17		amount allocated to the 911 Fund for PSAPs. A PSAP is not eligible for a
18		r this section unless it <u>complies with the requirements of this Article</u> , provides

21	(1)	Administration. – The Board must notify PSAPs of the estimated
22	(1)	distributions no later than December 31 of each year. The Board must
23		determine actual distributions no later than June 1 of each year. The Board
24		must determine a method for establishing distributions that is equitable and
25		sustainable and that ensures distributions for eligible operating costs and
26		anticipated increases for all funded PSAPs. The Board must establish a
27		formula to determine each PSAP's base amount. The formula must be
28		determined and published to PSAPs in the first quarter of the fiscal year

6 7	(3) Charges associated with the service supplier's 911 service and other service supplier recurring charges. The PSAP providing 911 service is responsible to
8	the voice communications service provider for all 911 installation, service,
9	equipment, operation, and maintenance charges owed to the voice
10	communications service provider. A PSAP may contract with a voice
11	communications service provider on terms agreed to by the PSAP and the
12	provider.
13	(d) Local Fund. – The fiscal officer of a PSAP to whom a distribution is made under
14	this section must deposit the funds in a special revenue fund, as defined in G.S. 159-26(b)(2),
15	designated as the Emergency Telephone System Fund. The fiscal officer may invest money in
16	the Fund in the same manner that other money of the local government may be invested.
17	Income earned from the invested money in the Emergency Telephone System Fund must be
18	credited to the Fund. Revenue deposited into the Fund must be used only as permitted in this
19 20	section.
20 21	(e) Compliance. – A PSAP, or the governing entity of a PSAP, must comply with all of the following in order to receive a distribution under this section:
21	(1) A county or municipality that has one or more PSAPs must submit in writing
22	to the 911 Board information that identifies the PSAPs in the manner
23 24	required by the FCC Order.
25	(2) A participating PSAP must annually submit to the 911 Board a copy of its
26	governing agency's proposed or approved budget detailing the revenues and
27	expenditures associated with the operation of the PSAP. The PSAP budget
28	must identify revenues and expenditures for eligible expense
29	reimbursements as provided in this Article and rules adopted by the 911
30	Board.
31	(3) A PSAP must be included in its governing entity's annual audit required
32	under the Local Government Budget and Fiscal Control Act. The Local
33	Government Commission must provide a copy of each audit of a local
34 35	government entity with a participating PSAP to the 911 Board.
33 36	(4) A PSAP must comply with all requests by the 911 Board for financial information related to the operation of the PSAP
30 37	information related to the operation of the PSAP.(4a) <u>A PSAP must have a plan and means to serve as a back-up PSAP and must</u>
38	maintain the plan and means for 911 call taking in the event 911 calls cannot
39	be received and processed in the primary PSAP.
40	(5) A primary PSAP must comply with the rules, policies, procedures, and
41	operating standards for primary PSAPs adopted by the 911 Board.
42	(f) Application to Cherokees. – The Eastern Band of Cherokee Indians is an eligible
43	PSAP. The Tribal Council of the Eastern Band is the local governing entity of the Eastern Band
44	for purposes of this section. The Tribal Council must give the 911 Board information adequate
45	to determine the Eastern Band's base amount. The 911 Board must use the most recent federal
46	census estimate of the population living on the Qualla Boundary to determine the per capita
47	distribution amount."
48	SECTION 4. This act is effective when it becomes law.
