A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

AN ACT TO MAKE TECHNICAL CORRECTIONS AND CONFORMING
CHANGES TO THE GENERAL STATUTES AS RECOMMENDED BY THE
GENERAL STATUTES COMMISSION AND TO MAKE VARIOUS OTHER
CHANGES TO THE GENERAL STATUTES AND SESSION LAWS.

The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:

**PART I. TECHNICAL CORRECTIONS RECOMMENDED BY THE GENERAL
STATUTES COMMISSION**

SECTION 1. G.S. 14-402(c)(3) reads as rewritten:

"(c) The following definitions apply in this section:

...

(3) Crossbow. – A mechanical device consisting of, but not limited to, strings, cables, and prods transversely mounted on either a shoulder or hand-held stock. This ~~device~~ device is mechanically held at full or partial draw and released by a trigger or similar mechanism ~~which~~ that is incorporated into a stock or handle. When operated, the crossbow discharges a projectile known as a bolt.

..."

SECTION 2. G.S. 20-7(b1) reads as rewritten:

"(b1) Application. – To obtain ~~a~~ an identification card, learners permit, or drivers license from the Division, a person shall complete an application form provided by the Division, present at least two forms of identification approved by the Commissioner, be a resident of this State, and demonstrate his or her physical and mental ability to drive safely a motor vehicle included in the class of license for which the person has applied. At least one of the forms of identification shall indicate the applicant's residence address. The Division may copy the identification presented or hold it for a brief period

1 of time to verify its authenticity. To obtain an endorsement, a person shall demonstrate
2 his or her physical and mental ability to drive safely the type of motor vehicle for which
3 the endorsement is required.

4 The application form shall request all of the following information, and it shall
5 contain the disclosures concerning the request for an applicant's social security number
6 required by section 7 of the federal Privacy Act of 1974, Pub. L. No. 93-579:

- 7 (1) The applicant's full name.
- 8 (2) The applicant's mailing address and residence address.
- 9 (3) A physical description of the applicant, including the applicant's sex,
10 height, eye color, and hair color.
- 11 (4) The applicant's date of birth.
- 12 (5) The applicant's valid social security number.
- 13 (6) The applicant's signature.

14 If an applicant does not have a valid social security number and is ineligible to
15 obtain one, the applicant shall swear to or affirm that fact under penalty of perjury. In
16 such case, the applicant may provide a valid Individual Taxpayer Identification Number
17 issued by the Internal Revenue Service to that person.

18 The Division shall not issue an identification card, learners permit, or drivers license
19 to an applicant who fails to provide either the applicant's valid social security number or
20 the applicant's valid Individual Taxpayer Identification Number."

21 **SECTION 3.** G.S. 49-13.1 is repealed.

22 **SECTION 4.** G.S. 55B-2(6), as amended by Section 3 of S.L. 2003-117,
23 reads as rewritten:

- 24 "(6) The term "professional service" means any type of personal or
25 professional service of the public which requires as a condition
26 precedent to the rendering of such service the obtaining of a license
27 from a licensing board as herein defined, and pursuant to the following
28 provisions of the General Statutes: Chapter 83A, "Architects"; Chapter
29 84, "Attorneys-at-Law"; Chapter 93, "Public Accountants"; and the
30 following Articles in Chapter 90: Article 1, "Practice of Medicine,"
31 Article 2, "Dentistry," Article 6, "Optometry," Article 7, "Osteopathy,"
32 Article 8, "Chiropractic," Article 9A, "Nursing Practice Act," with
33 regard to registered nurses, Article 11, "Veterinarians," Article 12A,
34 "Podiatrists," Article 18A, "Practicing Psychologists," Article 18C,
35 "Marriage and Family Therapy Licensure," Article 18D, "Occupational
36 Therapy," and Article 24, "Licensed Professional Counselors"; Chapter
37 89C, "Engineering and Land Surveying"; Chapter 89A, "Landscape
38 Architects"; Chapter 90B, "Social Worker Certification and Licensure
39 Act" with regard to ~~Certified~~ Licensed Clinical Social Workers as
40 defined by G.S. 90B-3; Chapter 89E, "Geologists"; Chapter 89B,
41 "Foresters"; and Chapter 89F, "North Carolina Soil Scientist Licensing
42 Act."

43
44 **SECTION 5.(a)** G.S. 58-36-10(3) reads as rewritten:

1 **"§ 58-36-10. Method of rate making; factors considered.**

2 The following standards shall apply to the making and use of rates:

3 ...

- 4 (3) In the case of property insurance rates under this Article, consideration
5 may be given to the experience of property insurance business during
6 the most recent five-year period for which that experience is available.
7 In the case of property insurance rates under this Article, consideration
8 shall be given to the insurance public protection classifications of fire
9 districts established by the Commissioner. The Commissioner shall
10 establish and modify from time to time insurance public protection
11 districts for all rural areas of the State and for cities with populations
12 of 100,000 or fewer, according to the most recent annual population
13 estimates certified by the State ~~Planning~~ Budget Officer. In
14 establishing and modifying these districts, the Commissioner shall use
15 standards at least equivalent to those used by the Insurance Services
16 Office, Inc., or any successor organization. The standards developed
17 by the Commissioner are subject to Article 2A of Chapter 150B of the
18 General Statutes. The insurance public protection classifications
19 established by the Commissioner issued pursuant to the provisions of
20 this Article shall be subject to appeal as provided in G.S. 58-2-75, et
21 seq. The exceptions stated in G.S. 58-2-75(a) do not apply.

22 ..."

23 **SECTION 5.(b)** G.S. 58-40-25(4) reads as rewritten:

24 **"§ 58-40-25. Rating methods.**

25 In determining whether rates comply with the standards under G.S. 58-40-20, the
26 following criteria shall be applied:

27 ...

- 28 (4) In the case of property insurance rates under this Article, consideration
29 shall be given to the insurance public protection classifications of fire
30 districts established by the Commissioner. The Commissioner shall
31 establish and modify from time to time insurance public protection
32 districts for all rural areas of the State and for cities with populations
33 of 100,000 or fewer, according to the most recent annual population
34 estimates certified by the State ~~Planning~~ Budget Officer. In
35 establishing and modifying these districts, the Commissioner shall use
36 standards at least equivalent to those used by the Insurance Services
37 Office, Inc., or any successor organization. The standards developed
38 by the Commissioner are subject to Article 2A of Chapter 150B of the
39 General Statutes. The insurance public protection classifications
40 established by the Commissioner issued pursuant to the provisions of
41 this Article shall be subject to appeal as provided in G.S. 58-2-75, et
42 seq. The exceptions stated in G.S. 58-2-75(a) do not apply."

43 **SECTION 5.(c)** G.S. 58-87-1(b) reads as rewritten:

1 "(b) A fire department is eligible for a grant under this section if it meets all of the
2 following conditions:

- 3 (1) It serves a response area of 6,000 or less in population.
- 4 (2) It consists entirely of volunteer members, with the exception that the
5 unit may have paid members to fill the equivalent of three full-time
6 paid positions.
- 7 (3) It has been certified by the Department of Insurance.

8 In making the population determination under subdivision (1) of this subsection, the
9 Department shall use the most recent annual population estimates certified by the State
10 ~~Planning-Budget Officer~~."

11 **SECTION 5.(d)** G.S. 105-113.82(e) reads as rewritten:

12 "(e) Population Estimates. – To determine the population of a city or county for
13 purposes of the distribution required by this section, the Secretary shall use the most
14 recent annual estimate of population certified by the State ~~Planning-Budget Officer~~."

15 **SECTION 5.(e)** G.S. 105-129.3(b1) reads as rewritten:

16 "(b1) Data. – In measuring rates of unemployment and per capita income, the
17 Secretary shall use the latest available data published by a State or federal agency
18 generally recognized as having expertise concerning the data. In measuring population
19 and population growth, the Secretary shall use the most recent estimates of population
20 certified by the State ~~Planning-Budget Officer~~."

21 **SECTION 5.(f)** G.S. 105-129.3A(a) reads as rewritten:

22 "(a) Development Zone Defined. – A development zone is an area comprised of
23 one or more contiguous census tracts, census block groups, or both in the most recent
24 federal decennial census that meets all of the following conditions:

- 25 (1) Every census tract and census block group in the zone is located in
26 whole or in part within the primary corporate limits of a city with a
27 population of more than 5,000 according to the most recent annual
28 population estimates certified by the State ~~Planning-Budget Officer~~.
- 29 (2) It has a population of 1,000 or more according to the most recent
30 annual population estimates certified by the State ~~Planning-Budget~~
31 Officer.
- 32 (3) More than twenty percent (20%) of its population is below the poverty
33 level according to the most recent federal decennial census.
- 34 (4) Every census tract and census block group in the zone meets at least
35 one of the following conditions:
 - 36 a. More than ten percent (10%) of its population is below the
37 poverty level according to the most recent federal decennial
38 census.
 - 39 b. It is immediately adjacent to another census tract or census
40 block group that is in the same zone and has more than twenty
41 percent (20%) of its population below the poverty level
42 according to the most recent federal decennial census.

1 (5) None of the census tracts or census block groups in the zone is located
2 in another development zone designated by the Secretary of
3 Commerce."

4 **SECTION 5.(g)** G.S. 105-164.44F(b) reads as rewritten:

5 "(b) Share of Cities Incorporated on or After January 1, 2001. – The share of a
6 city incorporated on or after January 1, 2001, is its per capita share of the amount to be
7 distributed to all cities incorporated on or after this date. This amount is the proportion
8 of the total to be distributed under this section that is the same as the proportion of the
9 population of cities incorporated on or after January 1, 2001, compared to the
10 population of all cities. In making the distribution under this subsection, the Secretary
11 must use the most recent annual population estimates certified to the Secretary by the
12 State ~~Planning-Budget~~ Officer."

13 **SECTION 5.(h)** G.S. 105-187.19(b) reads as rewritten:

14 "(b) Each quarter, the Secretary shall credit five percent (5%) of the net tax
15 proceeds to the Solid Waste Management Trust Fund and shall credit twenty-seven
16 percent (27%) of the net tax proceeds to the Scrap Tire Disposal Account. The Secretary
17 shall distribute the remaining sixty-eight percent (68%) of the net tax proceeds among
18 the counties on a per capita basis according to the most recent annual population
19 estimates certified to the Secretary by the State ~~Planning-Budget~~ Officer."

20 **SECTION 5.(i)** G.S. 105-187.24 reads as rewritten:

21 "**§ 105-187.24. Use of tax proceeds.**

22 The Secretary shall distribute the taxes collected under this Article, less the
23 Department of Revenue's allowance for administrative expenses, in accordance with this
24 section. The Secretary may retain the Department's cost of collection, not to exceed two
25 hundred twenty-five thousand dollars (\$225,000) a year, as reimbursement to the
26 Department.

27 Each quarter, the Secretary shall credit eight percent (8%) of the net tax proceeds to
28 the Solid Waste Management Trust Fund and shall credit twenty percent (20%) of the
29 net tax proceeds to the White Goods Management Account. The Secretary shall
30 distribute the remaining seventy-two percent (72%) of the net tax proceeds among the
31 counties on a per capita basis according to the most recent annual population estimates
32 certified to the Secretary by the State ~~Planning-Budget~~ Officer. The Department shall
33 not distribute the tax proceeds to a county when notified not to do so by the Department
34 of Environment and Natural Resources under G.S. 130A-309.87. If a county is not
35 entitled to a distribution, the proceeds allocated for that county will be credited to the
36 White Goods Management Account.

37 A county may use funds distributed to it under this section only as provided in G.S.
38 130A-309.82. A county that receives funds under this section and that has an interlocal
39 agreement with another unit of local government under which the other unit provides
40 for the disposal of solid waste for the county must transfer the amount received under
41 this section to that other unit. A unit to which funds are transferred is subject to the
42 same restrictions on use of the funds as the county."

43 **SECTION 5.(j)** Effective July 1, 2003, G.S. 105-472(b) reads as rewritten:

1 "(b) Distribution Between Counties and Cities. – The Secretary shall divide the
2 amount allocated to each taxing county among the county and its municipalities in
3 accordance with the method determined by the county. The board of county
4 commissioners shall, by resolution, choose one of the following methods of distribution:

5 (1) Per Capita Method. – The net proceeds of the tax collected in a taxing
6 county shall be distributed to that county and to the municipalities in
7 the county on a per capita basis according to the total population of the
8 taxing county, plus the total population of the municipalities in the
9 county. In the case of a municipality located in more than one county,
10 only that part of its population living in the taxing county is considered
11 its "total population". In order to make the distribution, the Secretary
12 shall determine a per capita figure by dividing the amount allocated to
13 each taxing county by the total population of that county plus the total
14 population of all municipalities in the county. The Secretary shall then
15 multiply this per capita figure by the population of the taxing county
16 and by the population of each municipality in the county; each
17 respective product shall be the amount to be distributed to the county
18 and to each municipality in the county. To determine the population of
19 each county and each municipality, the Secretary shall use the most
20 recent annual estimate of population certified by the State ~~Planning~~
21 Budget Officer.

22 (2) Ad Valorem Method. – The net proceeds of the tax collected in a
23 taxing county shall be distributed to that county and the municipalities
24 in the county in proportion to the total amount of ad valorem taxes
25 levied by each on property having a tax situs in the taxing county
26 during the fiscal year next preceding the distribution. For purposes of
27 this section, the amount of the ad valorem taxes levied by a county or
28 municipality includes ad valorem taxes levied by the county or
29 municipality in behalf of a taxing district and collected by the county
30 or municipality. In addition, the amount of taxes levied by a county
31 includes ad valorem taxes levied by a merged school administrative
32 unit described in G.S. 115C-513 in the part of the unit located in the
33 county. In computing the amount of tax proceeds to be distributed to
34 each county and municipality, the amount of any ad valorem taxes
35 levied but not substantially collected shall be ignored. Each county and
36 municipality receiving a distribution of the proceeds of the tax levied
37 under this Article shall in turn immediately share the proceeds with
38 each district in behalf of which the county or municipality levied ad
39 valorem taxes in the proportion that the district levy bears to the total
40 levy of the county or municipality. Any county or municipality that
41 fails to provide the Department of Revenue with information
42 concerning ad valorem taxes levied by it adequate to permit a timely
43 determination of its appropriate share of tax proceeds collected under
44 this Article may be excluded by the Secretary from each monthly

1 distribution with respect to which the information was not provided in
2 a timely manner, and those tax proceeds shall then be distributed only
3 to the remaining counties or municipalities, as appropriate. For the
4 purpose of computing the distribution of the tax under this subsection
5 to any county and the municipalities located in the county for any
6 month with respect to which the property valuation of a public service
7 company is the subject of an appeal and the Department of Revenue is
8 restrained by law from certifying the valuation to the county and the
9 municipalities in the county, the Department shall use the last property
10 valuation of the public service company that has been certified.

11 The board of county commissioners in each taxing county shall, by resolution
12 adopted during the month of April of each year, determine which of the two foregoing
13 methods of distribution shall be in effect in the county during the next succeeding fiscal
14 year. In order for the resolution to be effective, a certified copy of it must be delivered
15 to the Secretary in Raleigh within 15 calendar days after its adoption. If the board fails
16 to adopt a resolution choosing a method of distribution not then in effect in the county,
17 or if a certified copy of the resolution is not timely delivered to the Secretary, the
18 method of distribution then in effect in the county shall continue in effect for the
19 following fiscal year. The method of distribution in effect on the first of July of each
20 fiscal year shall apply to every distribution made during that fiscal year."

21 **SECTION 5.(k)** G.S. 136-202(c) reads as rewritten:

22 "(c) The Department, the metropolitan planning organizations, and the
23 Department of Environment and Natural Resources shall jointly evaluate and adjust the
24 regions defined in each regional travel demand model at least once every five years and
25 no later than October 1 of the year following each decennial federal census. The
26 evaluation and adjustment shall be based on decennial census data and the most recent
27 populations estimates certified by the State ~~Planning-Budget~~ Officer. The adjustment of
28 these boundaries shall reflect current and projected patterns of population, employment,
29 travel, congestion, commuting, and public transportation use and the effects of these
30 patterns on air quality."

31 **SECTION 5.(l)** G.S. 143-215.107A(d) reads as rewritten:

32 "(d) Additional Counties. – The Commission may require that motor vehicle
33 emissions inspections be performed in counties in addition to those set out in subsection
34 (c) of this section. In determining whether to require that motor vehicle emissions
35 inspections be performed in a county, the Commission may consider the population of,
36 and distribution of population in, the county; the projected change in population of, and
37 distribution of population in, the county; the number of vehicles registered in the
38 county; the projected change in the number of vehicles registered in the county; vehicle
39 miles traveled in the county; the projected change in vehicle miles traveled in the
40 county; current and projected commuting patterns in the county; and the current and
41 projected impact of these factors on attainment of air quality standards in the county and
42 in areas outside the county. The Commission may not require that motor vehicle
43 emissions inspections be performed in any county with a population of less than 40,000
44 based on the most recent population estimates prepared by the State ~~Planning-Budget~~

1 Officer. The Commission may not require that motor vehicle emissions inspections be
2 performed in any county in which the number of vehicle miles traveled per day is less
3 than 900,000, based on the most recent estimates prepared by the Department of
4 Transportation. In order to disapprove a rule that requires that motor vehicle emissions
5 inspections be performed in one or more additional counties, a bill introduced pursuant
6 to G.S. 150B-21.3(b) must amend subsection (c) of this section to add one or more other
7 counties in which the total population and vehicle miles traveled per day equal or
8 exceed the total population and vehicle miles traveled in the county or counties listed in
9 the rule that the bill would disapprove."

10 **SECTION 5.(m)** G.S. 160A-536(c) reads as rewritten:

11 "(c) Urban Area Revitalization Defined. – As used in this section, the term "urban
12 area revitalization projects" includes the provision within an urban area of any service
13 or facility that may be provided in a downtown area as a downtown revitalization
14 project under subdivision (a)(2) and subsection (b) of this section. As used in this
15 section, the term "urban area" means an area that (i) is located within a city whose
16 population exceeds 150,000 according to the most recent annual population statistics
17 certified by the State ~~Planning~~Budget Officer and (ii) meets one or more of the
18 following conditions:

- 19 (1) It is the central business district of the city.
- 20 (2) It consists primarily of existing or redeveloping concentrations of
21 industrial, retail, wholesale, office, or significant
22 employment-generating uses, or any combination of these uses.
- 23 (3) It is located in or along a major transportation corridor and does not
24 include any residential parcels that are not, at their closest point, within
25 150 feet of the major transportation corridor right-of-way or any
26 nonresidentially zoned parcels that are not, at their closest point,
27 within 1,500 feet of the major transportation corridor right-of-way.
- 28 (4) It has as its center and focus a major concentration of public or
29 institutional uses, such as airports, seaports, colleges or universities,
30 hospitals and health care facilities, or governmental facilities."

31 **SECTION 5.(n)** G.S. 162A-6(a)(14d) reads as rewritten:

32 "(a) Each authority created hereunder shall be deemed to be a public
33 instrumentality exercising public and essential governmental functions to provide for
34 the public health and welfare, and each authority is authorized and empowered:

35 ...

- 36 (14d) To require the owners of developed property on which there are
37 situated one or more residential dwelling units or commercial
38 establishments located within the jurisdiction of the authority and
39 within a reasonable distance of any waterline or sewer collection line
40 owned, leased as lessee, or operated by the authority to connect the
41 property with the waterline, sewer connection line, or both and fix
42 charges for the connections. The power granted by this subdivision
43 may be exercised by an authority only to the extent that the service,
44 whether water, sewer, or a combination thereof, to be provided by the

1 authority is not then being provided to the improved property by any
2 other political subdivision or by a public utility regulated by the North
3 Carolina Utilities Commission pursuant to Chapter 62 of the General
4 Statutes. In the case of improved property that would qualify for the
5 issuance of a building permit for the construction of one or more
6 residential dwelling units or commercial establishments and where the
7 authority has installed water or sewer lines or a combination thereof
8 directly available to the property, the authority may require payment of
9 a periodic availability charge, not to exceed the minimum periodic
10 service charge for properties that are connected. This subdivision
11 applies only to a water and sewer authority whose membership
12 includes part or all of a county that has a population of at least 40,000
13 according to the most recent annual population estimates certified by
14 the State ~~Planning~~Budget Officer.

15 ..."

16 **SECTION 6.** G.S. 78A-17 reads as rewritten:

17 **"§ 78A-17. Exempt transactions.**

18 Except as otherwise provided in this Chapter, the following transactions are
19 exempted from G.S. 78A-24 and G.S. 78A-49(d):

- 20 (1) Any isolated nonissuer transaction, whether effected through a dealer
21 or ~~not~~not.
- 22 (2) Any nonissuer distribution other than by a controlling person of an
23 outstanding security if
- 24 a. A recognized securities manual contains the names of the
25 issuer's officers and directors, a balance sheet of the issuer as of
26 a date within 18 months, and a profit and loss statement for
27 either the fiscal year preceding that date or the most recent year
28 of operations, or
- 29 b. A registered dealer files with the Administrator such
30 information relating to the issuer as the Administrator may by
31 rule or order require, or
- 32 c. The security has a fixed maturity or a fixed interest or dividend
33 provision and there has been no default during the current fiscal
34 year or within the three preceding fiscal years, or during the
35 existence of the issuer and any predecessors if less than three
36 years, in the payment of principal, interest, or dividends on the
37 ~~security~~security.
- 38 (3) Any nonissuer transaction effected by or through a registered dealer
39 pursuant to an unsolicited order or offer to buy; but the Administrator
40 may by rule require that the customer acknowledge upon a specified
41 form that the sale was unsolicited, and that a signed copy of each such
42 form be preserved by the dealer for a specified ~~period~~period.

- 1 (4) Any transaction between the issuer or other person on whose behalf
2 the offering is made and an underwriter, or among
3 ~~underwriters;~~underwriters.
- 4 (5) Any transaction in a bond or other evidence of indebtedness secured
5 by a lien or security interest in real or personal property, or by an
6 agreement for the sale of real estate or chattels, if the entire security
7 interest or agreement, together with all the bonds or other evidences of
8 indebtedness secured thereby, is offered and sold as a ~~unit;~~unit.
- 9 (6) Any transaction by an executor, administrator, sheriff, marshal,
10 receiver, trustee in bankruptcy, guardian, or ~~conservator;~~conservator.
- 11 (7) Any transaction executed by a person holding a bona fide security
12 interest without any purpose of evading this ~~Chapter;~~Chapter.
- 13 (8) Any offer or sale to an entity which has a net worth in excess of one
14 million dollars (\$1,000,000) as determined by generally accepted
15 accounting principles, bank, savings institution, trust company,
16 insurance company, investment company as defined in the Investment
17 Company Act of 1940, pension or profit-sharing trust, or other
18 financial institution or institutional buyer, or to a dealer, whether the
19 purchaser is acting for itself or in some fiduciary ~~capacity;~~capacity.
- 20 (9) Any transaction pursuant to an offer directed by the offeror to not
21 more than 25 persons, other than those persons designated in
22 subdivision (8), in this State during any period of 12 consecutive
23 months, whether or not the offeror or any of the offerees is then
24 present in this State, if the seller reasonably believes that all the buyers
25 in this State are purchasing for investment. The Administrator may by
26 rule or order withdraw, amend, or further condition this exemption for
27 any security or security transaction. There is established a fee of one
28 hundred fifty dollars (\$150.00) to recover costs for any filing required.
- 29 (10) Any offer or sale of a preorganizational certificate or subscription if:
30 (i) no commission or other remuneration is paid or given directly or
31 indirectly for soliciting any prospective subscriber; (ii) no public
32 advertising or solicitation is used in connection with the offer or sale;
33 (iii) the number of subscribers does not exceed 10 and the number of
34 offerees does not exceed 25; and (iv) no payment is made by any
35 subscriber.
- 36 (11) Any transaction pursuant to an offer to existing security holders of the
37 issuer, including persons who at the time of the transaction are holders
38 of convertible securities, nontransferable warrants, or transferable
39 warrants exercisable within not more than 90 days of their issuance, if
40 (i) no commission or other remuneration (other than a standby
41 commission) is paid or given directly or indirectly for soliciting any
42 security holder in this State, or (ii) the issuer first files a notice
43 specifying the terms of the offer and the Administrator does not by

1 order disallow the exemption within the next 10 full business
2 ~~days;~~days.

3 (12) Any offer (but not a sale) of a security for which registration
4 statements have been filed under both this Chapter and the Securities

8 (h) in any township located within a county where the population of all cities in the
9 county that have previously approved the sale of any kind of alcoholic beverages
10 comprises more than twenty percent (20%) of the total county population as of the most
11 recent federal census. In the case of subdivision (2) of this section, an election may be
12 called in the two townships voting together on the proposition contained in G.S.
13 18B-602(h).

14 The election shall be held by the county board of elections upon request of the
15 county board of commissioners or upon petition of twenty-five percent (25%) of the
16 registered voters of the township, or in the case of subdivision (2) of this section, of the
17 two townships taken together. The election shall be conducted and the results
18 determined in the same manner as county elections held under this Article. For purposes
19 of this Article, townships holding any election under this subsection shall be treated on
20 the same basis as counties, and municipalities located within those townships shall be

"SECTION 5.1.(p) The sum of ~~one million six hundred thousand dollars (\$1,600,000)~~two million five hundred fifty thousand dollars (\$2,550,000) appropriated in this section in the TANF Block Grant to the Department of Health and Human Services, Division of Social Services, for fiscal year 2003-2004 shall be used to support various child welfare training projects as follows:

- (1) Provide a regional training center in southeastern North Carolina.
- (2) Support the Masters Degree in Social Work/Baccalaureate Degree in Social Work Collaborative.
- (3) Provide training for residential child care facilities.

17 proceed in the following manner:

28 subject to the court order of support. The district court may assess court costs against
29 the nonprevailing party. If no response is received from the obligor within 10 days of
30 the service of the notice, the Child Support Agency shall notify the financial institution
31 to submit payment, up to the total amount of the child support arrears, if available. This
32 amount is to be applied to the debt of the delinquent obligor.

33 A financial institution shall not be liable to any person for complying in good faith
34 with this subsection.

35 This levy procedure is to be available for direct use by all states' child support
36 programs to financial institutions in this State."

32 school is not required to enter into any other contract. The charter shall incorporate the
33 information provided in the application, as modified during the charter approval
34 process, and any terms and conditions imposed on the charter school by the State Board
35 of Education. No other terms may be imposed on the charter school as a condition for
36 receipt of local funds.

37 (d) The board of directors of the charter school shall decide matters related to the
38 operation of the school, including budgeting, curriculum, and operating procedures.

39 (e) A charter school's specific location shall not be prescribed or limited by a
40 local board or other authority except a zoning ~~authority~~ authority unless the local board
41 of education applied for and was granted the charter for the conversion of a public
42 school or the creation of a new charter school. The school may lease space from a local
43 board of education or as is otherwise lawful in the local school administrative unit in
44 which the charter school is located. If a charter school leases space from a sectarian

1 organization, the charter school classes and students shall be physically separated from
2 any parochial students, and there shall be no religious artifacts, symbols, iconography,
3 or materials on display in the charter school's entrance, classrooms, or hallways.
4 Furthermore, if a charter school leases space from a sectarian organization, the charter
5 school shall not use the name of that organization in the name of the charter school.

6 At the request of the charter school, the local board of education of the local school
7 administrative unit in which the charter school will be located shall lease any available
8 building or land to the charter school unless the board demonstrates that the lease is not
9 economically or practically feasible or that the local board does not have adequate
10 classroom space to meet its enrollment needs. Notwithstanding any other law, a local
11 board of education may provide a school facility to a charter school free of charge;
12 however, the charter school is responsible for the maintenance of and insurance for the
13 school facility.

14 (f) Except as provided in this Part and pursuant to the provisions of its charter, a
15 charter school is exempt from statutes and rules applicable to a local board of education
16 or local school administrative unit."

2 (5) The charter school meets generally accepted standards of fiscal
3 management; and
4 (6) It is otherwise appropriate to approve the enrollment growth."

27 retained in accordance with Chapter 132 of the General Statutes. To promote
28 cooperation and avoid unnecessary duplication of audit effort, audit work papers related
29 to issued audit reports shall be, unless otherwise prohibited by law, made available for
30 inspection by duly authorized representatives of the State and federal governments in
31 connection with some matter officially before them. Except as otherwise provided in
32 this subsection, or upon subpoena issued by a duly authorized court or court official,
33 audit work papers shall be kept confidential and shall not be open to examination or
34 inspection under G.S. 132-6. Audit reports shall be public records to the extent that they
35 do not include information that, under State laws, is confidential and exempt from

26 animal's trainer during training sessions in any of the places listed in G.S. 168-3.

27 A mobility impaired person is a person with a physiological deficiency, regardless of
28 its cause, nature, or extent, that renders the individual unable to move about without the

30 functional ability to ambulate, climb, descend, sit, rise, or perform any other related
31 function."

36 including both general and supplemental tax revenues, and not including fines and
37 forfeitures or restricted use sales taxes authorized by Article 40 or 42 of Chapter 105 of
38 the General Statutes."

40 not changed by this section except to the extent any previously enacted provisions for

16 Governors of The University of North Carolina in accordance with Section 31.5 of this
17 act and fifty-four percent (54%) shall be issued for projects identified by the Office of
18 State Budget and Management in accordance with Section 31.5 of this act.

19 The Director of the Budget shall direct the State Treasurer to carry out the financing
20 for repair and renovation projects selected pursuant to this section. Special indebtedness
21 authorized by this section shall be issued or incurred only in accordance with Article 9
22 of Chapter 142 of the General Statutes, as enacted by this part."

23 **SECTION 99.** The lead-in language of Section 46.2 of S.L. 2003-284 reads
24 as rewritten:

25 "**SECTION 46.2.** Article 9 of Chapter 142 of the General Statutes, as enacted by
26 S.L. 2003-314, is rewritten to read:"

27 **SECTION 100.** Section 3 of S.L. 2003-300 reads as rewritten:

28 "**SECTION 3.** Waiver of Deadlines, Fees, and Penalties. – Except as prohibited by
29 the Constitution, the Governor may extend deadlines and waive penalties or fees as is
30 necessary to alleviate hardship created for deployed military personnel serving in
31 Operation Iraqi Freedom. This authority includes the authority to do all of the
32 following:

- 33 (1) Extend for up to 90 days from the end of deployment the validity of a
34 permanent or temporary drivers license issued under G.S. 20-7 to
35 deployed military personnel.
- 36 (2) Waive civil penalties and restoration fees under G.S. 20-309 for any
37 deployed military personnel whose motor vehicle liability insurance
38 lapsed during the period of deployment or within 90 days after the
39 military member returned to North Carolina if the military member
40 certifies to the Division of Motor Vehicles that the motor vehicle was
41 not driven on the highway by anyone during the period in which the
42 motor vehicle was uninsured and that the owner now has liability
43 insurance on the motor vehicle.

- 1 (3) Allow up to 90 days from the end of deployment for any deployed
2 military personnel to renew a ~~license as defined in G.S. 93B-1, an~~
3 occupational license. During the period of deployment or active duty
4 and until the expiration of the 90-day period provided for in this
5 subdivision, expired occupational licenses that are within the scope of
6 this act remain valid, as if they had not expired. For the purposes of
7 this section, the term "occupational license" means any license (other
8 than a privilege license), certificate, or other evidence of qualification
9 that an individual is required to obtain before the individual may
10 engage in or represent himself or herself to be a member of a particular
11 profession or occupation.
- 12 (4) Require that any renewal fee applicable to the renewal of a license
13 under subdivision (3) of this section be prorated over the period
14 covered by the license and reduced in proportion to the period of time
15 that the licensee was deployed outside the State."

16 **SECTION 101.** Since S.L. 2003-315 has enacted the same matter, if House
17 Bill 27, 2003 Regular Session, becomes law, then Section 2 of House Bill 47 is
18 repealed, and G.S. 145-19, as enacted by House Bill 47, is recodified as G.S. 145-20.

19 **SECTION 102.** If Senate Bill 236 becomes law, Section 12 of that bill reads
20 as rewritten:

21 "**SECTION 12.** Parts 1 and 8 of this act are effective for taxable years beginning on
22 or after January 1, 2003. Part 5 of this act becomes effective July 1, 2003. ~~Part 9 of this~~
23 ~~act is effective for taxable years beginning on or after January 1, 2003, and shall expire~~
24 ~~for taxable years beginning on or after January 1, 2005.~~ Part 10 of this act becomes
25 effective January 1, 2004. The remainder of this act is effective when it becomes law."

26 **SECTION 103.** If Senate Bill 668, 2003 General Assembly, becomes law,
27 then G.S. 18B-1001.1(b) reads as rewritten:

28 "(b) A wine shipper permittee that ships to addresses in the State more than 1,000
29 cases of wine in a calendar year must appoint at least one wholesaler to offer and sell
30 the products of the wine shipper permittee under Article 12 of this Chapter if the wine
31 shipper permittee is contacted by a wholesaler that wishes to sell the products of the
32 wine shipper permittee. This provision shall not be construed to require the wine shipper
33 permittee to appoint the wholesaler that originally contacted the wine shipper permittee.
34 Wine purchased by a resident of the State at the premises of the wine shipper permittee
35 and shipped to an address in the State under G.S. ~~18B-109(b)~~18B-109(d) shall not be
36 included in calculating the total of 1,000 cases per year."

37 **SECTION 104.(a)** If Senate Bill 919, 2003 Regular Session, becomes law,
38 G.S. 50B-3.1(h) as enacted by that law, reads as rewritten:

39 "(h) Disposal of Firearms. – If the defendant does not file a motion requesting the
40 return of any firearms, ammunition, or permits surrendered within the time period
41 prescribed by this section, if the court determines that the defendant is precluded from
42 regaining possession of any firearms, ammunition, or permits surrendered, or if the
43 defendant or third-party owner fails to remit all fees owed for the storage of the firearms
44 or ammunition within 30 days of the entry of the order granting the return of the

1 firearms, ammunition, or permits, the sheriff who has control of the firearms,
2 ammunition, or permits shall give notice to the defendant, and the sheriff shall apply to
3 the court for an order of disposition of the firearms, ammunition, or permits. The judge,
4 after a hearing, may order the disposition of the firearms, ammunition, or permits in one
5 or more of the ways authorized by law, including subdivision (4), (4a), (5), or (6) of
6 G.S. 14-269.1. If a sale by the sheriff does occur, any proceeds from the sale after
7 deducting any costs associated with the sale, and in accordance with all applicable State
8 and federal law, shall be provided to the defendant, if requested by the defendant by
9 motion made before the hearing or at the hearing and if ordered by the judge."

10 **SECTION 104.(b)** This section becomes effective December 1, 2003, and
11 applies to offenses committed on or after that date.

12 **SECTION 105.** Wherever the term "Public Campaign Financing Fund"
13 appears in Chapter 105 or Chapter 163 of the General Statutes, in any other chapter of
14 the General Statutes, or in any act of the General Assembly, the term is changed to read
15 "Judicial Elections Fund."

16 **SECTION 106.** Notwithstanding any other provision of law, Fayetteville
17 State University may retain the proceeds from the sale of the existing chancellor's
18 residence. Fayetteville State University may use the proceeds from the sale of the
19 existing chancellor's residence, and any other nonappropriated funds available, to
20 construct a new chancellor's residence. Proceeds from the sale not used for that purpose
21 shall revert.

22 **SECTION 107.(a)** If by 10:00 A.M. on February 9, 2004, an act to redistrict
23 the State House of Representatives or the State Senate has not been approved under
24 section 5 of the Voting Rights Act of 1965 or is otherwise prohibited by law from being
25 implemented, the State Board of Elections shall postpone the primary election for all
26 offices in G.S. 163-1 until a date the State Board determines to be fair to all parties,
27 potential candidates, and voters. The State Board shall make its decision as soon as
28 practical, taking into account the likelihood of receiving a final approval of any pending
29 redistricting plan.

30 **SECTION 107.(b)** If the filing period or primary election or both are
31 postponed under this section, the State Board of Elections shall adopt rules for the
32 implementation of the primary election schedule. Adoption of those rules is not subject
33 to Chapter 150B of the General Statutes. Those rules shall include a postponed filing
34 period and other necessary parts of the election schedule. The rules shall include reset
35 dates for absentee balloting that shall as nearly as practical provide the same amount of
36 time for voters and election officials set forth in Article 20 of Chapter 163 of the
37 General Statutes. The State Board shall, as soon as practical, distribute its rules,
38 including a Revised Primary Timetable, to county boards of elections.

39 **SECTION 107.(c)** The State Board of Elections shall be governed by the
40 following limitations:

- 41 (1) Any postponement of the candidate filing period or the primary shall
42 apply to all offices in G.S. 163-1 whose primary elections are regularly
43 scheduled on primary day, so that there is one candidate filing period
44 for all those offices and one primary election for all those offices. The

1 postponement shall also apply to any elections to local office held on
2 that date (such as elections for boards of education under G.S.
3 115C-37) and the filing period for those offices.

4 (2) The State Board of Elections does not have the authority to dispense
5 with a second primary. The State Board shall provide for a second
6 primary in its schedule to any candidate entitled to call for a second
7 primary under the provisions of G.S. 163-111.

8 (3) The State Board shall set a filing period no shorter than 10 business
9 days.

10 (4) Before making its decision to postpone a filing period or primary
11 election under this section, the State Board of Elections shall consult
12 with the President Pro Tempore of the Senate, the Speakers of the
13 House of Representatives, and the leaders of both political parties in
14 the House and Senate.

15 **SECTION 107.(d)** If the primary election is postponed under subsection (a)
16 of this section, any local act for election of a board of education elected at the primary
17 which provides that persons elected shall take office in July of the year of the election is
18 modified for the 2004 election only to provide that the persons elected shall take office
19 in September of the year of the election.

20 **SECTION 107.(e)** For the 2004 primary election only, G.S. 163-112 shall be
21 applied by substituting "10 days" for "30 days" wherever it appears.

22 **SECTION 107.(f)** The provisions of this section apply during the 2004
23 election year only.

24 **SECTION 108.** The following position and position number for position
25 reductions in the Department of Revenue, as provided in the Joint Conference
26 Committee Report on the Continuation, Expansion and Capital Budgets, June 28, 2003,
27 is amended as follows: in Project Tax Collect, delete "Revenue Officer I –
28 #4784-000-0076-639" and substitute "Revenue Officer I – #4784-0000-0074-116".

29 **SECTION 109.(a)** The Department of Environment and Natural Resources
30 may identify positions in the Administrative Divisions and Regional Offices, in addition
31 to the operating costs in the Administrative Divisions and Regional Offices, to comply
32 with a reduction of two hundred thousand dollars (\$200,000) for the 2003-2004 fiscal
33 year and for the 2004-2005 fiscal year in operating support in the Administrative
34 Divisions and Regional Offices required by Section 2.1, S.L. 2003-284, as set forth in
35 the Joint Conference Committee Report on the Continuation, Expansion and Capital
36 Budgets. Notwithstanding G.S. 143-23 or G.S. 143-34.1, the Department of
37 Environment and Natural Resources may continue and support the positions identified
38 under this subsection from receipts rather than from its General Fund appropriation in
39 order to fulfill the reduction of two hundred thousand dollars (\$200,000) under this
40 subsection.

41 **SECTION 109.(b)** The Department of Environment and Natural Resources
42 may identify operating support reductions in the Division of Parks and Recreation, in
43 addition to reductions to seasonal staff in the Division of Parks and Recreation, to
44 comply with a reduction of one hundred forty-four thousand dollars (\$144,000) for the

1 2003-2004 fiscal year and for the 2004-2005 fiscal year in seasonal staff in the Division
2 of Parks and Recreation required by Section 2.1, S.L. 2003-284, as set forth in the Joint
3 Conference Committee Report on the Continuation, Expansion and Capital Budgets.

4 **SECTION 109.(c)** The Department of Environment and Natural Resources
5 shall report to the Joint Legislative Commission on Governmental Operations no later
6 than 30 days after the 2003 Regular Session of the 2003 General Assembly adjourns to
7 a date certain the specific line items from which the reductions under subsection (a) and
8 subsection (b) of this section were identified.

9 **SECTION 110.** Unless otherwise provided, this act is effective when it
10 becomes law.
