A BILL TO BE ENTITLED
AN ACT TO CLARIFY THE DEFINITION OF AIRPORT FACILITIES FOR CERTAIN PURPOSES.


The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:

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SECTION 1. G.S. 63-1 is amended by adding a new subdivision to read:

"(8a) 'Airport facilities' means all properties, facilities, buildings, structures, 6 and activities that satisfy or otherwise fall within the scope of one or 7 8 more of the definitions or uses of the words or phrases 'air navigation 9 facility', 'airport', or 'airport protection privileges' under G.S. 63-1; the definition of 'aeronautical facilities' in G.S. 63-79(1); the phrase 10 'airport facilities' as used in G.S. 159-48(b)(1); the phrase 'aeronautical 11 facilities' as defined in G.S. 159-81 and G.S. 159-97; and the phrase 12 13 'airport facilities and improvements' as used in Article V, Section 13, 14 of the North Carolina Constitution. This definition includes, without limitation, any and all of the following: airports, airport maintenance 15 16 facilities, clear zones, drainage ditches, fields, hangars, landing 17 lighting, airport and airport-related offices, parking facilities, related navigational and signal systems, runways, stormwater outfalls, 18 terminals, terminal shops, and all appurtenant areas used or suitable for 19 20 airport buildings or other airport facilities, and all appurtenant rightsof-way; restricted landing areas; any structures, mechanisms, lights, 21 22 beacons, marks, communicating systems, or other instrumentalities or 23 devices used or useful as an aid, or constituting an advantage or 24 convenience to the safe taking off, navigation, and landing of aircraft, 25 or the safe and efficient operation or maintenance of an airport or 26 restricted landing area; easements through, or other interests in, air 27 space over land or water, interests in airport hazards outside the 28 boundaries of airports or restricted landing areas, and other protection 29 privileges, the acquisition or control of which is necessary to ensure



- (9) In 1998 the General Assembly enacted legislation to disapprove 15A NCAC 2B.0233, entitled the "Neuse River Nutrient Sensitive Waters Management Strategy: Protection and Maintenance of Riparian Areas with Existing Forest Vegetation" ("Temporary Neuse Buffer Rule") as a permanent rule while continuing this rule in effect as a temporary rule with certain modifications until the EMC adopted a revised temporary and permanent rule.
- (10) The EMC has also proposed and, in some cases, adopted other basinwide water quality management strategies ("Basinwide Management Strategies"), pursuant to G.S. 143-214.1, 143-214.7, 143-215.3, and 143B-282, in order to protect water quality standards and uses as required to implement basinwide water quality management plans, including permanent rules adopted for the Neuse River and the Tar-Pamlico River Basins, including the Neuse Buffer Rule.
- (11) The Temporary Neuse Buffer Rule was replaced by a final rule, (Neuse Buffer Rule), which becomes effective on August 1, 2001.
- (12) The Neuse Buffer Rule and the other Basinwide Management Strategies impact on airport facilities located within their respective basin areas.
- (13) The Neuse Buffer Rule contains references to the application of that rule to "airport facilities," and allow work to occur at those airport facilities, sometimes with mitigation, but that rule does not contain a definition of what is meant by the phrase "airport facilities".
- (14) The phrase "airport facilities" as used in the Neuse Buffer Rule has been interpreted by the Division of Water Quality ("DWQ") within the Department of Environment and Natural Resources ("DENR") very narrowly, such as to include only runways, taxiways, and required safety directional equipment.
- (15) The lack of definition and the narrowness of interpretation of the phrase "airport facilities" as used in the Neuse Buffer Rule have created ambiguity, delay, additional expense and other problems for airports seeking to meet the needs for increased air service and FAA regulations.

SECTION 3. Definitions. – Unless otherwise required by the context, the following definitions apply throughout this act:

(1) "Basinwide Management Strategies" means rules to protect water quality standards and uses as required to implement basinwide water quality management plans pursuant to G.S. 143-214.1, 143-214.7, 143-215.3, and 143B-282 and other provisions, including the Neuse Buffer Rule and any temporary or permanent rules adopted for other river basins.

- 1 (2) "Commission" means the Environmental Management Commission.
 - (3) "Department" means the Department of Environment and Natural Resources.
 - (4) "Disapproval Legislation" means Sections 1.1, 1.2, 1.3, 1.4, 1.6, 1.7, 1.8, and 1.14 of Session Law 1998-221, effective November 5, 1998.
 - (5) "Secretary" means the Secretary of Environment and Natural Resources.
 - (6) "Neuse Buffer Rule" means 15A NCAC 2B.0233 (Neuse River Basin: Nutrient Sensitive Waters Management Strategy: Protection and Maintenance of Riparian Areas with Existing Forest Vegetation), adopted as a permanent rule by the Commission effective 1 August 2000.

SECTION 4. Airport Facilities Defined and Work Allowed. – (a) The Commission and the Department shall implement the Neuse Buffer Rule and Basinwide Management Strategies as provided in this section.

SECTION 4.(b) As used in the Neuse Buffer Rule and the Basinwide Management Strategies adopted as of the date of this act, the phrase "airport facilities" is not defined within those rules, but the Department and the Commission shall interpret the phrase "airport facilities" for purposes of interpreting and applying the Neuse Buffer Rule and any Basinwide Management Strategies to have the same meaning as in G.S. 63-1.

SECTION 4.(c) As used in the Neuse Buffer Rule and the Basinwide Management Strategies, work occurring at "airport facilities" shall be classified as exempt, rather than allowable or allowable with mitigation.

SECTION 5. Revision of Neuse Buffer Rule and Basinwide Management Strategies. – The Commission shall revise the Neuse Buffer Rule and any adopted Basinwide Management Strategies in accordance with this act and implement them in accordance with this act.

SECTION 6. Construction of act. – This act shall not be construed to obligate the General Assembly to appropriate any funds to implement the provisions of this act. Every State agency to which this act applies shall implement the provisions of this act from funds otherwise appropriated or available to that agency.

SECTION 7. This act is effective when it becomes law.
