## A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

2 AN ACT TO AMEND THE CRIME VICTIMS COMPENSATION ACT TO PROVIDE 3 THAT CRIMINALLY INJURIOUS CONDUCT INCLUDES BOTH FELONY AND 4 MISDEMEANOR DEATH BY VEHICLE AND TO PROVIDE THAT ECONOMIC 5 LOSS FOR WHICH COMPENSATION MAY BE AWARDED INCLUDES THE COST OF GRIEF COUNSELING FOR THE SPOUSE AND CHILDREN OF THE DECEASED 6 7 VICTIM. 8 The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts: SECTION 1. G.S. 15B-2(5) reads as rewritten: 9 "Criminally injurious conduct" means conduct that by its nature poses a 10 "(5) substantial threat of personal injury or death, and is punishable by fine or 11 imprisonment or death, or would be so punishable but for the fact that the 12 person engaging in the conduct lacked the capacity to commit the crime 13 14 under the laws of this State. Criminally injurious conduct includes conduct that amounts to an offense involving impaired driving as defined in 15 G.S. 20-4.01(24a), and conduct that amounts to a violation of G.S. 20-166 if 16 17 the victim was a pedestrian or was operating a vehicle moved solely by human power or a mobility impairment device. For purposes of this Article, 18 a mobility impairment device is a device that is designed for and intended to 19 20 be used as a means of transportation for a person with a mobility impairment, is suitable for use both inside and outside a building, and whose 21 22 maximum speed does not exceed 12 miles per hour when the device is being operated by a person with a mobility impairment. Criminally injurious 23 24 conduct includes the offenses of felony and misdemeanor death by vehicle under G.S. 20-141.4, but does not include any other conduct arising out of 25 the ownership, maintenance, or use of a motor vehicle when the conduct is 26 punishable only as a violation of other provisions of Chapter 20 of the 27 28 General Statutes. Criminally injurious conduct shall also include an act of terrorism, as defined in 18 U.S.C. § 2331, that is committed outside of the 29 30 United States against a citizen of this State." SECTION 2. G.S. 15B-2(10) reads as rewritten: 31 "Economic loss" means economic detriment consisting only of allowable 32 "(10) 33 expense, work loss, replacement services loss, and household support loss. If 34

criminally injurious conduct causes death, economic loss includes a dependent's economic loss and a dependent's replacement service loss. loss,

1	and also includes the cost of grief counseling for the spouse and children of
2	the deceased victim. Noneconomic detriment is not economic loss, but
3	economic loss may be caused by pain and suffering or physical impairment."
4	SECTION 3. This act becomes effective July 1, 2009, and applies to pending
5	claims and claims filed on or after that date.
