9	This Article shall be known and may be cited as the 'Child Bicycle Safety Act'.				
10	"§ 20-171.7. Legislative findings and purpose.				
11	<u>(a)</u>	The C	General Assembly finds and declares that:		
12		<u>(1)</u>	Disability and death of children resulting from injuries sustained in		
13			bicycling accidents are a serious threat to the public health, welfare,		
14			and safety of the people of this State, and the prevention of that		
15			disability and death is a goal of all North Carolinians.		
16		<u>(2)</u>	Head injuries are the leading cause of disability and death from		
17			bicycling accidents.		
18		<u>(3)</u>	The risk of head injury from bicycling accidents is significantly		
19			reduced for bicyclists who wear proper protective bicycle helmets; yet		
20			helmets are worn by fewer than five percent (5%) of child bicyclists		
21			nationwide.		
22		<u>(4)</u>	The risk of head injury or of any other injury to a small child who is a		
23			passenger on a bicycle operated by another person would be		
24			significantly reduced if any child passenger sat in a separate		
25			restraining seat.		
26	<u>(b)</u>		purpose of this Article is to reduce the incidence of disability and death		
27	resulting from injuries incurred in bicycling accidents by requiring that while riding on				
28	a bicycle on the public roads, public bicycle paths, and other public rights-of-way of this

		designed to transport, by the action of pedaling, one or more persons	
10 11		seated on one or more saddle seats on its frame. This term also	
11		includes a human-powered vehicle, designed to transport by the action	
		of pedaling which has more than two wheels where the vehicle is used	
13		on a public roadway, public bicycle path, or other public right-of-way,	
14	( <b>2</b> )	but does not include a tricycle.	
15	<u>(2)</u>	<u>'Operator' means a person who travels on a bicycle seated on a saddle</u>	
16	( <b>2</b> )	seat from which that person is intended to and can pedal the bicycle.	
17	<u>(3)</u>	<u>'Other public right-of-way' means any right-of-way other than a public</u>	
18		roadway or public bicycle path that is under the jurisdiction and

21	<u>(4)</u>	'Passenger' means a person who travels on a bicycle in any manner	
22		except as an operator.	
23	<u>(5)</u>	'Protective bicycle helmet' means a piece of headgear that meets or	
24		exceeds the impact standards for protective bicycle helmets set by the	
25		American National Standards Institute (ANSI) or the Snell Memorial	
26		Foundation.	
27	<u>(6)</u>	'Public bicycle path' means a right-of-way under the jurisdiction and	
28		control of this State or a local political subdivision of the State for use	
29 20	( <b>7</b> )	primarily by bicycles and pedestrians.	
30	<u>(7)</u>	'Public roadway' means a right-of-way under the jurisdiction and	
31		control of this State or a local political subdivision of the State for use

37	<u>(9)</u>	'Tricycle' means a three-wheeled, human-powered vehicle designed for	
38		use as a toy by a single child under the age of six years, the seat of	
39		which is no more than two feet from ground level.

41		to any bicycle used on a public roadway, public bicycle path, or other

43	(a) It shall be unlawful for any person under the age of 16 to operate or be a		
44	passenger on a	bicycle unless at all times when the person is so engaged he or she wears	

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1	a protective bicycle helmet of good fit fastened securely upon the head with the straps			
2	of the helmet.			
3	(b) It shall be unlawful for any person to be a passenger on a bicycle unless all of			
4	the following conditions are met:			
5	(1) The person is able to maintain an erect, seated position on the bicycle.			
6	(2) Except as provided in subdivision (3) of this subsection, the person is			
7	properly seated alone on a saddle seat (as on a tandem bicycle).			
8	(3) With respect to any person who weighs less than 40 pounds, or is less			
9	than 40 inches in height, the person can be and is properly seated in			
10	and adequately secured to a restraining seat.			
11	(c) It shall be unlawful for any parent or legal guardian of a person below the age			
12	of 13 to knowingly permit such person to operate or be a passenger on a bicycle in			
13	violation of subsection (a) or (b) of this section.			
14	(d) No negligence or liability shall be assessed on or imputed to any party on			
15	account of a violation of subsections (a), (b), or (c) of this section.			
16	" <u>§ 20-171.10. Civil penalties.</u>			
17	(a) Except as provided in subsection (b) of this section, any person violating any			
18	requirement set forth in G.S. 20-171.9 shall be held responsible for an infraction and			
19	may pay a civil fine of up to ten dollars (\$10.00), inclusive of all penalty assessments			
20	and court costs.			
21	(b) In the case of a first conviction within a 12-month period of G.S. 20-171.9(a),			
22	(b), or (c), the court may waive the fine upon receipt of satisfactory proof that the			
23	person responsible for the infraction has purchased or otherwise obtained, as			
24	appropriate, a protective bicycle helmet or a restraining seat, and uses and intends to use			
25	it whenever required under G.S. 20-171.9."			
26	<b>SECTION 2.</b> This act becomes effective October 1, 2001.
