1	A BILL TO BE ENTITLED
2	AN ACT TO MAKE TECHNICAL AND ADMINISTRATIVE CHANGES TO THE
3	MOTOR FUELS TAX LAW.
4	The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:
5	SECTION 1. G.S. 105-259(b) is amended by adding a new subdivision to
6	read:
7	"(7a) To furnish the name and identifying information of motor carriers
8	whose licenses have been revoked to the administrator of a national
9	criminal justice system database that makes the information available
10	only to criminal justice agencies and public safety organizations."
11	SECTION 2. G.S. 105-449.38 reads as rewritten:
12	"§ 105-449.38. Tax levied.
13	A road tax for the privilege of using the streets and highways of this State is imposed
14	upon every motor carrier on the amount of motor fuel or alternative fuel used by the
15	carrier in its operations within this State. The tax shall be at the rate established by the
16	Secretary pursuant to G.S. 105-449.80 or G.S. 105-449.134, 105-449.136, as
17	appropriate. This tax is in addition to any other taxes imposed on motor carriers."
18	SECTION 3. G.S. 105-449.105 reads as rewritten:
19	"§ 105-449.105. Refunds upon application for tax paid on exempt fuel, lost fuel,
20	and fuel unsalable for highway use.
21	(a) Exempt Fuel. – A person may obtain a refund of tax paid by the person on
22	motor fuel sold to a governmental unit whose use of motor fuel is exempt from the
23	motor fuel excise tax. A governmental unit whose use of motor fuel is exempt from the
24	motor fuel excise tax may obtain a refund of tax paid by it on motor fuel. An entity
25	whose use of motor fuel is exempt from tax may obtain a refund of any motor fuel
26	excise tax the entity pays on its motor fuel. A person who sells motor fuel to an entity
27	whose use of motor fuel is exempt from tax may obtain a refund of any motor fuel
28	excise tax the person pays on motor fuel it sells to the entity. A credit card company that

1 issues a credit card to an entity whose use of motor fuel is exempt from tax may obtain a 2 refund of any motor fuel excise tax the company pays on motor fuel the entity purchases 3 using the credit card. 4 A person may obtain a refund of tax paid by the person on exported fuel, including 5 fuel whose shipping document shows this State as the destination state but was diverted 6 to another state in accordance with the diversion procedures established by the 7 Secretary. 8 (b) Lost Fuel. – A supplier, an importer, or a distributor that loses tax-paid motor 9 fuel due to damage to a conveyance transporting the motor fuel, fire, a natural disaster, an act of war, or an accident may obtain a refund for the tax paid on the fuel. 10 11 (c) Accidental Mixes. – A person that accidentally combines any of the following 12 may obtain a refund for the amount of tax paid on the fuel: 13 Dyed diesel fuel with tax-paid motor fuel. (1)14 Gasoline with diesel fuel. (2)15 (3) Undyed diesel fuel with dyed kerosene. Repealed by Session Laws 1998-98, s. 29, effective August 14, 1998. 16 (d) Refund Amount. - The amount of a refund allowed under this section is the 17 (e) amount of excise tax paid, less the amount of any discount allowed on the fuel under 18 G.S. 105-449.93." 19 20 SECTION 4. G.S. 105-449.88A reads as rewritten: 21 "§ 105-449.88A. Liability for tax due on motor fuel designated as exempt by the 22 use of cards or codes. 23 Exempt Cards at Rack. - When a licensed distributor or licensed importer (a) removes motor fuel from a terminal by means of an exempt card or exempt access code 24 issued by the supplier, the distributor or importer represents that the fuel removed will 25 be resold to a governmental unit that is exempt from the tax. A supplier may rely on this 26 representation. A licensed distributor or licensed importer that does not resell motor fuel 27 28 removed from a terminal by means of an exempt card or exempt access code to an 29 exempt governmental unit is liable for any tax due on the fuel. 30 Exempt Cards at Retail. - A supplier that issues to, or authorizes another (b) person to issue to, another person a credit card or an access code that enables the person 31 32 to buy motor fuel at retail without paying the tax on the fuel has a duty to determine if the person is exempt from the tax. A supplier is liable for tax due on motor fuel 33 34 purchased at retail by use of a credit card or an access code issued to a person who is 35 not exempt from the tax. An 'exempt card or code' is a credit card or an access code that enables the person to whom the card or code is issued to buy motor fuel at retail without 36 paying the motor fuel excise tax on the fuel. An entity that issues an exempt card or 37 code has a duty to determine if the person to whom it is issued is exempt from the motor 38 fuel excise tax. An entity that issues an exempt card or code to a person who is not 39 exempt from tax is liable for tax due on motor fuel the person purchases at retail by use 40 of the exempt card or code. If a supplier authorizes another entity to issue an exempt 41 card or code to a person who is not exempt from tax, the supplier and the entity that 42 issued the card are jointly and severally liable for tax due on motor fuel the person 43 44 purchases at retail by use of the exempt card or code.

1	(c) Card Holder. – A person to whom an exempt card or exempt access card is
2	issued for use at a terminal or at retail is liable for any tax due on fuel purchased with
3	the card for a purpose that is not exempt. A person who misuses an exempt card or code
4	by purchasing fuel with the card or code for a purpose that is not exempt is liable for the
5	tax due on the fuel."
6	SECTION 5. G.S. 105-449.72 reads as rewritten:
7	"§ 105-449.72. Bond or letter of credit required as a condition of obtaining and
8	keeping certain licenses. <u>licenses or of applying for certain refunds.</u>
9	(a) Initial Bond. – An applicant for a license as a refiner, a terminal operator, a
10	supplier, an importer, a blender, a permissive supplier, or a distributor must file with the
11	Secretary a bond or an irrevocable letter of credit. A bond must be conditioned upon
12	compliance with the requirements of this Article, be payable to the State, and be in the
13	form required by the Secretary. The amount of the bond or irrevocable letter of credit is
14	determined as follows:
15	(1) For an applicant for a license as any of the following, the amount is
16	two million dollars (\$2,000,000):
17	a. A refiner.
18	b. A terminal operator.
19	c. A supplier that is a position holder or a person that receives
20	motor fuel pursuant to a two-party exchange.
21	d. A bonded importer.
22	e. A permissive supplier.
23	(2) For an applicant for a license as any of the following, the amount is
24	two times the applicant's average expected monthly tax liability under
25	this Article, as determined by the Secretary. The amount may not be
26	less than two thousand dollars (\$2,000) and may not be more than two
27	hundred fifty thousand dollars (\$250,000):
28	a. A supplier that is a fuel alcohol provider but is neither a
29	position holder nor a person that receives motor fuel pursuant to
30	a two-party exchange.
31	b. An occasional importer.
32	c. A tank wagon importer.
33	d. A distributor.
34	e. Repealed by Session Laws 1997-60, s. 5.
35	(3) For an applicant for a license as a blender, a bond is required only if
36	the applicant's average expected annual tax liability under this Article,
37	as determined by the Secretary, is at least two thousand dollars
38	(\$2,000). When a bond is required, the bond amount is the same as
39	under subdivision (2) of this subsection.
40	(b) Multiple Activity. – An applicant for a license as a distributor and as a
41	bonded importer must file only the bond required of a bonded importer. An applicant
42	for two or more of the licenses listed in subdivision (a)(2) or (a)(3) of this section may
13	file one bond that covers the combined liabilities of the applicant under all the activities

43 file one bond that covers the combined liabilities of the applicant under all the activities.

1 A bond for these combined activities may not exceed the maximum amount set in 2 subdivision (a)(2) of this subsection. 3 (c)Adjustment to Bond. – When notified to do so by the Secretary, a person that 4 has filed a bond or an irrevocable letter of credit and that holds a license listed in 5 subdivision (a)(2) of this section must file an additional bond or irrevocable letter of 6 credit in the amount requested by the Secretary. The person must file the additional bond or irrevocable letter of credit within 30 days after receiving the notice from the 7 8 Secretary. The amount of the initial bond or irrevocable letter of credit and any additional bond or irrevocable letter of credit filed by the license holder, however, may 9 not exceed the limits set in subdivision (a)(2) of this section. 10 11 (d) Replacements. - When a license holder files a bond or an irrevocable letter of 12 credit as a replacement for a previously filed bond or letter of credit and the license 13 holder has paid all taxes and penalties due under this Article, the Secretary must take one of the following actions: 14 15 (1)Return the previously filed bond or letter of credit. Notify the person liable on the previously filed bond and the license 16 (2)17 holder that the person is released from liability on the bond. Credit Card Companies. – The Secretary may require a credit card company 18 (e) to file with the Secretary a bond if the company applies for a refund under G.S. 19 20 105-449.105(a) and the Secretary determines after an audit that a bond is needed to protect the State from loss in collecting any additional tax due pursuant to the audit. The 21 bond must be conditioned upon compliance with the requirements of this Article, be 22 payable to the State, and be in the form required by the Secretary. The amount of a bond 23 required under this subsection is two times the average monthly refund due, subject to 24 25 the minimum and maximum amounts provided in subdivision (a)(2) of this section." SECTION 6. G.S. 105-449.105A reads as rewritten: 26 27 "§ 105-449.105A. Monthly refunds for kerosene. 28 Refund. – A distributor who sells kerosene to any of the following may obtain (a) 29 a refund for the excise tax the distributor paid on the kerosene, less the amount of any discount allowed on the kerosene under G.S. 105-449.93: 30 31 The end user of the kerosene, if the distributor dispenses the kerosene (1)32 into a storage facility of the end user that contains fuel used only for 33 heating. one of the following purposes and the storage facility is 34 installed in a manner that makes use of the fuel for any other purpose 35 improbable: 36 Heating. a. Drying crops. 37 <u>b.</u> A manufacturing process. 38 c. A retailer of kerosene, if the distributor dispenses the kerosene into a 39 (2)storage facility that meets both of the following conditions: 40 It is marked with the phrase 'Undyed, Untaxed Kerosene, 41 a. Nontaxable Use Only' or a similar phrase that clearly indicates 42 43 that the fuel is not to be used to operate a highway vehicle.

1 2	<u>b.</u> <u>It and either has a dispensing device that is not suitable for use in fueling a highway vehicle or is kept locked by the retailer</u>
3	and must be unlocked by the retailer for each sale of kerosene.
4	(b) Liability. – If the Secretary determines that the Department overpaid a
5	distributor by refunding more tax to the distributor than is due under this section, the
6	distributor is liable for the amount of the overpayment. This liability applies regardless
7	of whether the actions of a retailer of kerosene contributed to the overpayment."
8	SECTION 7. G.S. 105-449.123 reads as rewritten:
9	"§ 105-449.123. Marking requirements for dyed diesel fuel storage facilities.
10	(a) Requirements. – A person who is a retailer of dyed diesel fuel or who stores
11	both dyed and undyed diesel fuel for use by that person or another person must mark the
12	storage facility for the dyed diesel fuel as follows with the phrase 'Dyed Diesel', 'For
13	Nonhighway Use', or a similar phrase that clearly indicates the diesel fuel is not to be
14	used to operate a highway vehicle:
15	(1) The storage tank of the storage facility must be marked if the storage
16	tank is visible.
17	(2) The fillcap or spill containment box of the storage facility must be
18	marked.
19	(3) The dispensing device that serves the storage facility must be marked.
20	(b) Exception. – The marking requirements of this section do not apply to a
21	storage facility that contains fuel used only in heating, drying crops, or a manufacturing
22	process, for one of the purposes listed in G.S. 105-449.105A(a)(1) and is installed in a
23	manner that makes use of the fuel for any other purpose improbable."
24	SECTION 8. Sections 3, 4, and 5 of this act become effective October 1,
25	2001. The remainder of this act is effective when it becomes law

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
