BILL SUMMARY: Allows the Department of Justice to provide criminal background histories to the Private Protective Services Board for persons who have applied for a new or renewal license, registration, certification, or permit if the applicant consents to the record check. The Department of Justice may charge each applicant a fee for conducting the background check.

ASSUMPTIONS AND METHODOLOGY: According to staff at the Private Protective Services Board, an estimated 575 applicants annually will submit fingerprints for a national criminal history background check. The current fee charged by the Department of Justice to conduct a national background check is \$38, of which \$22 is remitted to the Federal Bureau of Investigation. The March 2002 Office of State Budget and Management Report on DCI Fee Study indicated the Department of Justice's average cost to process a national background check is \$12.18. The report also indicated that the Department of Justice, as currently staffed, is able to accommodate an increase of 575 background checks within its existing staffing level.

SOURCES OF DATA: Estimates of the annual number of applicants who will submit fingerprints for a national background check were provided by the staff of the Private Protective Services Board. The source of the cost data for the Department of Justice is the *Final Report on the Study of the Cost of Providing Criminal Record Checks* issued by the Office of State Budget and Management in March 2002.
