6	The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:	
7	Section 1. Chapter 131E of the General Statutes is amended by adding a new	
8	section to read:	
9	" <u>§ 131E-83. Rural hospital network.</u>	
10	<u>(a)</u> <u>As u</u>	sed in this section, unless otherwise specified:
11	<u>(1)</u>	'Primary care hospital' means a hospital which has been designated as
12		a primary care hospital by the Department of Human Resources. To
13		be designated as a primary care hospital, the hospital must be located
14		in a rural community, provide primary care inpatient services not
15		including inpatient surgery, and provide outpatient services which may
16		include outpatient surgery. A primary care hospital must have a
17		maximum annual average daily census of 15 patients and may have
18		distinct psychiatric and long-term care units.
19	<u>(2)</u>	'Rural hospital network' means an alliance of hospitals that includes at
20		least one primary care hospital and one other hospital that is not a
21		primary care hospital.
22		bitals desiring to form a rural hospital network shall submit a
23	comprehensive, written memorandum of understanding to the Department of Human	

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Resources for the Department's approval. The memorandum of understanding must 1 2 include provisions for patient referral and transfer, a plan for network wide emergency 3 services, and a plan for sharing patient information and services between hospital members including medical staff credentialing, risk management, quality assurance, and 4 5 peer review." 6 Sec. 2. (a) There is appropriated from the General Fund to the Department of 7 Human Resources, Office of Rural Health, the sum of four hundred fifty thousand dollars (\$450,000) for the 1993-94 fiscal year and the sum of four hundred fifty 8 9 thousand dollars (\$450,000) for the 1994-95 fiscal year for the purpose of providing 10 financial incentives to encourage health care practitioners to practice in medically underserved areas. Funds appropriated under this section shall be used as follows: 11 12 To pay first, second, and third-year generalist residents in family (1)13 medicine, internal medicine, or general pediatric medicine in a North 14 Carolina residency program not more than ten thousand dollars 15 (\$10,000) per year per resident upon agreement by the resident to 16 practice in an area designated by the Office of Rural Health as 17 medically underserved; and 18 (2)To pay students enrolled in an accredited educational program in 19 North Carolina leading to approval to practice as nurse practitioners, 20 nurse midwives, or physician assistants not more than ten thousand 21 dollars (\$10,000) per year per student, not to exceed a total of twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000) per student, upon agreement by the student 22 23 to practice in an area designated by the Office of Rural Health as 24 medically underserved. 25 (b) Repayment of the stipend is forgiven if the resident or student completes for each year's stipend one full year of service in a medically underserved area of North 26 27 Carolina. 28 (c) The Office of Rural Health shall report expenditures for this program to 29 the 1993 General Assembly, Regular Session 1994, and to the 1995 General Assembly, 30 by the end of the first week after convening. Sec. 3. Effective June 30, 1992, Section 51 of Chapter 1044 of the 1991 31 32 Session Laws, reads as rewritten: "Sec. 51. The funds appropriated in this act to the Office of Rural Health for rural 33 health recruitment shall be used to pay first, second, and third-year residents in family 34 35 medicine, internal medicine, or general pediatric medicine the sum of ten thousand 36 dollars (\$10,000) upon the resident's agreeing to practice in an area designated by the 37 Office of Rural Health as medically underserved. 38 Repayment of the stipend is forgiven if the resident completes the for each year's 39 stipend one full year of service in a medically underserved area of North Carolina. 40 The Office of Rural Health shall report expenditures for this program to the 1993 41 General Assembly by the end of the first week after convening. 42 This item shall not become a part of the continuation budget request for the 1993-95 fiscal biennium." 43

Sec. 4. There is appropriated from the General Fund to the Department of 1 2 Human Resources, Office of Rural Health, the sum of five hundred thousand dollars 3 (\$500,000) for the 1993-94 fiscal year and the sum of five hundred thousand dollars 4 (\$500,000) for the 1994-95 fiscal year to be used to provide financial incentives to primary care physicians and other primary care professionals practicing or being 5 recruited to practice in rural and underserved areas. Funds may be used to provide such 6 7 incentives as loan repayments, signing bonuses, moving expenses, practice supports, or 8 other expenses related to the practice, in order to recruit or retain a primary care 9 provider in a rural or underserved area.

10 Sec. 5. There is appropriated from the General Fund to the Department of Human Resources, Office of Rural Health, the sum of eight hundred thousand dollars 11 12 (\$800,000) for the 1993-94 fiscal year and the sum of eight hundred thousand dollars (\$800,000) for the 1994-95 fiscal year to be used to provide support for the 54 health 13 14 centers in rural and underserved areas, enabling them to increase the number of 15 uninsured persons served and to increase the number of providers of services.

16 Sec. 6. There is appropriated from the General Fund to the Department of Human Resources, Office of Rural Health, the sum of two hundred fifty thousand 17 18 dollars (\$250,000) for the 1993-94 fiscal year and two hundred fifty thousand dollars 19 (\$250,000) for the 1994-95 fiscal year to be used to establish 10 scholarships for North 20 Carolina medical students who agree to serve in rural and underserved areas. The 21 scholarships are to be awarded according to procedures established by the Office of Rural Health. 22

23 Sec. 7. There is appropriated from the General Fund to the Department of 24 Human Resources, Office of Rural Health, the sum of one hundred sixty thousand dollars (\$160,000) for the 1993-94 fiscal year and the sum of one hundred sixty 25 thousand dollars (\$160,000) for the 1994-95 fiscal year to be used to establish and 26 27 administer a Community Primary Care Grant Program to encourage community development of primary care clinics through collaborative arrangements with existing 28 29 providers. The main focus of any project provided planning grant funds shall be to meet 30 the primary care needs of the community, especially the provision of primary care 31 services at night and on weekends.

32 Sec. 8. There is appropriated from the General Fund to the Department of Environment, Health, and Natural Resources, Division of Maternal and Child Health, 33 34 for the Rural Obstetrical Care Program, the sum of four hundred thousand dollars 35 (\$400,000) for the 1993-94 fiscal year and the sum of four hundred thousand dollars (\$400,000) for the 1994-95 fiscal year to be used as follows: 36

- (1)To expand Rural Obstetrical Care Incentive Program payments to physicians and certified nurse midwives in more counties than are 39 currently served;

- To increase the amounts paid to providers; and (2)
- 41 To increase the total amount that counties may receive under the (3) 42 Program.

General surgeons who provide cesarean section backup to family physicians in counties 43 44 where there are no obstetricians or where there are no obstetricians willing or able to provide such backup are also eligible for the program. Physicians and certified nurse midwives covered under the Rural Obstetrical Care Incentive Program are required to participate in an obstetrical care coverage plan developed by their local health department or community, migrant, or rural health center, and must agree to provide services to pregnant women regardless of their ability to pay for the services. Sec. 9. There is appropriated from the General Fund to The University of North Careline December 2007 for the Area Health Education Careline December 1000

7 North Carolina, Board of Governors, for the Area Health Education Center Program, the 8 sum of two million one hundred ninety-seven thousand dollars (\$2,197,000) for the 9 1993-94 fiscal year and the sum of two million one hundred ninety-seven thousand 10 dollars (\$2,197,000) for the 1994-95 fiscal year to be used, according to Area Health Education Center Program plans, to expand programs for training primary care medical 11 12 students, residents, and other health professionals in community settings. These settings 13 include private practices, health departments, and community health services. Funds 14 may be used to develop new programs and to expand existing programs to assure well-15 supervised outreach training sites.

16 Sec. 10. This act becomes effective July 1, 1993.

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
