2	AN ACT TO PROHIBIT SELLERS FROM CHARGING EXCESSIVE PRICES ON
3	THEIR MERCHANDISE AND SERVICES DURING DECLARED STATES OF
4	DISASTER.
5	The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:
6	<b>SECTION 1.</b> Article 1 of Chapter 75 of the General Statutes is amended by
7	adding new sections to read:
8	" <u>§ 75-36. Declaration of State public policy.</u>
9	It is the public policy of this State to protect its citizens from price gouging during
10	states of disaster. The State also realizes the difficulty in regulating prices while not
11	defeating the ability of the market in goods and services from bringing supply back in
12	balance with demand and not defeating the function of price in allocating scarce
13	resources.
14	" <u>§ 75-36.1. Prohibit excessive pricing during states of disaster.</u>
15	(a) It shall be a violation of G.S. 75-1.1 for any person to sell or rent or offer to
16	sell or rent at retail during a state of disaster, in the area for which the state of disaster
17	has been declared, any merchandise or services which are consumed or used as a direct
18	result of an emergency or which are consumed or used to preserve, protect, or sustain
19	life, health, safety, or comfort of persons or their property with the knowledge and
20	intent to charge a price that is unreasonably excessive under the circumstances. In
21	determining whether a price is unreasonably excessive, it shall be considered whether:
22	(1) The price charged by the seller is attributable to additional costs
23	imposed by the seller's supplier or other costs of providing the good or
24 25	service during the state of disaster; and
25 26	(2) The seller offered to sell or rent the merchandise or service at a price
26	that was below the seller's average price in the preceding 60 days
27	before the state of disaster.

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If the seller did not sell or rent or offer to sell or rent the merchandise or service in 1 2 question prior to the time the state of disaster was declared, the price at which the 3 merchandise or service was generally available in the trade area shall be used as a factor 4 in determining if the seller is charging an unreasonably excessive price. 5 (b)In the event the Attorney General investigates a complaint for a violation of 6 this section and determines that the seller has not violated the provisions of this section 7 and if the seller so requests, the Attorney General shall promptly issue a press release to 8 a television station and newspaper of general circulation in the county or counties where 9 the seller is located stating that the seller has not charged unreasonably excessive prices 10 during a state of disaster. A trade association, corporation, or partnership may register an agent for the 11 (c) 12 purposes of being notified when the Governor declares and terminates a state of disaster. A trade association, corporation, or partnership may designate up to three 13 14 persons to be notified on behalf of the organization's members and is responsible for 15 maintaining current information for the designated agent or agents. The Office of the Governor is responsible for notifying the registered agents simultaneously with the 16 17 declaration and termination of the state of disaster. 18 (d) For the purposes of this section, the end of a state of disaster is the earlier of 45 days or the termination of a natural or man-made disaster or emergency as declared 19 20 in accordance with G.S. 166A-6 or G.S. 166A-8. 21 **SECTION 2.** This act becomes effective on the later of July 1, 2003, or the 22 date it becomes law.
