4	MEMORIAL LIFETIME SPORTSMAN LICENSE, FOR SURVIVING FAMILY					
5	MEMBERS OF WILDLIFE ENFORCEMENT OFFICERS KILLED IN THE LINE OF					
6	DUTY.					
7	Whereas, Deputy Game Warden John W. Hollowell lost his life in the line of duty on					
8	August 30, 1930; and					
9	Whereas, Game Warden Joseph D. Whitaker lost his life in the line of duty on					
10	November 15, 1936; and					
11	Whereas, District Game and Fish Protector W. I. Wright, Jr., lost his life in the line					
12	of duty on October 31, 1948; and					
13	Whereas, Wildlife Agent Grover C. Quinn, Jr., lost his life in the line of duty on					
14	March 25, 1949; and					
15	Whereas, Wildlife Protector William G. Holler lost his life in the line of duty on					
16	October 19, 1951; and					
17	Whereas, Wildlife Protector Amos M. Bordeaux lost his life in the line of duty on					
18	April 10, 1962; and					
19	Whereas, Wildlife Enforcement Officer John O. Edwards lost his life in the line of					
20	duty on August 3, 1963; and					
21	Whereas, Wildlife Refuge Manager Dewey H. McCall lost his life in the line of duty					
22	on September 5, 1971; and					
23	Whereas, Wildlife Enforcement Area Leader Troy M. Sigmon lost his life in the line					
24	of duty on September 1, 1978; and					
25	Whereas, Wildlife Enforcement Officer Lloyd O. Mayse lost his life in the line of					
26	duty on November 27, 1980; and					
27	Whereas, Wildlife Enforcement Officer William A. Williamson lost his life in the line					
28	of duty on December 4, 1985; and					
29	Whereas, thousands of men and women proudly perform their duties as wildlife					
30	enforcement officers throughout the United States and the State of North Carolina; and					
31	Whereas, Section 5 of Article XIV of the North Carolina Constitution declares it to					
32	be the policy of this State to conserve and protect its lands and waters for the benefit of all its					
33	citizenry; and					



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1 Whereas, Section 5 of Article XIV of the North Carolina Constitution also declares it 2 to be the proper function of the State to preserve as a part of the common heritage of this State 3 its forests, wetlands, estuaries, beaches, historical sites, open lands, and places of beauty; and

Whereas, G.S. 143B-135.42 provides that the State of North Carolina offers unique archaeological, geological, biological, scenic, and recreational resources and finds that these resources are part of the heritage of the people of this State and should be preserved and managed by the people for their use and for the use of their visitors and descendants; and

8 Whereas, the Wildlife Enforcement Officers of the Wildlife Resources Commission 9 are dedicated public servants and work tirelessly to uphold these provisions of the State's 10 Constitution and General Statutes, fulfill their duties to preserve our State's spectacular natural 11 resources, and assure the safety of the State's citizenry in enjoying these resources; and

12 Whereas, the origins of the Wildlife Resource Commission may be traced to 1947, 13 when the General Assembly established the agency to conserve and sustain the State's wildlife 14 and inland fish resources; and

Whereas, the Wildlife Enforcement Officers of the Wildlife Resources Commission
 have responsibility for enforcement of the inland fishing, hunting, trapping, and boating laws
 throughout the State; and

18 Whereas, many Wildlife Enforcement Officers have been injured in the line of duty,19 and eleven Wildlife Enforcement Officers have lost their lives in the line of duty; and

Whereas, it is fitting to honor and commend the exemplary group of men and women who have served and continue to serve our State and nation and routinely endure dangerous and difficult conditions in the performance of their duties and those that have been injured and lost in the line of duty through service to their State and nation; Now, therefore,

24 The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:

SECTION 1. G.S. 113-270.1D reads as rewritten:

26 "§ 113-270.1D. Sportsman licenses.

(a) Annual Sportsman License – \$50.00. This license shall be issued only to an individual
resident of the State and entitles the licensee to take all wild animals and wild birds, including
waterfowl, by all lawful methods in all open seasons, including the use of game lands, and to fish
with hook and line for all fish in all inland and joint fishing waters, including public mountain
trout waters. An annual sportsman license issued under this subsection does not entitle the
licensee to engage in recreational fishing in coastal fishing waters that are not joint fishing waters.

33 Lifetime Sportsman Licenses. Except as provided in subdivision (7) of this (b) 34 subsection, lifetime sportsman licenses are valid for the lifetime of the licensees. Lifetime 35 sportsman licenses entitle the licensees to take all wild animals and wild birds by all lawful 36 methods in all open seasons, including the use of game lands, and to fish with hook and line for 37 all fish in all inland and joint fishing waters, including public mountain trout waters. A lifetime 38 sportsman license issued under this subsection does not entitle the licensee to engage in 39 recreational fishing in coastal fishing waters that are not joint fishing waters. Lifetime sportsman 40 licenses issued by the Wildlife Resources Commission are:

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43 44 (1) Infant Lifetime Sportsman License – \$200.00. This license shall be issued only to an individual under one year of age.

- (2) Youth Lifetime Sportsman License \$350.00. This license shall be issued only to an individual under 12 years of age.
- 45(3)Adult Resident Lifetime Sportsman License \$500.00. This license shall be46issued only to an individual resident of the State who is 12 years of age or47older but younger than 70 years of age.

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Any individual who kills any species of big game must report the kill to the Wildlife 1 (c) 2 Resources Commission. The Commission may by rule prescribe the method of making the report, 3 prescribe its contents, and require positive identification of the carcass of the kill, by tagging or 4 otherwise. The Wildlife Resources Commission may administratively provide for the annual 5 issuance of big game tags or other identification for big game authorized by this section to holders 6 of lifetime sportsman licenses and lifetime comprehensive hunting licenses.

7 Any individual who possesses any of the lifetime sportsman licenses established by (d) 8 G.S. 113-270.1D(b) may engage in specially regulated activities without the licenses required by 9 subdivisions (1), (2), (3), and (5) of subsection (b) of this section. Any individual possessing an annual sportsman license established by G.S. 113-270.1D(a) or a lifetime or annual 10 11 comprehensive hunting license established by G.S.113-270.2(c)(2) or (5) may engage in 12 specially regulated activities without the licenses required by subdivisions (1), (3), and (5) of 13 subsection (b) of this section.

14 (e) When the Wildlife Resources Commission establishes a primitive weapons season 15 pursuant to G.S. 113-291.2(a), all of the combination hunting and fishing licenses established in G.S.113-270.1C, sportsman licenses established in G.S. 113-270.1D, and hunting licenses 16 17 established in G.S. 113-270.2(c)(1), (2), (3), (5), and (6) entitle the holder to participate. For 18 purposes of this section, "primitive weapons" include bow and arrow, muzzle-loading firearm, 19 and any other primitive weapon specified in the rules of the Wildlife Resources Commission." 20

SECTION 3. G.S. 113-272.3 reads as rewritten:

"§ 113-272.3. Special provisions respecting fishing licenses; grabbling; taking bait fish; use of landing nets; lifetime licenses issued from Wildlife Resources Commission headquarters; personalized lifetime sportsman combination licenses.

24 (a) The Wildlife Resources Commission by rule may define the meaning of "hook and 25 line" and "special device" as applied to fishing techniques. Any technique of fishing that may be 26 lawfully authorized which employs neither the use of any special device nor hook and line must 27 be pursued under the appropriate hook-and-line fishing license.

28 (b) In accordance with established fishing customs and the orderly conservation of 29 wildlife resources, the Wildlife Resources Commission may by rule provide for use of nets or 30 other special devices which it may authorize as an incident to hook-and-line fishing or for 31 procuring bait fish without requiring a special device license. In this instance, however, the 32 individual fishing must meet applicable hook-and-line license requirements.

33 Lifetime licenses are issued from the Wildlife Resources Commission headquarters. (c) 34 Each application for an Infant Lifetime Sportsman or Youth Lifetime Sportsman License must 35 be accompanied by a certified copy of the birth certificate, adoption order containing the date of 36 birth, or other proof of age satisfactory to the Commission, of the individual to be named as the 37 licensee. Each application for a Fallen Wildlife Officers Memorial Lifetime Sportsman License 38 shall be accompanied by proof of relationship to the fallen wildlife officer, satisfactory to the 39 Wildlife Resources Commission, of the individual to be named as the licensee.

40 In issuing lifetime licenses, the Wildlife Resources Commission is authorized to adopt (d) 41 rules to establish a personalized series for certain license types and to charge a five dollar (\$5.00) 42 administrative fee, to be deposited in the Wildlife Fund, to defray the cost of issuance of the 43 personalized license. The fee shall not be assessed for a personalized Fallen Wildlife Officers Memorial Lifetime Sportsman License as enacted under G.S. 113-270.1D(b)(9)." 44

45 **SECTION 4.** The Wildlife Resources Commission may adopt rules to implement 46 this act.

47 **SECTION 5.** Five thousand dollars (\$5,000) in nonrecurring funds for the 48 2018-2019 fiscal year is appropriated to the Wildlife Resources Commission to design and 49 develop the Fallen Wildlife Officers Memorial Lifetime Sportsman License and to implement 50 the provisions of this act.

51 **SECTION 6.** The provisions of G.S. 143C-5-2 do not apply to this act.

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1 **SECTION 7.** Sections 1, 2, and 3 of this act become effective July 1, 2019. The 2 remainder of this act is effective when it becomes law.
