26		recipient of the transmission, and (iv) any other information required by

28	<u>(3)</u>	The practitioner's electronic or digital signature or key code appears on the
29		electronic prescription order.
30	<u>(4)</u>	The prescription is transmitted by the practitioner or the practitioner's
31		designated agent to a pharmacy of the patient's choice. If the pharmacy of
32		the patient's choice is not equipped with the capability to accept an electronic
33		prescription, the practitioner shall provide the patient with a written
34		prescription or transmit the prescription to the pharmacy of the patient's
35		choice verbally by telephone or by facsimile.



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<u>(5)</u>	The prescription is received only by the pharmacy of the patient's choice in a
	manner that prevents an intervening person or entity from accessing,
	viewing, reading, manipulating, altering, storing, or deleting the electronic
	prescription prior to its receipt at the pharmacy.
<u>(6)</u>	The prescription is transmitted directly from the practitioner to the pharmacy
	of the patient's choice. If the practitioner provides the patient with an
	electronic prescription for the patient to deliver to a pharmacy of the patient's
	choice, the practitioner shall include the practitioner's original handwritten
	signature on the electronic prescription. If the practitioner provides the
	patient with a hard copy prescription generated from electronic media, the
	practitioner shall include an electronic or manual signature on the hard copy
	prescription. Any prescription with an electronic signature must be applied
	to paper that utilizes security features to ensure the prescription is not subject
	to any form of copying or alteration.
