1 A BILL TO BE ENTITLED 2 AN ACT TO AMEND CERTAIN ENVIRONMENTAL AND NATURAL 3 **RESOURCES LAWS TO: (1) CLARIFY THE REQUIREMENT THAT MOTOR** 4 VEHICLES OPERATED ON A FEDERAL INSTALLATION IN AN EMISSIONS 5 COUNTY ARE SUBJECT TO EMISSIONS INSPECTION REQUIREMENTS; (2) CLARIFY THE REQUIREMENT THAT LAND-DISTURBING ACTIVITY BE 6 7 CONDUCTED IN ACCORDANCE WITH AN APPROVED PLAN; (3) 8 AUTHORIZE THE ENVIRONMENTAL REVIEW COMMISSION AND THE 9 JOINT LEGISLATIVE COMMISSION ON SEAFOOD AND AQUACULTURE 10 TO CONTRACT FOR CONSULTANTS IN CERTAIN CIRCUMSTANCES; (4) PROVIDE THAT A PERSON WHO MANUFACTURES, INSTALLS, REPAIRS, 11 12 OR PUMPS SEPTIC SYSTEMS MAY PURCHASE AND INSTALL APPROVED EFFLUENT FILTERS; (5) DELAY BY ONE YEAR THE EFFECTIVE DATE OF 13 CERTAIN PROVISIONS OF S.L. 2005-384, AN ACT TO REQUIRE THE 14 15 REMOVAL, COLLECTION, AND RECOVERY OF MERCURY SWITCHES 16 FROM CERTAIN MOTOR VEHICLES; (6) REMOVE DEER AND ELK FROM THE DEFINITION OF LIVESTOCK; (7) CLARIFY THAT THE FOR HIRE 17 18 BLANKET COASTAL RECREATIONAL FISHING LICENSE IS ISSUED FOR 19 THE FOR HIRE BOAT; (8) CLARIFY THAT SPECIAL LANDHOLDER AND 20 GUEST FISHING LICENSES ONLY APPLY WHEN THE GUESTS ARE 21 NONPAYING; (9) INCREASE THE TYPES OF LICENSES THAT THE 22 RESOURCES COMMISSION WILDLIFE MAY **ESTABLISH** AS 23 PERSONALIZED LICENSES; (10) CLARIFY THAT THE LIFETIME UNIFIED 24 INLAND/COASTAL RECREATIONAL FISHING LICENSE IS Α 25 RESIDENT-ONLY LICENSE; (11) PROVIDE FOR THE CONFIDENTIALITY INFORMATION OBTAINED BY THE WILDLIFE 26 OF RESOURCES

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11	PART I. AMEND ENVIRONMENTAL LAWS
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13	SECTION 1. G.S. 20-183.2(b)(1) reads as rewritten:
14	"(1) It is subject to registration with the Division under Article 3 of this
15	Chapter.Chapter, except for motor vehicles operated on a federal
16	installation as provided in sub-subdivision e. of subdivision (5) of this
17	subsection."
18	SECTION 2. G.S. 113A-57 is amended by adding a new subdivision to
19	read:
20	"(5) The land-disturbing activity shall be conducted in accordance with the
21	approved erosion and sedimentation control plan."
22	SECTION 3.1. G.S. 120-70.44 reads as rewritten:
23	"§ 120-70.44. Additional powers.
24	(a) The Environmental Review Commission, while in the discharge of official
25	duties, may exercise all the powers provided for under the provisions of G.S. 120-19,
26	and G.S. 120-19.1 through G.S. 120-19.4. The Environmental Review Commission may
27	meet at any time upon the call of either cochairman, whether or not the General
28	Assembly is in session. The Environmental Review Commission may meet in the
29	Legislative Building or the Legislative Office Building upon the approval of the
30	Legislative Services Commission.
31	(b) Notwithstanding any rule or resolution to the contrary, proposed legislation to
32	implement any recommendation of the Environmental Review Commission regarding
33	any study the Environmental Review Commission is authorized to undertake or any
34	report authorized or required to be made by or to the Environmental Review
35	Commission may be introduced and considered during any session of the General
36	Assembly.
37	(c) <u>The Commission may contract for consultants or hire employees in</u>
38	accordance with G.S. 120-32.02."
39	SECTION 3.2. G.S. 120-70.63 reads as rewritten:
40	"§ 120-70.63. Additional powers.
41	(a) The Commission, while in the discharge of official duties, may exercise all
42	the powers of a joint committee of the General Assembly provided for under the provisions of $C \ge 120, 10$ and $C \ge 120, 10, 1$ through $C \ge 120, 10, 4$. The Commission
43	provisions of G.S. 120-19, and G.S. 120-19.1 through G.S. 120-19.4. The Commission
44	may meet at any time upon the call of either cochair, whether or not the General

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1	Assembly is in session. The Commission may meet in the Legislative Building or the
2	Legislative Office Building upon the approval of the Legislative Services Commission.
3	(b) The Commission may contract for consultants or hire employees in

5	SECTION 4. G.S. 130A-335.1(a) reads as rewritten:
6	"(a) The manufacturer of each person who manufactures, installs, repairs, or
7	<u>pumps any septic tank to be installed in this State as a part of a septic tank system that is</u>
8	designed to treat 3,000 gallons per day or less of sewage shall provide an effluent filter
9	approved by the Department pursuant to the requirements of G.S. 130A-335, this
10	section, and rules adopted by the Commission. <u>Any person who manufactures, installs,</u>
10	repairs, or pumps systems described in this section may purchase and install any
12	<u>approved filters on the systems.</u> The person who installs the septic tank system <u>effluent</u>
12	<u>filter</u> shall install the effluent filter as a part of the septic tank system in accordance with
13	the specifications provided by the manufacturer of the effluent filter. An effluent filter
15	shall:
16	(1) Be made of materials that are capable of withstanding the corrosives to
17	which septic tank systems are normally subject.
18	(2) Prevent solid material larger than one-sixteenth of an inch, as
19	measured along the shortest axis of the material, from entering the
20	drainfield.
21	(3) Be designed and constructed to allow for routine maintenance.
22	(4) Be designed and constructed so as not to require maintenance more
23	frequently than once in any three-year period under normally
24	anticipated use."
25	SECTION 5. Section 4 of S.L. 2005-384 reads as rewritten:
26	"SECTION 4. Sections 1, 3, and 4 of this act are effective when this act becomes
27	law, except that G.S. 130A-310.53, 130A-310.54(c), and 130A-310.55 become effective
28	1 July 2006.2007. Section 2 of this act becomes effective 1 October 2005. Each vehicle
29	manufacturer that is subject to the requirements of this act shall provide the information
30	required by G.S. 130A-310.52(b), either individually or as a group of manufacturers, on
31	or before 1 January 2006.2007. This act expires on 1 July 2026."
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33	PART II. AMEND NATURAL RESOURCES LAWS
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35	SECTION 6. G.S. 106-581.1(3) reads as rewritten:
36	"(3) Dairying and the raising, management, care, and training of livestock,
37	including horses, bees, poultry, deer, elk, and other animals for
38	individual and public use, consumption, and marketing."
39	SECTION 7. G.S. 113-174.3(a) reads as rewritten:
40	"(a) License. – A person who operates a for hire boat may purchase a For Hire
41	Blanket CRFL issued by the Division.Division for the for hire boat. A For Hire Blanket
42	CRFL authorizes all individuals on the for hire boat who do not hold a license issued
43	under this Article or Article 25A of this Chapter to engage in recreational fishing in
44	coastal fishing waters that are not joint fishing waters. A For Hire Blanket CRFL does

1	not authorize individuals to engage in recreational fishing in joint fishing waters or
2	inland fishing waters. This license A For Hire Blanket CRFL is valid for a period of one
3	year from the date of issuance. The fee for a For Hire Blanket CRFL is:
4	(1) Two hundred fifty dollars (\$250.00) for a vessel captained by an
5	individual who holds a certification from the United States Coast
6	Guard to carry six or fewer passengers.
7	(2) Three hundred fifty dollars (\$350.00) for a vessel captained by an
8	individual who holds a certification from the United States Coast
9	Guard to carry greater than six passengers."
10	SECTION 8. G.S. 113-271(d)(9) reads as rewritten:
11	"(9) Special <u>Landholder and Guest Fishing License – \$50.00</u> . This license
12	shall be issued only to the owner or lesseelandholder of private
13	property bordering inland or joint fishing waters, including public
14	mountain trout waters, and entitles persons waters. This license shall
15	entitle the landholder and guests of the landholder to fish from the
16	shore or any pier or dock originating from the property without any
17	additional fishing license. This license is applicable only to private
18	property and private docks and piers and is not valid for any public
19	property, pier, or dock nor for any private property, pier, or dock
20	operated for any commercial purpose whatsoever. The guest
21	fishingThis license shall not be in force unless displayed on the
22	premises of the property and only entitles fishing without additional
23	license to persons fishing from the licensed property and then only
24	when fishing within the private property lines. The guest fishing This
25	license is not transferable as to person or location. For purposes of this
26	subdivision, a guest is any individual invited by the landholder to fish
27	from the property at no charge. A charge includes any fee, assessment,
28	dues, rent, or other consideration which must be paid, whether directly
29	or indirectly, in order to be allowed to fish from the property,
30	regardless of the stated reason for such charge."
31	SECTION 9. G.S. 113-272.3(d) reads as rewritten:
32	"(d) In issuing lifetime sportsman combination licenses, the Wildlife Resources
33	Commission is authorized to adopt rules to establish a personalized series for certain
34 25	<u>license types</u> and to charge a five dollar (\$5.00) administrative fee, to be deposited in the Wildlife Fund to defreu the cost of isomerce of the personalized license."

SECTION 11.1. G.S. 143-254.5 reads as rewritten:
"§ 143-254.5. Disclosure of personal identifying information.
(a) Personal identifying information obtained by the Commission from a applicant for a license, title, permit, or registration issued by the Commission, from a
consumer who purchases or subscribes to a good or service offered by the Commission
or from a donor in connection with any gift to the Commission is confidential under
G.S. 132-1.2 and shall only be disclosed by the Commission as provided in this section.
(b) Personal identifying information obtained from the holder of a license issued
under Article 14B or Article 25A of Chapter 113 of the General Statutes shall be
disclosed to the Division of Marine Fisheries and the Marine Fisheries Commission.
(c) Personal identifying information may be disclosed to any officer, employee
or authorized representative of any federal, state, or local government agency is
disclosure is necessary to carry out a proper function of the Commission or other
agency.
(d) As used in this section, "personal identifying information" includes a person's
mailing address, residence address, date of birth, telephone number, electronic mail
address, driver license number, and social security number. Social security numbers and
identifying information obtained by the Commission shall be treated as provided in
G.S. 132-1.10. For purposes of this section, 'identifying information' also includes a
person's mailing address, residence address, date of birth, and telephone number."
SECTION 11.2. G.S. 143B-289.52(h) reads as rewritten:
"(h) Neither the Commission nor the Department may disclose personal
information provided by an applicant for a license issued under Article 14A or 14B of
Chapter 113 of the General Statutes. Social security numbers and identifying
information obtained by the Commission or the Division of Marine Fisheries shall be
treated as provided in G.S. 132-1.10. For purposes of this subsection, 'identifying
information' also includes a person's mailing address, residence address, date of birth
and telephone number."
SECTION 12. G.S. 143B-289.52 is amended by adding a new subsection to
read:
"(i) The Commission may adopt rules to exempt individuals who participate in
organized fishing events held in coastal or joint fishing waters from recreational fishing
license requirements for the specified time and place of the event when the purpose of
the event is consistent with the conservation objectives of the Commission."

8	164, and information collected under the authority of Part 4 of Article 5 of this Chapter
9	that are in the possession of the Department of Health and Human Services, the
10	Department of Environment and Natural Resources, or local health departments shall be
11	confidential and shall not be public records pursuant to G.S. 132-1. Information
12	contained in the records may be disclosed only when disclosure is authorized or
13	required by State or federal law. Notwithstanding G.S. 8-53 or G.S. 130A-143, the
14	information contained in the records may be disclosed for purposes of treatment,
15	payment, or health care operations. For purposes of this section, the terms "treatment,"
16	"payment," and "health care operations" have the meanings given those terms in 45
17	C.F.R.Code of Federal Regulations § 164.501."
18	SECTION 13.3. G.S. 130A-17(b) reads as rewritten:
19	"(b) The Secretary of Environment and Natural Resources and a local health
20	director shall have the same rights enumerated in subsection (a) of this section to
21	enforce the provisions of Part 4 of Article 5 and Articles 8, 9, 10, 11, and 12 of this
22	Chapter."
23	SECTION 13.4. G.S. 130A-18(b) reads as rewritten:
24	"(b) The Secretary of Environment and Natural Resources and a local health
25	director shall have the same rights enumerated in subsection (a) of this section to
26	enforce the provisions of <u>Part 4 of Article 5 and Articles 8, 9, 10, 11, and 12 of this</u>
27	Chapter."
28 29	SECTION 13.5. G.S. 130A-19(b) reads as rewritten:
29 30	"(b) The Secretary of Environment and Natural Resources and a local health director shall have the same rights anymerated in subsection (a) of this section to
