its 1992 season, the UNC women's soccer team finished  
17 with a record of 25-0, setting a national record for the most wins in a season and the  
18 most wins in a season without a loss or a tie; and

19       Whereas, the UNC women's soccer program has won 58 consecutive games  
20 and has outscored the opponents during these games by a margin of 268-25; and

21       Whereas, in 1990, the University of Connecticut beat the UNC women's  
22 soccer team, ending the team's unprecedented winning streak of 103 games and giving  
23 the team its only loss in the last seven years; and

24       Whereas, the UNC women's soccer team's home record against collegiate  
25 opponents is currently 124-0-2; and

1           Whereas, the UNC women's soccer program has produced numerous award  
2 winning players, including over 40 All-America selections, 18 of whom were first-team  
3 All Americas, and two National Players of the Year on four occasions; and

4           Whereas, after coaching the team for 14 years, Head Coach Anson Dorrance  
5 boasts a remarkable record of 275-8-9; and

6           Whereas, Head Coach Anson Dorrance, a graduate of UNC and a former  
7 member of its men's soccer team, has achieved national recognition as well, receiving  
8 honors as a player and as a coach; and

9           Whereas, it is with great pride that the General Assembly pays tribute to the  
10 UNC women's soccer program for its excellent record and outstanding achievements in  
11 collegiate athletics;

12 Now, therefore, be it resolved by the Senate, the House of Representatives concurring:

13           Section 1. The General Assembly congratulates the women's soccer team at  
14 the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill on winning its seventh consecutive  
15 NCAA Division I Championship and expresses its appreciation for UNC's outstanding  
16 women's soccer program.

17           Sec. 2. The General Assembly recognizes the accomplishments of Head  
18 Coach Anson Dorrance; assistant coach, Bill Palladino; 1992 team members, Missy  
19 Boyle, Alison Brooks, Amy Burns, Paige Coley, Dawn Crow, Shannon Davenport,  
20 Mikki Denney, Tracy Donahue, Meagan Dougherty, Jenn Eames, Danielle Egan,  
21 Shelley Finger, Nancy Friedman, Susie Green, Mia Hamm, Angela Kelly, Kristine  
22 Lilly, Kasey Monroe, Tracy Noonan, Ashley Riggs, Vanessa Rubio, Keri Sanchez, Roz  
23 Santana, Sasha Soares, Carolyn Springer, Sonja Trojak, Rita Tower, Tisha Venturini,  
24 and Jennifer Zaccagnini; administrative assistant, Chris Bischoff; and goalkeeper  
25 trainer, Mike Taylor.

26           Sec. 3. The Secretary of State shall transmit a certified copy of this resolution  
27 to Athletic Director John Swofford and to the individuals mentioned in this resolution.

28           Sec. 4. This resolution is effective upon ratification.
