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A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

2 AN ACT TO ESTABLISH THE SMART GROWTH NORTH CAROLINA 3 COMMISSION AND TO APPROPRIATE FUNDS FOR THAT PURPOSE.

Whereas, by the year 2000, the population of the State will have grown by approximately 1,120,000 persons since 1990, which is over 360,000 more people than was projected just six years ago; and

Whereas, the primary economic and population growth has occurred in the urban, resort, and retirement areas of the State; and

Whereas, the loss of the tobacco support program is likely to lead to a statewide movement from the rural areas of the State to the already congested urban areas of the State, further straining the infrastructure of the urban areas and further depleting the resources of the rural, economically depressed areas; and

Whereas, the development of the infrastructure in the urban, resort, and retirement areas, including the highway system, the public school system, and water and sewer facilities, has not kept pace with the dramatic population and economic growth; and

Whereas, the number of school-aged children in the State increased by 190,000 in the 1990s, resulting in an estimated cost increase of approximately \$239.4 million in the 2000-2001 fiscal year and \$6.2 billion over the next five years; and

Whereas, the congested roads and highways of the State, particularly in the urban areas, may pose a danger to the health, safety, and welfare of the citizens of the State; and
