S 1 SENATE BILL 1021 Short Title: Home Health Area Clarification. (Public) Sponsors: Senators Cochrane, Forrester, Lucas, Cooper, Parnell, Little, and Kincaid. Referred to: Commerce May 4, 1995 A BILL TO BE ENTITLED AN ACT TO CLARIFY THAT HOME HEALTH AGENCIES ARE RESTRICTED TO SERVING PATIENTS WITHIN THEIR SERVICE AREA, TO SUNSET THIS RESTRICTION IN TWO YEARS, AND TO REQUIRE THE HEALTH PLANNING COMMISSION TO DETERMINE WHETHER TO RECOMMEND THE RESTRICTION BE CONTINUED. The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts: Section 1. Article 9 of Chapter 131E of the General Statutes is amended by inserting a new section to read: "§ 131E-180.1. Home health agency service restriction. A home health agency shall not serve patients located outside its service area. For those home health agencies for which no certificate of need was issued, the home health agency's geographic service area is only those counties in which patients were served as shown on the existing home health agency's licensure renewal form on file with the Licensure Section of the Division of Facility Services as of January 1, 1991. For those home health agencies for which a certificate of need was issued the home health agency's geographic service area is as follows: Where the service area is identified on the certificate of need issued to (1) the home health agency, the agency's geographic service area is the service area identified on the certificate of need.

2	to the home health agency, the agency's geographic service area is the
3	proposed geographic service are that is identified in the application for a
4	certificate of need and approved by the Certificate of Need Section of
5	the Division of Facility Services."
6	Sec. 2. The Health Planning Commission shall study the issue of whether to
7	recommend continuation of the restriction on home health agency service contained in
8	G.S. 131E-180.1 beyond June 30, 1997. This study shall include an evaluation of the
9	effect of this restriction on:
10	(1) The cost and quality of home health services in North Carolina;
11	(2) The ability of counties to continue to comply with G.S. 131E-137 in a
12	manner that controls costs and maintains the quality of services; and
13	(3) The maintenance of high performance standards for home health

agencies in accordance with Part C of Article 6 of Chapter 131E of the General Statutes.

The Health Planning Commission shall report the results of its study in its report to the 1997 General Assembly.

Sec. 3. This act is effective upon ratification. Section 1 expires July 1, 1997.

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
