5	The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:
6	SECTION 1. Chapter 136 of the General Statutes is amended by adding a
7	new section to read:
8	"§ 136-43.2. Memorial marker program for persons killed on State highways.
9	(a) The Department of Transportation shall expend highway funds to develop and
10	operate a roadside memorial program for the placement of a standard memorial marker
11	at the site of each highway fatality.
12	(b) The Department shall have the standard memorial marker inscribed with a
13	symbol, developed in coordination with Mothers Against Drunk Driving, for each
14	fatality involving impaired driving.
15	(c) The program shall allow for placing the following added text and symbols on the
16	standard memorial marker, at the request of the victim's family:
17	(1) <u>The victim's name.</u>
18	(2) <u>The victim's age at the time of death.</u>
19	(3) The victim's religious affiliation.
20	(d) The program shall allow for the placing of standard symbols indicating the cause
21	or nature of all highway fatalities not involving impaired driving by approved
22	organizations with the concurrence of the victim's family.
23	(e) The costs of all text or symbols added to the standard memorial marker, pursuant
24	to subsection (c) or (d) of this section, shall be paid by the family or the organization
25	requesting those additions.
26	(f) The Department shall issue rules for the implementation of the roadside memorial
27	program authorized by this section."
