12		a.	Teaches that abstinence from sexual activity outside of marriage is		
13			the expected standard for all school-age children.		
14		b.	Presents techniques and strategies to deal with peer pressure and		
15			offering positive reinforcement.		
16		c.	Presents reasons, skills, and strategies for remaining or becoming		
17			abstinent from sexual activity.		
18		d.	Teaches that abstinence from sexual activity is the only certain		
19			means of avoiding out-of-wedlock pregnancy, sexually transmitted		
20			diseases when transmitted through sexual contact, including		
21			HIV/AIDS, and other associated health and emotional problems.		
22		e.	Teaches that a mutually faithful monogamous heterosexual		
23			relationship in the context of marriage is the best lifelong means of		
24			avoiding sexually transmitted diseases, including HIV/AIDS.		
25		f.	Teaches the positive benefits of abstinence until marriage and the		
26			risks of premarital sexual activity.		
27		g.	Provides opportunities that allow for interaction between the parent		
28			or legal guardian and the student.		
29		h.	Provides factually accurate biological or pathological information		
30			that is related to the human reproductive system.

SECT	<b>TON 2.</b> G.S. 115C-81(e1)(4a) reads as rewritten:
"(4a)	Each local school administrative unit shall also include as part of the
	instruction required under subdivision (4) of this subsection the following
	instruction:
	a. Teaches about sexually transmitted diseases. Instruction shall include
	how sexually transmitted diseases are and are not transmitted, the
	effectiveness and safety of all federal Food and Drug Administration
	(FDA)-approved methods of reducing the risk of contracting sexually
	transmitted diseases, and information on local resources for testing
	and medical care for sexually transmitted diseases. Instruction shall
	include the rates of infection among pre-teen and teens of each
	known sexually transmitted disease and the effects of contracting
	each sexually transmitted disease. In particular, the instruction shall
	include information about the effects of contracting the Human
	Papilloma Virus, including sterility and cervical cancer.
	b. Teaches about the effectiveness and safety of all FDA-approved
	contraceptive methods in preventing pregnancy.pregnancy, except
	for drugs such as those marketed under the name "Preven" or "Plan
	<u>B" or any "equivalent drug product" as defined in G.S. 90-85.27(1)</u>
	that may cause spontaneous abortions.
	c. Teaches awareness of sexual assault, sexual abuse, and risk
	reduction. The instruction and materials shall:
	1. Focus on healthy relationships.
	2. Teach students what constitutes sexual assault and sexual
	abuse, the causes of those behaviors, and risk reduction.
	3. Inform students about resources and reporting procedures if
	<ul><li>they experience sexual assault or sexual abuse.</li><li>4. Examine common misconceptions and stereotypes about</li></ul>
	sexual assault and sexual abuse.
	Materials used in this instruction shall be age appropriate for use with
	students. Information conveyed during the instruction shall be objective and
	based upon scientific research that is peer reviewed and accepted by
	professionals and credentialed experts in the field of sexual health education.
	Each local board of education shall adopt a policy and provide a mechanism
	to allow a parent or a guardian to withdraw his or her child from instruction
	required under this subdivision."
