8	(d) Reports The Committee shall report its analysis and any findings and			
9	recommendations to the General Assembly by September 15 of each year.			
0	(e) Organization. – The President Pro Tempore of the Senate and the Speaker of the			
1	House of Representatives shall each designate a cochair of the Committee. The Committee			
2	shall meet at least once a quarter upon the joint call of the cochairs. A quorum of the			
3	Committee is seven members. No action may be taken except by a majority vote at a meeting at			
4	which a quorum is present.			
5	(f) Funding. – From funds available to the General Assembly, the Legislative Services			
5	Commission shall allocate monies to fund the work of the Committee. Members of the			
7	Committee shall receive subsistence and travel expenses as provided in G.S. 120-3.1 and			
3	G.S. 138-5.			
9	(g) Staff The Legislative Services Commission, through the Legislative Services			
0	Officer, shall assign professional staff to assist the Committee in its work. Upon the direction			
1	of the Legislative Services Commission, the Director of Legislative Assistants of the Senate			
2	and of the House of Representatives shall assign clerical staff to the Committee. The expenses			
3	for clerical employees shall be borne by the Committee."			
4	SECTION 3. There is appropriated from the General Fund to the Department of			
5	Health and Human Services, Division of Social Services, the sum of one million three hundred			
5	thousand dollars (\$1,300,000) for the 2015-2016 fiscal year and the sum of one million seven			
7	hundred fifty thousand dollars (\$1,750,000) for the 2016-2017 fiscal year to be used solely for			
8	the Foster Care Transitional Living Initiative Fund for services provided by Youth Villages as			
9	established by G.S. 131D-10.9G, enacted under Section 1 of this act.			
)	SECTION 4. This act is effective when it becomes law.			
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
