1	A BILL TO BE ENTITLED
2	AN ACT TO PROVIDE FOR THE IMPLEMENTATION OF SAFE SCHOOL PLANS
3	AND TO HOLD PRINCIPALS ACCOUNTABLE FOR THE SAFETY OF
4	SCHOOLS.
5	The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:
6	Section 1. Chapter 115C of the General Statutes is amended by adding a new
7	Article to read:
8	" <u>ARTICLE 8C.</u>
9	"Local Plans for Maintaining Safe and Orderly Schools.
10	" <u>§ 115C-105.45. Legislative findings.</u>
11	The General Assembly finds that all schools should be safe, secure, and orderly. If
12	students are to aim for academic excellence, it is imperative that there is a climate of
13	respect in every school and that every school is free of disruption, drugs, violence, and
14	weapons. All schools must have plans, policies, and procedures for dealing with
15	disorderly and disruptive behavior. All schools and school units must have effective
16	measures for assisting students who are at risk of academic failure or of engaging in
17	disruptive and disorderly behavior.

19	In order to implement this Article, the State Board of Education:

23	(<u>(1)</u>	Clear statements of the standard of behavior expected of students at
24			different grade levels and of school personnel and clear statements of
25			the consequences that will result from one or more violations of those
26			standards.
27	(<u>(2)</u>	A clear statement of the responsibility of the superintendent for
28			coordinating the adoption and the implementation of the plan,
29			evaluating principals' performance regarding school safety, monitoring
30			and evaluating the implementation of safety plans at the school-level,
31			and coordinating with local law enforcement and court officials
32			appropriate aspects of implementation of the plan. The statement of
33			responsibility shall provide appropriate disciplinary consequences that
34			may occur if the superintendent fails to carry out these responsibilities,
35			including a reprimand in the superintendent's personnel file and
36			withholding of the superintendent's salary.
37	(<u>(3)</u>	A clear statement of the responsibility of the school principal for
38			restoring, if necessary, and maintaining a safe, secure, and orderly
39			school environment and of the consequences that may occur if the
40			principal fails to meet that responsibility. The principal's duties shall
41			include exhibiting appropriate leadership for school personnel and
42			students, providing for alternative placements for students who are
43			seriously disruptive, reporting all criminal acts pursuant to G.S. 115C-

1			288(g), and providing appropriate disciplinary consequences for
2			disruptive students. The consequences to the principal that may occur
3			shall include a reprimand in the principal's personnel file, disciplinary
4			proceedings under G.S. 115C-325 for principals who hold career status,
5			and disciplinary proceedings under the principal's contract for principals
6			who are under contract.
7		(4)	Clear statements of the roles of other administrators, teachers, and other
8			school personnel in restoring, if necessary, and maintaining a safe,
9			secure, and orderly school environment.
10		<u>(5)</u>	Procedures for identifying and serving the needs of students who are at
11			risk of academic failure or of engaging in disruptive or disorderly
12			behavior.
13		(6)	Mechanisms for assessing the needs of disruptive and disorderly
14			students, providing them with services to assist them in achieving
15			academically and in modifying their behavior, and removing them from
16			the classroom when necessary.
17		(7)	Measurable objectives for improving school safety and order.
18		(8)	Measures of the effectiveness of efforts to assist students at risk of
19			academic failure or of engaging in disorderly or disruptive behavior.
20	<u>(</u>	<u>(9)</u>	Professional development clearly matched to the goals and objectives of
21			the plan.
22	<u>(</u>	(10)	A plan to work effectively with local law enforcement officials and
23			court officials to ensure that schools are safe and laws are enforced.
24	<u>(</u>	(11)	A plan to provide access to information to the school community,
25			parents, and representatives of the local community on the ongoing
26			implementation of the local plan, monitoring of the local plan, and the
27			integration of educational and other services for students into the total
28			school program.
29	9	(12)	The name and role description of the person responsible for
30			implementation of the plan.
31	9	<u>(13)</u>	Direction to school improvement teams within the local school
32			administrative unit to consider the special conditions at their schools
33			and to incorporate into their local school improvement plans the
34			appropriate components of the local plan for maintaining safe and
35			orderly schools.
36	<u>(</u>	(14)	Any other information the local board considers necessary or
37			appropriate to implement this Article.

1	(d) The local board may amend the plan as often as it considers necessary or
2	appropriate. Any changes to a plan may be submitted to the State Board of Education for
3	its review and comments."
4	Section 2. The State Board of Education shall develop a plan to reward school
5	principals for improving school safety and school climate. The Board shall report this
6	plan, along with any recommended statutory changes, to the Joint Legislative Education
7	Oversight Committee by April 15, 1998.
8	Section 3. There is appropriated from the General Fund to the State Board of
9	Education the sum of fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000) for the 1997-98 fiscal year and the
10	sum of fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000) for the 1998-99 fiscal year for the development
11	of guidelines for local safe school plans and for providing technical assistance to local
12	school administrative units, in accordance with G.S. 115C-105.46, as enacted in Section
13	1 of this act.
14	Section 4. This act becomes effective July 1, 1997. Local boards of education
15	shall begin implementation of local safe school plans developed under Section 1 of this

16 act by the beginning of the 1998-99 school year.
