1	A BILL TO BE ENTITLED
2	AN ACT TO ESTABLISH THE COMMISSION ON IMPROVING THE ACADEMIC
3	ACHIEVEMENT OF MINORITY AND AT-RISK STUDENTS.
4	Whereas, minority and at-risk students, disproportionately represent a
5	significant portion of the public school population who are not achieving academically;
6	and
7	Whereas, the lack of educational achievement is demonstrated by the poor
8	performance of minority and at-risk students as a whole on State-administered end-of-
9	grade, end-of-course, and competency tests; and
10	Whereas, the reported discipline rate for minority and at-risk students is high,
11	when compared to other students; and
12	Whereas, the dropout rate for minority and at-risk students is high; and
13	Whereas, the State Board of Education and the Department of Public
14	Instruction recognize that there is a significant problem with schools meeting the
15	education needs of minority and at-risk students; and
16	Whereas, it is acknowledged that the failure of minority and at-risk students to
17	achieve educationally is a significant factor when addressing the economic and social

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burden that is experienced by the correctional and social service agencies in North 1 2 Carolina: and 3 Whereas, the General Assembly recognizes that in order to be competitive as a 4 State in the twenty-first century, all students must achieve educational proficiency in a 5 rapidly changing, technological, educational environment; and 6 Whereas, it is in the best interest of the North Carolina citizenry that a 7 coordinated strategy be developed for implementing measures designed to yield 8 substantial improvements in the educational achievement of minority and at-risk students; 9 and 10 Whereas, a commission is required to effectively research, review, and make recommendations to improve achievement of minority and at-risk students; Now, 11 12 therefore. 13 The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts: (a) The Commission on Improving the Academic Achievement of 14 Section 1. 15 Minority And At-Risk Students is created. The Commission shall consist of 16 members, 16 as follows: 17 (1)Five Senators and three public members appointed by the President Pro 18 Tempore of the Senate; Five Representatives and three public members appointed by the 19 (2)20 Speaker of the House of Representatives; and 21 (3) Six public members appointed by the Governor, who represent groups or individuals with knowledge and experience in advocating, educating, 22 23 or assisting minority and at-risk students achieve, at least one of whom 24 is a representative of a nonprofit organization that advocates on behalf of minority and at-risk students. 25 In making appointments to the Commission, the appointing officers shall ensure that 26 27 African-American members have significant representation on the Commission. (b) Initial appointments to the Commission shall be made before September 28 29 15, 1997. The first meeting of the Commission shall be held no later than October 13, 1997. 30 31 Section 2. The President Pro Tempore of the Senate shall designate one 32 Senator as cochair and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall designate one 33 Representative as cochair. 34 Section 3. The Commission shall be authorized to: 35 (1) Gather accurate and reliable data and research information pertaining to 36 the status of minority and at-risk students in the North Carolina public education system; 37 38 (2)Identify and visit education programs and other efforts within and 39 outside North Carolina that appear to be successful yielding significant positive results for minority and at-risk students; 40 Consult with higher education faculty members and other persons who 41 (3) 42 have been engaged in extensive research and observation related to

3	(4)	Conduct hearings throughout the State for the purpose of obtaining	
4		meaningful information regarding successful education programs and	
5		efforts related to these concerns;	
6	(5)	Identify, consult, and meet with representatives of national, regional,	
7		and State-level organizations and agencies that could be particularly	
8		helpful in addressing these concerns;	
9	(6)	Devise recommendations as to steps that should be taken to address	
10	(0)	these concerns – steps to be taken separately and collectively by:	
11		a. State government;	
12		b. Local government;	
13		c. Public schools and higher education institutions;	
14		d. Nonprofit organizations, including community-based	
15		organizations, with a particular emphasis on those with direct ties	
16		to families of these children and youth;	
17		e. Foundations;	
18		f. Religious institutes;	
19		g. Civic organizations;	
20		h. Business and industry; and	
20 21		i. Other entities; and	
21	(7)	Determine the extent and categories of fiscal and human resources	
22	(\prime)	needed to address the identified concerns.	
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	Section 4. In the study, particular emphasis should be placed on programs and efforts that have been successful in imparting:		
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26	(1)	Improved educational achievement;	
27	(2)	Reduction of school discipline and behavioral problems;	
28	(3)	Reduction of minority and at-risk student dropout rates; and	
29	(4)	Improved relations between parents, schools, and students.	
30		on 5. The Commission shall make an interim report of its findings and	
31		ns to the President Pro Tempore of the Senate and the Speaker of the	
32	House of Representatives on or before the first day of the 1998 Regular Session of the		
33		ssembly. The Commission shall submit a final report of its findings and	
34	recommendations to the General Assembly on or before the first day of the 1999 Session		
35	by filing the report with the President Pro Tempore of the Senate and the Speaker of the		
36	House of Representatives. Upon filing its final report, the Commission shall terminate.		
37	Section 6. The Commission, while in the discharge of official duties, may		
38	exercise all the powers provided under the provisions of G.S. 120-19, and G.S. 120-19.1

The Commission may contract for professional, clerical, or 1 Section 8. 2 consultant services as provided by G.S. 120-32.02. The Legislative Administrative 3 Officer shall assign professional staff to assist in the work of the Commission. The 4 House of Representatives' and the Senate's Supervisors of Clerks shall assign clerical 5 staff to the Commission, upon the direction of the Legislative Services Commission. The 6 expenses relating to the employees shall be borne by the Commission.

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Section 9. When a vacancy occurs in the membership of the Commission, the vacancy shall be filled by the same appointing officer who made the initial appointment.

9 Section 10. All State departments and agencies and local governments and 10 their subdivisions shall furnish the Commission with information in their possession or available to them. 11

12 Section 11. There is appropriated from the General Fund to the General Assembly the sum of one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000) for the 1997-98 fiscal 13 14 year and the sum of one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000) for the 1998-99 fiscal year 15 for the expenses of the Commission.

16 Section 12. This act becomes effective July 1, 1997.
