A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

AN ACT TO INCREASE THE PENALTY FOR A SECOND OR SUBSEQUENT ACT OFCRIMINAL CONTEMPT.

4 The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:

SECTION 1. G.S. 5A-12(a) reads as rewritten:

6 "(a) A person who commits <u>an initial act of criminal contempt</u>, whether direct or 7 indirect, is subject to censure, imprisonment up to 30 days, fine not to exceed five hundred 8 dollars (\$500.00), or any combination of the three, <u>and for each subsequent and additional act</u> 9 <u>of criminal contempt</u>, whether direct or indirect, is subject to censure, imprisonment up to 90 10 <u>days</u>, fine not to exceed one thousand dollars (\$1,000), or any combination of the three for the 11 additional act of criminal contempt, except that:

- 12(1)A person who commits a contempt described in G.S. 5A-11(8) is subject to13censure, imprisonment not to exceed 6 months, fine not to exceed five14hundred dollars (\$500.00), or any combination of the three;
- 15(2)A person who has not been arrested who fails to comply with a16nontestimonial identification order, issued pursuant to Article 14 of Chapter1715A of the General Statutes is subject to censure, imprisonment not to18exceed 90 days, fine not to exceed five hundred dollars (\$500.00), or any19combination of the three; and
- 20(3)A person who commits criminal contempt by failing to comply with an order21to pay child support is subject to censure, imprisonment up to 30 days, fine22not to exceed five hundred dollars (\$500.00), or any combination of the23three. However, a sentence of imprisonment up to 120 days may be imposed24for a single act of criminal contempt resulting from the failure to pay child25support, provided the sentence is suspended upon conditions reasonably26related to the contemnor's payment of child support."
- 27 **SECTION 2.** This act becomes effective December 1, 2015, and applies to 28 offenses committed on or after that date.
