1	A BILL TO BE ENTITLED
2	AN ACT TO IMPLEMENT THE RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE STUDY
3	COMMISSION ON CHILDREN WITH SPECIAL NEEDS.
4	The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:
5	<b>SECTION 1.(a)</b> There is established the Commission on Students With
6	Disabilities. The Commission shall consist of 18 members, appointed as follows:
7	(1) Seven persons appointed by the Speaker of the House of
8	Representatives, four of whom shall be members of the House of
9	Representatives, and three of whom shall be public members.
10	(2) Seven persons appointed by the President Pro Tempore of the Senate,
11	four of whom shall be members of the Senate, and three of whom shall
12	be public members.
13	(3) Four persons appointed by the Governor.
14	Each appointing authority shall assure insofar as possible that its appointees
15	to the Commission reflect the composition of the North Carolina population with regard
16	to ethnic, racial, age, and gender composition.
17	The Speaker of the House of Representatives and the President Pro Tempore
18	of the Senate shall each designate a cochair of the Commission. The Commission shall
19	meet upon the call of the cochairs. A quorum of the Commission is 10 members.
20	While in the discharge of its official duties, the Commission has the powers of a joint
21	committee under G.S. 120-19 and G.S. 120-19.1. Members of the Commission shall
22	receive per diem, subsistence, and travel allowances in accordance with G.S. 120-3.1,
23	138-5, or 138-6, as appropriate.
24	<b>SECTION 1.(b)</b> The Commission shall study the following issues:
25	(1) The numbers of children receiving or needing services and the cost of
26	educating students in State residential institutions compared to

community-based programs.

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1	(2)	The effect of testing students with disabilities for accountability			
2		purposes versus the federal mandate for inclusion of these students in			
3		testing.			
4	(3)	The effect of the possible tension between the State's preference for			
5		safe schools and the federal preference for keeping students with			
6		disabilities in school if the discipline problem is related to their			
7		disability.			
8	(4)	The extent to which the frequency of expulsion or suspension of			
9		students with disabilities has increased in the past five years, and the			
10		extent to whether there is an increase of these disciplinary actions			
11		around the time of year when end-of-grade or end-of-course tests are			
12		administered.			
13	(5)	The financial cost of increasing the current funding cap of twelve and			
14		one-half percent (12.5%) to thirteen percent (13%) or thirteen and			
15		one-half percent (13.5%).			
16	(6)	Determination of whether special education services are being			
17		distributed equitably statewide (spending between rural and urban			
18		schools, rich and poor school districts).			
19	(7)	Determination of whether the State Board of Education has a neutral			
20		and clear appeal process for the exit exam, and how that process is			
21		working for students with disabilities.			
22	(8)	Determination of whether the State Board of Education has made the			
23		alternative assessment portfolio available to all students whose			
24		Individual Education Plan (IEP) or Section 504 Plan documents the			
25		need.			
26	(9)	The severity of the problems with training, recruiting, and retaining			
27		special education teachers.			
28	(10)	The State law regarding time limits in resolving disputes involving the			
29		educational placement of students with disabilities.			
30	(11)	Any other issue the Commission determines is appropriate.			
31	SECT	<b>TION 1.(c)</b> Upon approval of the Legislative Services Commission, the			
32	Legislative Ser	vices Officer shall assign appropriate professional staff from the			
33	Legislative Serv	ices Office of the General Assembly to assist with the study. The House			
34	of Representativ	ves' and the Senate's Supervisors of Clerks shall assign clerical staff to			
35	the Commission, upon the direction of the Legislative Services Commission. The				
36	Commission may meet in the Legislative Building or the Legislative Office Building				
37	upon the approval of the Legislative Services Commission. The Commission may				
38	contract for professional or consultant services as provided under G.S. 120-32.02 to				
39	assist with the study under subdivision (b)(1) of this section.				
40	<b>SECTION 1.(d)</b> The Commission may make an interim report to the 2001				
41	General Assembly, Regular Session 2002, upon its convening, and shall make its final				
42	report to the 2003 General Assembly upon its convening, and to the Governor. Upon				
43	submitting its final report, the Commission shall expire.				

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1	SECTION 2. G.S. 115C-105.35 reads as rewritten:				
2	"§ 115C-105.35. Annual performance goals.				
3	The School-Based Management and Accountability Program shall (i) focus on				
4	student performance in the basics of reading, mathematics, and communications skills				
5	in elementary and middle schools, (ii) focus on student performance in courses required				
6	for graduation and on other measures required by the State Board in the high schools,				
7	and (iii) hold schools accountable for the educational growth of their students. students,				
8	including students with disabilities. To those ends, the State Board shall design and				
9	implement an accountability system that sets annual performance standards for each				
10	school in the State in order to measure the growth in performance of the students in each				
11	individual school. "				
12	<b>SECTION 3.</b> G.S. 115C-12(9) reads as rewritten:				
13	"(9) Miscellaneous Powers and Duties. – All the powers and duties				
14	exercised by the State Board of Education shall be in conformity with				
15	the Constitution and subject to such laws as may be enacted from time				
16	to time by the General Assembly. Among such duties are:				
17	a. To certify and regulate the grade and salary of teachers and				
18	other school employees.				
19	b. To adopt and supply textbooks.				
20	c. To adopt rules requiring all local boards of education to				
21	implement the Basic Education Program on an incremental				
22	basis within funds appropriated for that purpose by the General				
23	Assembly and by units of local government. Beginning with the				
24 25	1991-92 school year, the rules shall require each local school				
25	administrative unit to implement fully the standard course of				
26 27	study in every school in the State in accordance with the Basic				
27	Education Program so that every student in the State shall have equal access to the curriculum as provided in the Basic				
28 29	Education Program and the standard course of study.				
30	The Board shall establish benchmarks by which to measure				
31	the progress that each local board of education has made in				
32	implementing the Basic Education Program.				
33	The Board shall develop a State accreditation program that				
34	meets or exceeds the standards and requirements of the Basic				
35	Education Program. The Board shall require each local school				
36	administrative unit to comply with the State accreditation				
37	program to the extent that funds have been made available to				
38	the local school administrative unit for implementation of the				
39	Basic Education Program.				
40	The Board shall use the State accreditation program to				
41	monitor the implementation of the Basic Education Program.				
42	c1. To issue an annual 'report card' for the State and for each local				
43	school administrative unit, assessing each unit's efforts to				

1		improve student norformance based on the growth in	
1		improve student performance based on the growth in	
2 3		performance of the students in each school and taking into	
		account progress over the previous years' level of performance	
4		and the State's performance in comparison with other states.	
5		This assessment shall take into account factors that have been	
6		shown to affect student performance and that the State Board	
7		considers relevant to assess the State's efforts to improve	
8		student performance. This assessment shall include	
9		disaggregated data on students, including those with disabilities.	
10	c2.	Repealed by Session Laws 1995 (Regular Session, 1996), c.	
11		716, s. 1.	
12	c3.	To develop a system of school building improvement reports	
13		for each school building. The purpose of school building	
14		improvement reports is to measure improvement in the growth	
15		in student performance at each school building from year to	
16		year, not to compare school buildings. The Board shall include	
17		in the building reports any factors shown to affect student	
18		performance that the Board considers relevant to assess a	
19		school's efforts to improve student performance. Local school	
20		administrative units shall produce and make public their school	
21		building improvement reports by March 15, 1997, for the 1995-	
22		96 school year, by October 15, 1997, for the 1996-97 school	
23		year, and annually thereafter. October 15 each year. Each report	
24		shall be based on building-level data for the prior school year.	
25	c4.	To develop guidelines, procedures, and rules to establish,	
26		implement, and enforce the School-Based Management and	
27		Accountability Program under Article 8B of this Chapter in	
28		order to improve student performance, increase local flexibility	
29		and control, and promote economy and efficiency.	
30	d.	To formulate rules and regulations for the enforcement of the	
31		compulsory attendance law.	
32	e.	To manage and operate a system of insurance for public school	
33		property, as provided in Article 38 of this Chapter.	
34		In making substantial policy changes in administration,	
35		curriculum, or programs the Board should conduct hearings	
36		throughout the regions of the State, whenever feasible, in order	
37		that the public may be heard regarding these matters."	
38	SECTION	4. The State Board of Education shall post on its web site	
39		the education of students with disabilities. This web page shall	
40		about the ABCs, testing procedures, testing results,	
41		plaint procedures, and procedures regarding reviews. The web	
42	page shall be easily accessible to parents and updated as often as necessary to keep the		
43	information current.		
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1 **SECTION 5.** The State Board of Education shall collect information to 2 document how local school administrative units are funding the provision of special 3 education to more students with disabilities than are covered by the State funding cap of 4 twelve and one-half percent (12.5%).

5 **SECTION 6.** From funds appropriated to the General Assembly, the 6 Legislative Services Commission shall allocate funds for the expenses of the 7 Commission on Students with Disabilities established in Section 1 of this act.

8 **SECTION 7.** Sections 1 and 6 of this act become effective July 1, 2001. 9 Section 3 of this act becomes effective July 1, 2002. The remainder of this act is 10 effective when it becomes law.
