May 15, 1996 A BILL TO BE ENTITLED AN ACT TO REVISE THE DEFINITION OF NONFLEET MOTOR VEHICLE TO ALLOW FLEXIBILITY FOR THE NUMBER OF AUTOMOBILES THAT MAY BE WRITTEN UNDER A PERSONAL AUTOMOBILE INSURANCE POLICY AS RECOMMENDED BY THE LEGISLATIVE RESEARCH COMMISSION'S COMMITTEE ON INSURANCE AND INSURANCE-RELATED ISSUES. The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts: Section 1. G.S. 58-40-10(2) reads as rewritten: 'Nonfleet' motor vehicle means a motor vehicle not eligible for classification as a fleet vehicle for the reason that the motor vehicle is: One of four or fewer motor vehicles owned or hired under a <del>a.</del> long-term contract by a policy named insured; or One of five or more private passenger motor vehicles owned or b. hired under a long-term contract: By an individual who is a policy named insured; 1. <del>2.</del> Jointly by two or more individuals who are policy named insureds and are residents in the same household; or Jointly by two or more individuals who are policy named <del>3.</del> insureds and are related by blood, marriage, or adoption.

10	Sec. 3. This act becomes effective October 1, 1996, and applies to policies
11	issued or renewed on or after that date.
