2	AN ACT TO AMEND THE LAW GOVERNING THE VOLUNTEER RESCUE/EMS
3	FUND.
4	The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:
5	SECTION 1. G.S. 58-87-5 reads as rewritten:
6	"§ 58-87-5. Volunteer Rescue/EMS Fund.
7	(a) There is created in the Department of Insurance the Volunteer Rescue/EMS
8	Fund to provide grants to volunteer rescue units providing rescue or rescue and
9	emergency medical services to purchase equipment and make capital improvements. An
10	eligible rescue or rescue/EMS unit may apply to the Department of Insurance for a grant
11	under this section. The application form and criteria for grants shall be established by
12	the Department. The North Carolina Association of Rescue and Emergency Medical
13	Services, Inc., shall provide the Department with an advisory priority listing for rescue
14	equipment eligible for funding, and the The Department of Health and Human Services
15	shall provide the Department with an advisory priority listing of EMS equipment
16	eligible for funding. The State Treasurer shall invest the Fund's assets according to law,
17	and the earnings shall remain in the Fund. On December 15 of each year, the
18	Department shall make grants to eligible rescue or rescue/EMS units subject to all of the
19	following limitations:
20	(1) A grant to an applicant who is required to match the grant with
21	non-State funds may not exceed fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000),
22	twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000), and a grant to an applicant
23	who is not required to match the grant with non-State funds may not
24	exceed three thousand dollars (\$3,000).
25	(2) An applicant whose liquid assets, when combined with the liquid
26	assets of any corporate affiliate or subsidiary of the applicant, are more
27	than one thousand dollars (\$1,000) shall match the grant on a
28	dollar-for-dollar basis with non-State funds.

1	(3) The grant may be used only for equipment purchases, payment of
2	highway use taxes on those purchases, purchases or capital
3	expenditures.
4	(4) An applicant may receive no more than one grant per fiscal year.
5	In awarding grants under this section, the Department shall to the extent possible select
6	applicants from all parts of the State based upon need. Up to two percent (2%) of the
7	Fund may be used for additional staff and resources to administer the Fund in each
8	fiscal year. In addition, notwithstanding G.S. 58-78-20, up to four percent (4%) of the
9	Fund may be used for additional staff and resources for the North Carolina Fire and
10	Rescue Commission.
11	(b) A rescue rescue, emergency medical services, or rescue/EMS unit is eligible
12	for a grant under this section if it meets all of the following conditions:
13	(1) Repealed by Session Laws 1989 (Regular Session, 1990), c. 1066, s.
14	33(a).
15	(2) It consists entirely of volunteer members, with the exception that the
16	unit may have paid members to fill the equivalent of three 10 full-time
17	paid positions.
18	(3) It has been recognized by the Department as an organization that
19	provides rescue rescue, emergency medical services, or rescue and
20	emergency medical services. A unit that provides emergency medical
21	services only is eligible for grant funding only after all those eligible
22	rescue or rescue and emergency medical services units that are
23	approved have been funded each grant year. A unit that only provides
24	emergency medical services may be funded up to the level of
25	emergency medical services that the unit is approved to provide by the
26	authority having jurisdiction.
27	(4) It satisfies the eligibility criteria established by the Department under
28	subsection (a) of this section.
29	(c) For the purpose of this section and Article 88 of this Chapter, "rescue" means
30	the removal of individuals facing external, nonmedical, and nonpatient related peril to
31	areas of relative safety. A "rescue unit" or "rescue squad" means a group of individuals
32	who are not necessarily trained in emergency medical services, fire fighting, or law
33	enforcement, but who expose themselves to an external, nonmedical, and nonpatient
34	related peril to effect the removal of individuals facing the same type of peril to areas of
35	relative safety. The unit or squad must comply with existing State statutes and with
36	eligibility criteria established by the North Carolina Association of Rescue and
37	Emergency Medical Services, Inc."
38	SECTION 2. This act becomes effective October 1, 2005.
