The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:	
Whereas, local governments across the State are author	ized to implement
pretreatment programs in connection with water and sewage treatment	
Whereas, certain local governments have proposed to assess	
charges on food service establishments in connection with those programs regardless of	

Whereas, the State has an interest in both assuring that the fees and charges are reasonable, necessary, and related to the goal of the pretreatment program and in assuring the quality of the water discharged into the water of the State; Now, therefore, The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:

the measures that a particular establishment may have taken to address the issue; and

Section 1. The Department of Environment and Natural Resources, in consultation with the North Carolina Restaurant Association and other food retailers,

shall review all State and local rules and ordinances that govern or impact oil and grease pretreatment programs across North Carolina to determine whether such programs are fair, equitable, effective, and economically manageable. As part of that review the parties shall examine fees and charges associated with such programs and whether they are fair and reasonable. The Department shall report on the findings, conclusions, and recommendations arising from this review to the Environmental Management Commission by December 31, 1999, with any recommendations for rule modification.

Section 2. This act is effective when it becomes law.

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
