A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

AN ACT TO BE KNOWN AS THE NORTH CAROLINA UNIFORM PRUDENT INVESTOR ACT, AS RECOMMENDED BY THE GENERAL STATUTES COMMISSION.

The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:

Section 1. Chapter 36A of the General Statutes is amended by adding a new Article to read:

“ARTICLE 15.

“UNIFORM PRUDENT INVESTOR ACT.

“§ 36A-161. Prudent investor rule; applicability.

(a) Except as otherwise provided in subsection (b) of this section, a trustee who invests and manages trust assets owes a duty to the beneficiaries of the trust to comply with the prudent investor rule set forth in this Article.

(b) The prudent investor rule, a default rule, may be expanded, restricted, eliminated, or otherwise altered by the provisions of a trust which govern or direct investments in a manner inconsistent with this Article. A trustee is not liable to a beneficiary to the extent that the trustee acted in reasonable reliance on the provisions of the trust.

(c) This Article applies to express trusts, including charitable, inter vivos, and testamentary trusts, and trustees of those trusts. The following terms or comparable

1 language in the provisions of a trust, unless otherwise limited or modified, authorizes any
2 investment or strategy permitted under this Article: 'investments in accordance with
3 Article 15 of Chapter 36A,' 'investments permissible by law for investment of trust
4 funds,' 'legal investments,' 'authorized investments,' 'using the judgment and care under
5 the circumstances then prevailing that persons of prudence, discretion, and intelligence
6 exercise in the management of their own affairs, not in regard to speculation but in regard
7 to the permanent disposition of their funds, considering the probable income as well as
8 the probable safety of their capital,' 'prudent man rule,' 'prudent trustee rule,' 'prudent
9 person rule,' and 'prudent investor rule.'

10 This Article also applies where a trust contains no investment standard. A reference
11 to 'Chapter 36A' in a trust instrument governing a trust executed prior to the effective
12 date of this Article shall be construed to be a reference to this Article.

13 (d) Unless the provisions of the trust provide otherwise by specific reference to
14 this Article, this Article does not apply to:

15 (1) Trusts under any federal employee retirement income security statute or
16 other retirement or pension trusts;

17 (2) Trusts which are created by legislative act and trusts which are created
18 by or pursuant to premarital or postmarital agreements, divorce
19 settlements, settlements of other proceedings or disputes;

20 (3) Transfers under the Uniform Transfers to Minors Act;

21 (4) Transfers under the Uniform Custodial Trust Act; or

22 (5) Honorary trusts, trusts for pets, and cemetery trusts.

23 For the purposes of this Article, the term 'trust' excludes constructive trusts, resulting
24 trusts, guardianships, conservatorships, personal representatives, trust accounts as defined
25 in G.S. 53-146.2, 54-109.57, and 54B-130, business trusts providing for certificates to be
26 issued to beneficiaries, common trust funds, voting trusts, security arrangements,
27 liquidation trusts, and trusts for the primary purpose of paying debts, dividends, interests,
28 salaries, wages, profits, pensions or employee benefits of any kind, and any arrangement
29 under which a person is nominee or escrowee for another.

30 **"§ 36A-162. Standard of care; portfolio strategy; risk and return objectives.**

31 (a) A trustee shall invest and manage trust assets as a prudent investor would by
32 considering the purposes, terms, distribution requirements, and other circumstances of the
33 trust. In satisfying this standard, the trustee shall exercise reasonable care, skill, and
34 caution.

35 (b) A trustee's investment and management decisions respecting individual assets
36 must be evaluated not in isolation but in the context of the trust portfolio as a whole and
37 as a part of an overall investment strategy having risk and return objectives reasonably
38 suited to the trust.

39 (c) Among circumstances that a trustee shall consider in investing and managing
40 trust assets are any of the following as are relevant to the trust or its beneficiaries:

41 (1) General economic conditions;

42 (2) The possible effect of inflation or deflation;

43 (3) The expected tax consequences of investment decisions or strategies;

1 (4) The role that each investment or course of action plays within the
2 overall trust portfolio, which may include financial assets, interests in
3 closely held enterprises, tangible and intangible personal property, and
4 real property;

5 (5) The expected total return from income and the appreciation of capital;

6 (6) Other resources of the beneficiaries known to the trustee;

7 (7) Needs for liquidity, regularity of income, and preservation or
8 appreciation of capital; and

9 (8) An asset's special relationship or special value, if any, to the purposes of
10 the trust or to one or more of the beneficiaries.

11 (d) A trustee shall make a reasonable effort to verify facts relevant to the
12 investment and management of trust assets.

13 (e) A trustee may invest in any kind of property or type of investment consistent
14 with the standards of this Article.

15 (f) A trustee who has special skills or expertise, or is named trustee in reliance
16 upon the trustee's representation that the trustee has special skills or expertise, has a duty
17 to use those special skills or expertise.

18 **"§ 36A-163. Diversification.**

19 A trustee shall diversify the investments of the trust unless the trustee reasonably
20 determines that, because of special circumstances, the purposes of the trust are better
21 served without diversifying.

22 **"§ 36A-164. Duties at inception of trusteeship.**

23 Within a reasonable time after accepting a trusteeship or receiving trust assets, a
24 trustee shall review the trust assets and make and implement decisions concerning the
25 retention and disposition of assets in order to bring the trust portfolio into compliance
26 with the purposes, terms, distribution requirements, and other circumstances of the trust,
27 and with the requirements of this Article.

28 **"§ 36A-165. Loyalty.**

29 A trustee shall invest and manage the trust assets solely in the interest of the
30 beneficiaries.

31 **"§ 36A-166. Impartiality.**

32 If a trust has two or more beneficiaries, the trustee shall act impartially in investing
33 and managing the trust assets, taking into account any differing interests of the
34 beneficiaries.

35 **"§ 36A-167. Investment costs.**

36 In investing and managing trust assets, a trustee may only incur costs that are
37 appropriate and reasonable in relation to the assets, the purposes of the trust, and the
38 skills of the trustee.

39 **"§ 36A-168. Reviewing compliance.**

40 Compliance with the prudent investor rule is determined in light of the facts and
41 circumstances existing at the time of a trustee's decision or action and not by hindsight.

42 **"§ 36A-169. Delegation of investment and management functions.**

1 (a) A trustee may delegate investment and management functions if it is prudent to
2 do so under the circumstances. The trustee shall exercise reasonable care, skill, and
3 caution in:

4 (1) Selecting an agent;

5 (2) Establishing the scope and terms of any delegation, consistent with the
6 purposes and terms of the trust; and

7 (3) Periodically reviewing the agent's actions in order to monitor the agent's
8 performance and compliance with the terms of the delegation.

9 (b) In performing a delegated function, an agent owes a duty to the trust to
10 exercise reasonable care to comply with the terms of the delegation.

11 (c) A trustee who complies with the requirements of subsection (a) of this section
12 is not liable to the beneficiaries or to the trust for the decisions or actions of the agent to
13 whom the function was delegated.

14 (d) By accepting the delegation of a trust function from the trustee of a trust that is
15 subject to the law of this State, an agent submits to the jurisdiction of the courts of this
16 State.

17 **"§ 36A-170. Effect on charitable remainder trusts.**

18 Nothing in this Article shall prevent the application of Article 4A of this Chapter to
19 'charitable remainder trusts' as defined in G.S. 36A-59.3(1).

20 **"§ 36A-171. Application to existing trusts.**

21 This Article applies to trusts existing on and created after its effective date. As
22 applied to trusts existing on its effective date, this Article governs only actions or
23 omissions occurring after that date.

24 **"§ 36A-172. Short title.**

25 This Article may be cited as the 'North Carolina Uniform Prudent Investor Act.'

26 **"§ 36A-173. Severability.**

27 If any provision of this Article or its application to any person or circumstance is held
28 invalid, the invalidity does not affect other provisions or applications of this Article
29 which can be given effect without the invalid provision or application, and to this end the
30 provisions of this Article are severable."

31 Section 2. G.S. 36A-2 reads as rewritten:

32 **"§ 36A-2. Investment; prudent ~~man~~-person rule.**

33 (a) In acquiring, investing, reinvesting, exchanging, retaining, selling, and
34 managing property for the benefit of another, a fiduciary shall observe the standard of
35 judgment and care under the circumstances then prevailing, which an ordinarily prudent
36 ~~man~~-person of discretion and intelligence, who is a fiduciary of the property of others,
37 would observe as such fiduciary; and if the fiduciary has special skills or is named a
38 fiduciary on the basis of representations of special skills or expertise, ~~he~~-the fiduciary is
39 under a duty to use those skills. This subsection and subsection (b) of this section do not
40 apply to trusts governed by Article 15 of this Chapter.

41 (b) Within the limitations of the foregoing standard, a fiduciary is authorized to
42 acquire and retain every kind of property and every kind of investment, including
43 specifically, but without in any way limiting the generality of the foregoing, bonds,

1 debentures, and other corporate or governmental obligations; stocks, preferred or
2 common; real estate mortgages; shares in building and loan associations or savings and
3 loan associations; annual premium or single premium life, endowment, or annuity
4 contracts; and securities of any management type investment company or investment
5 trust registered under the Federal Investment Company Act of 1940, as from time to time
6 amended.

7 (c) Notwithstanding the provisions of subsections (a) and (b) of this ~~section,~~
8 ~~section and Article 15 of this Chapter,~~ the duties of a trustee with respect to acquiring or
9 retaining a contract of insurance upon the life of the settlor, or the lives of the settlor and
10 the settlor's spouse, do not include a duty (i) to determine whether any such contract is or
11 remains a proper investment; (ii) to exercise policy options available under any such
12 contract; or (iii) to diversify any such contract. A trustee is not liable to the beneficiaries
13 of the trust or to any other party for any loss arising from the absence of those duties
14 upon the trustee.

15 (d) The trustee of a trust described under subsection (c) of this section established
16 prior to October 1, 1995, shall notify the settlor in writing that, unless the settlor provides
17 written notice to the contrary to the trustee within 60 days of the trustee's notice, the
18 provisions of subsection (c) of this section shall apply to the trust. Subsection (c) of this
19 section shall not apply if, within 60 days of the trustee's notice, the settlor notifies the
20 trustee that subsection (c) of this section shall not apply."

21 Section 3. The Revisor of Statutes shall cause to be printed along with this act
22 all relevant portions of the Official Comments to the Uniform Prudent Investor Act and
23 all explanatory comments of the drafters of this act as the Revisor deems appropriate.

24 Section 4. This act becomes effective January 1, 2000.
