11	<u>(1)</u>	'Bicycle' means a human-powered vehicle with two wheels in tandem
12		designed to transport, by the action of pedaling, one or more persons
13		seated on one or more saddle seats on its frame. This term also
14		includes a human-powered vehicle, designed to transport by the action
15		of pedaling which has more than two wheels where the vehicle is used
16		on a public roadway, public bicycle path, or other public right-of-way,
17		but does not include a tricycle.
18	<u>(2)</u>	'Operator' means a person who travels on a bicycle seated on a saddle
19		seat from which that person is intended to and can pedal the bicycle.
20	<u>(3)</u>	'Other public right-of-way' means any right-of-way other than a public
21		roadway or public bicycle path that is under the jurisdiction and
22		control of this State or a local political subdivision of the State and is
23		designed for use and used by vehicular and/or pedestrian traffic.
24	<u>(4)</u>	'Passenger' means a person who travels on a bicycle in any manner
25		except as an operator.
26	<u>(5)</u>	'Protective bicycle helmet' means a piece of headgear that meets or
27		exceeds the impact standards for protective bicycle helmets set by the
28		American National Standards Institute (ANSI) or the Snell Memorial
29		Foundation.
30	<u>(6)</u>	'Public bicycle path' means a right-of-way under the jurisdiction and
31		control of this State or a local political subdivision of the State for use
32		primarily by bicycles and pedestrians.
33	<u>(7)</u>	'Public roadway' means a right-of-way under the jurisdiction and
34		control of this State or a local political subdivision of the State for use
35		primarily by motor vehicles.
36	<u>(8)</u>	'Restraining seat' means a seat separate from the saddle seat of the
37		operator of the bicycle that is fastened securely to the frame of the
38		bicycle and is adequately equipped to restrain the passenger in such
39		seat and protect such passenger from the moving parts of the bicycle.
40	<u>(9)</u>	'Tricycle' means a three-wheeled, human-powered vehicle designed for
41		use as a toy by a single child under the age of six years, the seat of
42		which is no more than two feet from ground level.

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1	With regard to any bicycle used on a public roadway, public bicycle path, or other
2	public right-of-way:
3	(a) It shall be unlawful for any parent or legal guardian of a person below the
4	age of 16 to knowingly permit that person to operate or be a passenger on a bicycle
5	unless at all times when the person is so engaged he or she wears a protective bicycle
6	helmet of good fit fastened securely upon the head with the straps of the helmet.
7	(b) It shall be unlawful for any parent or legal guardian of a person below the age
8	of 16 to knowingly permit that person to be a passenger on a bicycle unless all of the
9	following conditions are met:
10	(1) The person is able to maintain an erect, seated position on
11	the bicycle.
12	(2) Except as provided in subdivision (3) of this subsection, the
13	person is properly seated alone on a saddle seat (as on a
14	tandem bicycle).
15	(3) With respect to any person who weighs less than 40 pounds, or is less
16	than 40 inches in height, the person can be and is properly seated in
17	and adequately secured to a restraining seat.
18	(c) <u>No negligence or liability shall be assessed on or imputed to any party on</u>
19	account of a violation of subsection (a) or (b) of this section.
20	(d) Violation of this section shall be an infraction. Except as provided in
21	subsection (e) of this section, any parent or guardian found responsible for violation of
22	this section may be ordered to pay a civil fine of up to ten dollars (\$10.00), inclusive of
23	all penalty assessments and court costs.
24	(e) In the case of a first conviction of this section, the court may waive the fine
25	upon receipt of satisfactory proof that the person responsible for the infraction has
26	purchased or otherwise obtained, as appropriate, a protective bicycle helmet or a
27	restraining seat, and uses and intends to use it whenever required under this section."
28	<b>SECTION 2.</b> This act becomes effective October 1, 2001.
