2	AN ACT TO STIMULATE JOB-CREATING VENTURES, EXPAND BUSINESS	
3	OPPORTUNITIES, AND PROMOTE ECONOMIC TRANSITION IN DISTRESSED	
4	RURAL AREAS.	
5	The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:	
6	SECTION 1. There is appropriated from the General Fund to the North Carolina	
7	Rural Economic Development Center, Inc., (Rural Center) the sum of twenty million dollars	
8	(\$20,000,000) for the 2009-2010 fiscal year to be used to continue the Rural Economic	
9 Transition Program for the following purposes:		
10	(1) To provide grants to local government for building reuse and restoration	
11	projects leading to job creation, business creation, or both in buildings that	
12	have been vacant for at least three months. Priority shall be given to towns	
13	or communities with a population of less than 10,000.	
14	(2) To provide grants to support economic recovery and revitalization in small	
15	towns through the North Carolina STEP program. Priority shall be given to	
16	towns or communities with a population of less than 10,000 that are	
17	experiencing hardship as a result of business losses, devastation from natural	
18	disasters, or persistent poverty.	
19	(3) To provide grants for innovation projects involving local and regional	
20	economic development and agricultural diversification initiatives that spur	
21	business activity, job creation, public or private investment, or any	
22	combination thereof.	
23	SECTION 2. Priority for grant funds shall be given to eligible applicants in	
24	development tier one areas, as defined in G.S. 143B-437.08.	
25	SECTION 3. The Rural Center may use a portion of the funds appropriated under	
26	this act, not to exceed four percent (4%), for administration of the programs for which funds are	
27		
28	SECTION 4. This act becomes effective July 1, 2009.
