6	The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:		
7	Section 1. G.S. 90-187.3(a) reads as rewritten:		
8	"(a) The H	Board may issue a license without written examination, other than the	
9	written North Carolina license examination, to applicants already licensed in another state		
10	provided the applicant presents evidence satisfactory to the Board that:		
11	(1)	The applicant is currently an active, competent practitioner in good	
12		standing; and-standing.	
13	(2)	The applicant has practiced at least three of the five years immediately	
14		preceding filing the application; and application.	
15	(3)	The applicant currently holds an active license in another state; and state.	
16	(4)	There is no disciplinary proceeding or unresolved complaint pending	
17		against the applicant at the time a license is to be issued by this State;	
18		and- <u>State.</u>	
19	<u>(4a)</u>	Any disciplinary actions taken against the applicant or his or her license	
20		by the other state in which he or she is licensed will not affect the	

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1		applicant's competency to practice veterinary medicine as provided in	
2		this Article or any rules adopted by the Board.

	(5)	The licensure requirements in the other state are substantially equivalent	
4		to those required by this State; and State.	
5	(6)	The applicant has achieved a passing score on the written North	
6		Carolina license examination."	
7	Sectio	n 2. G.S. 90-187.3 is amended by adding a new subsection to read:	
8	"(<u>a1)</u> <u>If an a</u>	applicant fails to satisfy subdivision (a)(5) of this section because the	
9	applicant was no	ot required by the state in which he or she is licensed to complete the	
10	certification pro	ogram developed and currently administered by the Educational	
11	Commission for	Foreign Veterinary Graduates of the American Veterinary Medical	
12	Association or	its predecessor program, the Board may consider the following in	
13	determining whether the applicant should be licensed in this State:		
14	(1)	The length of time the applicant has been licensed in the other state, but	
15		the applicant shall have been licensed and engaged in the practice of	
16		veterinary medicine for at least 10 years.	
17	<u>(2)</u>	The applicant's veterinary practice history, including the type and nature	
18	_/	of practice.	
19	<u>(3)</u>	The completion of continuing education courses satisfactory to the	
20		Board.	
21	(4)	Affidavits from veterinarians licensed and in good standing in the other	
22	<u>(1)</u>	state who can attest to the applicant's competency to practice veterinary
