A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

- 2 AN ACT TO CREATE THE WORKERS' COMPENSATION STUDY 3 COMMISSION.
- 4 The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:

5 Section 1. The Workers' Compensation Study Commission is created. The 6 Commission shall consist of 12 members: six Senators appointed by the President Pro 7 Tempore of the Senate, and six Representatives appointed by the Speaker of the House 8 of Representatives. These appointments shall be made within seven days of the 9 effective date of this act. The Commission shall conduct its first meeting within 15 days 10 of the Speaker and President Pro Tempore making the appointments.

11 Sec. 2. The President Pro Tempore of the Senate shall designate one Senator 12 as cochair and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall designate one 13 Representative as cochair.

14 Sec. 3. The Commission shall conduct a balanced and comprehensive study 15 of the current workers' compensation system in North Carolina. The Commission shall 16 consider both the current benefits to employees under the Workers' Compensation Act 17 and the cost to employers of providing these benefits. The Commission shall consider:

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- The impact on employees and employers of the amendment to G.S. 97-2(6), pursuant to Chapter 833 of the 1983 Session Laws, allowing compensation for a back injury that is a direct result of a specific traumatic incident;
- 22 (2) The impact on employees and employers of the line of cases that 23 include Whitley v. Columbia Lumber Mfg. Co. 318 N.C. 89, 348

3	(3)	The reasons for the increase in the numbers of employees in the
4		assigned risk pool and the significance of current criteria of the

6	(4)	Reasons for the rapid rise in rates for workers' compensation
7		insurance, including the medical cost component;
8	(5)	All aspects of fraud in the workers' compensation system and possible
9		methods to prevent fraud including the fraudulent obtaining of
10		benefits, the fraudulent denial of benefits, and fraud on the part of
11		health care providers;
12	(6)	Incentives for the establishment of employer safety programs
13		including a reduction in the annual premium rate for workers'
14		compensation insurance for employers with safety programs;
15	(7)	Approval by the Industrial Commission of attorneys' fees for both the
16		plaintiff's and the defendant's counsel including limitations on the
17		amount of such fees;
18	(8)	The inclusion of deductibles in workers' compensation insurance
19	(0)	policies;
20	(9)	The length of time from injury to the receipt of benefits;
21	(10)	The pooling of small employers for the purchase of workers'
22	(11)	compensation insurance;
23	(11)	The issue of physician selection; and
24	(12)	Any other workers' compensation issues the Commission determines
25	G	are worthy of its consideration.
26		4. The Commission shall submit a report of its findings and
27	recommendations to the General Assembly on or before the first day of the 1993	
28	Session of the General Assembly (1994 Regular Session) by filing the report with the	
29	President Pro Tempore of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives.	
30	Upon filing its report, the Commission shall terminate.	
31	Sec. 5. The Commission, while in the discharge of official duties, may	
32	exercise all the powers provided for under the provisions of G.S. 120-19, and G.S. 120- 10.1 through C.S. 120.10.4. The Commission may most at any time year the isint call	
33	19.1 through G.S. 120-19.4. The Commission may meet at any time upon the joint call	
34	of the cochairs. The Commission may meet in the Legislative Building or the	
35	Legislative Office Building.	
36	Sec. 6. Members of the Commission shall receive subsistence and travel $\frac{1}{2}$	
37	expenses at the rates set forth in G.S. 120-3.1.	
38	Sec. 7. The Legislative Services Commission, through the Legislative	
39	Administrative Officer, shall assign professional staff to assist in the work of the	
40	Commission. The House of Representatives' and the Senate's Supervisors of Clerks	
41	shall assign clerical staff to the Commission, upon the direction of the Legislative	
42	Services Commission. The expenses relating to clerical employees shall be borne by	
43	the Commission	

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Sec. 8. When a vacancy occurs in the membership of the Commission, the 1 2 vacancy shall be filled by the same appointing officer who made the initial appointment. 3 Sec. 9. All State departments and agencies and local governments and their 4 subdivisions shall furnish the Commission with any information in their possession or 5 available to them. 6 Sec. 10. The Commission shall use any funds, not to exceed fifteen thousand 7 dollars (\$15,000), that were appropriated to the General Assembly for the 1992-93 fiscal 8 year and that remain available for the expenses of the Workers' Compensation Study 9 Commission. There is appropriated from the General Fund to the General Assembly the 10 sum of twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000) for the 1993-94 fiscal year for the expenses of the Workers' Compensation Study Commission. 11 12 Sec. 11. This act is effective upon ratification.

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
