The lineup administrator does not know the suspect's identity, 6 The eyewitness should not feel compelled to make an identification, c. 7 It is as important to exclude innocent persons as it is to identify the d. 8 perpetrator, and 9 The investigation will continue whether or not an identification is e. 10 made. 11 The eyewitness shall acknowledge the receipt of the instructions in writing. 12 If the eyewitness refuses to sign, the lineup administrator shall note the 13 refusal of the eyewitness to sign the acknowledgement and shall also sign 14 the acknowledgement. In a photo lineup, the photograph of the suspect shall be contemporary and, 15 (4) to the extent practicable, shall resemble the suspect's appearance at the time 16 17 of the offense. The lineup shall be composed so that the fillers generally resemble the 18 (5) 19 eyewitness's description of the perpetrator, while ensuring that the suspect 20 does not unduly stand out from the fillers. In addition: 21 All fillers selected shall resemble, as much as practicable, the 22 eyewitness's description of the perpetrator in significant features, 23 including any unique or unusual features. 24 b. At least five fillers shall be included in a photo lineup, in addition to 25 the suspect. 26 At least five fillers shall be included in a live lineup, in addition to c. 27 the suspect. 28 d. If the eyewitness has previously viewed a photo lineup or live lineup 29 in connection with the identification of another person suspected of 30 involvement in the offense, the fillers in the lineup in which the 31 current suspect participates shall be different from the fillers used in 32 any prior lineups. 33 If there are multiple eyewitnesses, the suspect shall be placed in a different (6) 34 position in the lineup or photo array for each eyewitness. 35 In a lineup, no writings or information concerning any previous arrest, (7) 36 indictment, or conviction of the suspect shall be visible or made known to 37 the eyewitness. 38 In a live lineup, any identifying actions, such as speech, gestures, or other (8) 39 movements, shall be performed by all lineup participants. 40 In a live lineup, all lineup participants must be out of view of the eyewitness (9) 41 prior to the lineup. 42 Only one suspect shall be included in a lineup. (10)43 (11)Nothing shall be said to the eyewitness regarding the suspect's position in the 44 lineup or regarding anything that might influence the eyewitness's 45 identification. 46 (12)The lineup administrator shall seek and document a clear statement from the 47 eyewitness, at the time of the identification and in the eyewitness's own 48 words, as to the eyewitness's confidence level that the person identified in a 49 given lineup is the perpetrator. The lineup administrator shall separate all 50 witnesses in order to discourage witnesses from conferring with one another

- before or during the procedure. Each witness shall be given instructions 1 2 regarding the identification procedures without other witnesses present. 3 If the eyewitness identifies a person as the perpetrator, the eyewitness shall (13)4 not be provided any information concerning the person before the lineup 5 administrator obtains the evewitness's confidence statement about the 6 selection. There shall not be anyone present during the live lineup or 7 photographic identification procedures who knows the suspect's identity, 8 except the eyewitness and counsel as required by law. 9 Unless it is not practical, a video record of live identification procedures (14)10 shall be made. If a video record is not practical, the reasons shall be 11 documented, and an audio record shall be made. If neither a video nor audio 12 record are practical, the reasons shall be documented, and the lineup 13 administrator shall make a written record of the lineup. 14 Whether video, audio, or in writing, the record shall include all of the (15)15 following information: All identification and nonidentification results obtained during the 16 a. 17 identification procedure, signed by the eyewitness, including the eyewitness's confidence statement. If the eyewitness refuses to sign, 18 19 the lineup administrator shall note the refusal of the eyewitness to 20 sign the results and shall also sign the notation. 21 b. The names of all persons present at the lineup. The date, time, and location of the lineup. 22 c. 23 The words used by the eyewitness in any identification, including d. 24 words that describe the eyewitness's certainty of identification. 25 Whether it was a photo lineup or live lineup and how many photos or e. 26 individuals were presented in the lineup. 27 f. The sources of all photographs or persons used. 28 In a photo lineup, the photographs themselves. g. 29 In a live lineup, a photo or other visual recording of the lineup that h. 30 includes all persons who participated in the lineup. 31 Alternative Methods for Identification if Independent Administrator Is Not Used. – 32 In lieu of using an independent administrator, a photo lineup eyewitness identification 33 procedure may be conducted using an alternative method specified and approved by the North 34 Carolina Criminal Justice Education and Training Standards Commission. Any alternative 35 method shall be carefully structured to achieve neutral administration and to prevent the 36 administrator from knowing which photograph is being presented to the eyewitness during the 37 identification procedure. Alternative methods may include any of the following: 38 Automated computer programs that can automatically administer the photo (1) 39 lineup directly to an eyewitness and prevent the administrator from seeing 40 which photo the witness is viewing until after the procedure is completed. 41 A procedure in which photographs are placed in folders, randomly (2) 42 numbered, and shuffled and then presented to an eyewitness such that the 43 administrator cannot see or track which photograph is being presented to the 44 witness until after the procedure is completed. 45 Any other procedures that achieve neutral administration. (3) Show-Up Procedures. – A show-up conducted by State, county, and other local law 46
 - of the perpetrator is located in close proximity in time and place to the crime, or there is reasonable belief that the perpetrator has changed his or her

A show-up may only be conducted when a suspect matching the description

 3 (2) A show-up shall only be performed using a live suspect and shall not be
 - (2) A show-up shall only be performed using a live suspect and shall not be conducted with a photograph.
 - (3) Investigators shall photograph a suspect at the time and place of the show-up to preserve a record of the appearance of the suspect at the time of the show-up procedure.
 - (c2) The North Carolina Criminal Justice Education and Training Standards Commission shall develop a policy regarding standard procedures for the conduct of show-ups in accordance with this section. The policy shall apply to all law enforcement agencies and shall address all of the following, in addition to the provisions of this section:
 - (1) Standard instructions for eyewitnesses.
 - (2) Confidence statements by the eyewitness, including information related to the eyewitness' vision, the circumstances of the events witnessed, and communications with other eyewitnesses, if any.
 - (3) Training of law enforcement officers specific to conducting show-ups.
 - (4) Any other matters deemed appropriate by the Commission.
 - (d) Remedies. All of the following shall be available as consequences of compliance or noncompliance with the requirements of this section:
 - (1) Failure to comply with any of the requirements of this section shall be considered by the court in adjudicating motions to suppress eyewitness identification.
 - (2) Failure to comply with any of the requirements of this section shall be admissible in support of claims of eyewitness misidentification, as long as such evidence is otherwise admissible.
 - (3) When evidence of compliance or noncompliance with the requirements of this section has been presented at trial, the jury shall be instructed that it may consider credible evidence of compliance or noncompliance to determine the reliability of eyewitness identifications.
 - (e) Nothing in this section shall be construed to require a law enforcement officer while acting in his or her official capacity to be required to participate in a lineup or show-up as an eyewitness."

SECTION 2. G.S. 15A-284.53 reads as rewritten:

"§ 15A-284.53. Training of law enforcement officers.

Pursuant to its authority under G.S. 17C-6 and G.S. 17E-4, the North Carolina Criminal Justice Education and Training Standards Commission and the North Carolina Sheriffs' Education and Training Standards Commission, in consultation with the Department of Justice, shall create educational materials and conduct training programs on how to conduct lineups and show-ups in compliance with this Article."

SECTION 3. The standards to be adopted by the North Carolina Criminal Justice and Training Standards Commissions, as enacted in G.S. 15A-284.52(c2) in Section 1 of this act, shall be adopted on or before August 1, 2016, and shall be applicable to all law enforcement on August 1, 2016. The remainder of this act becomes effective December 1, 2015, and applies to eyewitness identifications and show-ups conducted on or after that date.
