3	Whereas, the Innovative Education Act became law in 2003; and					
4	Whereas, as a result of said act, 52 Early/Middle College programs have been					
5	developed as a collaboration between the public schools, the community colleges, and private

7	Whereas, these schools have generally evidenced a decrease in the dropout rate and,					
8		as a result, have won national awards; and				
9 10		Whereas, North Carolina has seven identified economic development regions, each				
10		with its own challenges during changing economic times; and Whereas, to be efficient with the taxpayers dollars and to continue to reduce the				
12		dropout rate and to prepare our students for twenty-first century jobs, it would be beneficial to				
12		develop future Early/Middle College programs and STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering,				
14	-	Mathematics) school programs that have curriculums that prepare students to meet the				
15		ticular need of the respective economic development regions. In addition, it would be				
16		ficial to develop curriculums in some of these schools that address career areas that are				
17		present in each region and that would address statewide needs; and

7	SECTION 3. The purpose of the Commission is to (i) develop incrementally, in			
8	conjunction with the Department of Public Instruction, standard curriculums for career clusters			
9	and their corresponding career paths in accordance with the Early/Middle College model and			
10	(ii) monitor the implementation of pilot programs in the seven economic development regions			
11	of the State that will best suit the needs of the regions and prepare students for the increased			
12	academic demands of a global economy.			
13	The Commission shall meet at least once in each economic development region			
14	within the first eight months of its creation. In the course of the study, the Co			
15	consider the needs of the State as a whole and shall review the economic vision plans for each			
16	region and other information it deems necessary and consider the growing need for technicians,			
17	teachers, practitioners of allied health, including, but not limited to, nurses and doctors, and the			
18	need for scientists and engineers and other critical areas. It shall also consider the technical and			
19	vocational needs of each region.			
20	The Commission shall report its recommendations to the State Boar	d of Education.		
21	In its report, it shall recommend at least four of the 16 career clusters identifie	d by the United		
22	States Department of Education that will best and most broadly serve the imm	nediate needs of		
23	the State and the respective regions. Thereafter, the State Board of Education,	in consultation		
24	with the Department of Public Instruction, shall develop the curriculum for the	e career clusters		
25	so recommended. The State Board of Education shall thereafter, for the	he school year		
26	2010-2011, implement at least one JOBS Early/Middle College in each o	f the economic		
27	development regions as recommended by the commission.			
28	The Commission shall also continue to work on prioritizing and	customizing the		
29	remaining career clusters and identifying additional career paths following the	-		
30	shall subsequently report to the State Board of Education and the Joint Legisl	ative Education		
31	Oversight Committee by May 1, 2010.
