A BILL TO BE ENTITLED 1 AN ACT TO ALLOW RETIRED TEACHERS TO TEACH WITHOUT LOSING 2 3 THEIR RETIREMENT BENEFITS. 4 The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts: 5 Section 1. G.S. 135-3(8)c., as amended by Section 28.24(a) of S.L. 1998-212, 6 reads as rewritten: 7 "c. Should a beneficiary who retired on an early or service retirement allowance under this Chapter be reemployed, or 8 9

otherwise engaged to perform services, by an employer participating in the Retirement System on a part-time, temporary, 10 interim, or on a fee-for-service basis, whether contractual or 11 otherwise, and if such beneficiary earns an amount in any 12 calendar year which exceeds fifty percent (50%) of the reported 13 compensation, excluding terminal payments, during the 12 14 months of service preceding the effective date of retirement, or 15 twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000), whichever is greater, as 16 hereinafter indexed, then the retirement allowance shall be 17 suspended as of the first day of the month following the month in 18 which the reemployment earnings exceed the amount above, for 19

the balance of the calendar year. The retirement allowance of the beneficiary shall be reinstated as of January 1 of each year following suspension. The amount that may be earned before suspension shall be increased on January 1 of each year by the ratio of the Consumer Price Index to the Index one year earlier, calculated to the nearest tenth of a percent (1/10 of 1%).

The computation of postretirement earnings of a beneficiary under this sub-subdivision, G.S 135-3(8)c., who has been retired at least 12 months and has not been employed in any capacity, except as a substitute teacher, with a public school for at least 12 months, months immediately preceding the effective date of reemployment, shall not include earnings while:

- 1. The beneficiary is employed to teach on a substitute or interim basis, and not on a permanent basis, in a public school;
- 2. The beneficiary is employed to teach in the teacher's area of certification in a low-performing school. As used in this subsubdivision, a low-performing school is a public elementary or middle school at which forty eight percent (48%) or more of the students were below grade level during either of the prior two school years or a public high school identified by the State Board of Education as low-performing. If the designation of low-performing is removed while the beneficiary is employed to teach at the school, the provisions of this sub-subdivision apply for the next two school years after the designation is removed; or The beneficiary is employed to teach in a public school in the
- teacher's area of certification in a geographical area in which the State Board of Education determines that there is a shortage of teachers in the beneficiary's area of certification. while the beneficiary is employed to teach in a public school or is employed to teach on a substitute or interim basis in a public school.

The Department of Public Instruction shall certify to the Retirement System that a beneficiary is employed to teach by a local school administrative unit under the provisions of this subsubdivision and as a retired teacher as the term is defined under the provisions of G.S. 115C-325(a)(5a).

Beneficiaries employed under this sub-subdivision are not entitled to any benefits otherwise provided under this Chapter as a result of this period of employment."

Section 2. G.S. 115C-325(a)(5a), as enacted by Section 28.24(c) of S.L. 1998-212, reads as rewritten:

"(5a) "Retired teacher" means a beneficiary of the Teachers' and State Employees' Retirement System of North Carolina who has been retired

1	at least 12 months, has not been employed in any capacity, other than as
2	a substitute teacher, with a local board of education for at least 12
3	months, months immediately preceding the effective date of
4	reemployment, is determined by a local board of education to have had
5	satisfactory performance during the last year of employment by a local
6	board of education, and who is employed to teach as provided in G.S.
7	135-3(8)c. A retired teacher shall be treated the same as a probationary
8	teacher except that a retired teacher is not eligible for career status."
9	Section 3. This act becomes effective July 1, 2000. Sections 1 and 2 apply to
10	school years beginning with the 2000-2001 school year.
