4	The Gener	al Assembly of North Carolina enacts:			
5	<b>SECTION 1.</b> G.S. 143B-372.1 reads as rewritten:				
6	"§ 143B-3	72.1. North Carolina Progress Board.			
7	(a)	The North Carolina Progress Board is established. The Board shall be located			
8	administra	tively in within noninstitutional programs in General Administration of the			
9	Board of C	Governors of The University of North Carolina and is may be located at North			
10	Carolina S	State University, any constituent institution within The University of North			
11	Carolina, or at any institution to which it is invited formally, but shall exercise all its				
12	prescribed statutory powers independently of the Board of Governors. Governors or the				
13	institution at which it resides.				
14	(b)	The North Carolina Progress Board shall consist of 21 24 members of			
15	statewide prominence as follows:				
16		(1) The Governor, ex officio;			
17		(2) Eight persons appointed by the Governor, none of whom shall be State			
18		employees or officers;			
19		(3) Four-Five persons appointed by the Speaker of the House of			
20		Representatives, one-two of whom shall be a member members of the			
21		House of Representatives;			
22		(4) Four-Five persons appointed by the President Pro Tempore of the			
23		Senate, one-two of whom shall be a member-members of the Senate;			
24		and			
25		(5) Four Five persons appointed by the North Carolina Progress Board.			
26	(c)	The Governor shall be chair of the North Carolina Progress Board. The			

27 Governor shall appoint a vice-chair from among the membership of the North Carolina

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1 Progress Board to serve at the pleasure of the Governor. The North Carolina Progress 2 Board may elect such other officers as it sees fit.

3 The North Carolina Progress Board shall meet at least twice annually on the (d) 4 call of the chair or as additionally provided by the North Carolina Progress Board. A 5 quorum is 11 12 members of the Board. Members may not send designees to board 6 meetings, nor may they vote by proxy.

7 Board appointments shall be for terms to begin July 1, 1999, with subsequent (e) 8 appointments to be made as terms expire or resignations occur. Of the Governor's 9 appointments, two shall be for one-year terms, two shall be for two-year terms, two 10 shall be for three-year terms, and two shall be for four-year terms. Of the appointments 11 made by the Speaker of the House of Representatives, the President Pro Tempore of the 12 Senate, and the North Carolina Progress Board, one member appointed by each shall be 13 appointed for a one-year term, one member appointed by each shall be appointed for a 14 two-year term, one member appointed by each shall be appointed for a three-year term, 15 and one-two member-members appointed by each shall be appointed for a four-year 16 term. As terms expire, successors shall be appointed for four-year terms.

17 (f) No member may be appointed to more than two consecutive terms. A 18 member of the House of Representatives appointed by the Speaker of the House vacates 19 membership on the North Carolina Progress Board when that person is no longer a 20 member of the House of Representatives, except that if that person is in office at the 21 expiration of the term of office in the House of Representatives but has not been elected 22 to the next term, that person shall continue to serve until the convening of the regular 23 session. A member of the Senate appointed by the President Pro Tempore of the Senate 24 vacates membership on the North Carolina Progress Board when that person is no 25 longer a member of the Senate, except that if that person is in office at the expiration of 26 the term of office in the Senate but has not been elected to the next term, that person 27 shall continue to serve until the convening of the regular session."

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SECTION 2. G.S. 143B-372.2 reads as rewritten:

40 The Commission for a Competitive North Carolina adopted a report which 41 established major goals and ways to measure progress toward these goals.

Technology and Infrastructure Development;

The General Assembly finds that the North Carolina Progress Board 42 (a1) 43 developed a report that focused on four of the Commission's recommended topics and 44

issued 16 major targets for 2010. The objectives of the targets are to drive the State

33			citizens on priority goals for North Carolina and to disseminate
34			findings and recommendations to policymakers;

37			Carolina and that describes and explains a vision for North Carolina's

5		meeting goals, targets, and milestones; milestone, together with an				
6		assessment of the failure to meet same, and where possible, an				
7		estimate of the potential costs associated with failure to act;				
8	(9)	Undertake new and ongoing policy research and benchmarking				
9		studies;				
10	(10)	Publish and distribute periodic reports on policies, performance				
11		improvement, and best practices and trends for meeting achieving the				
12		long term long-term, strategic goals for the State; and				
13	(11)	May apply for and accept gifts or grants.grants, or engage in				
14		consulting activities, or other contractual assignments, consistent with				
15		its mission, for which applicable staff or Board members may expect				
16		to receive reasonable fees and expenses in exchange for specific work				
17		products.				
18	(d) <u>The </u>	Any Regular Session of the General Assembly shall further define the				
19	mission of the North Carolina Progress Board in continuing its work, and may					
20	from time to time, and to the extent practicable, request staff assistance from the Board					
21	to standing, select, or independent legislative study commissions.					
22		General Assembly, after adopting the initial set of goals and measures as				
23	proposed or amended, may alter the goals and measures."

26		Chancellor of North Carolina State University Upon the recommendation				
27	of the Board, the Governor shall appoint an Executive Director who shall serve at the					
28	pleasure of the Chancellor. Board and the Governor, but for administrative purposes,					
29	shall report to the head of the noninstitutional programs at the Board of Governors of					
30	the University. The Executive Director shall report to the North Carolina Progress					
31	Board and the Chancellor. Governor. The Executive Director shall hire or contract with					
32	support staff, who shall work at the pleasure of the Executive Director.					
33		Office of State Budget, Planning, and Management shall also provide				
34	support, information, reports, and other assistance to the North Carolina Progress Board
