1 A BILL TO BE ENTITLED 2 AN ACT, CONSISTENT WITH HOUSE BILL 966 OF THE 2019 REGULAR SESSION, TO 3 ENACT A BUDGET FOR THE DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION, TO MAKE ADDITIONAL APPROPRIATIONS, TRANSFERS, AND REDUCTIONS TO THE 4 5 DEPARTMENT, AND TO MAKE OTHER MODIFICATIONS RELATED TO THE 6 OPERATIONS OF THE DEPARTMENT. 7 The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts: 8 9 PART I. APPROPRIATIONS FOR DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION 10 11 **INTRODUCTION** 12 **SECTION 1.1.** The appropriations made in this act are for maximum amounts 13 necessary to provide the services and accomplish the purposes described in the budget for the 14 Department of Transportation in accordance with the State Budget Act. Savings shall be effected 15 where the total amounts appropriated are not required to perform these services and accomplish these purposes, and the savings shall revert to the appropriate fund at the end of each fiscal year, 16 17 except as otherwise provided by law. 18 19 DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION BUDGET APPROPRIATIONS 20 SECTION 1.2.(a) State funds, as defined in G.S. 143C-1-1(d)(25), are appropriated 21 for each year of the 2019-2021 fiscal biennium, as follows: 22 All budget codes listed in the Governor's Recommended Budget and in the (1)23 Budget Support Document for the Department of Transportation for the 24 2019-2021 fiscal biennium, submitted pursuant to G.S. 143C-3-5, are 25 appropriated up to the amounts specified, as adjusted by the General 26 Assembly in this act. 27 (2)Departmental receipts up to the amounts needed to implement the legislatively 28 mandated salary increases and employee benefit increases provided in this act 29 for each year of the 2019-2021 fiscal biennium. 30 **SECTION 1.2.(b)** Receipts collected in a fiscal year in excess of the amounts appropriated by this section shall remain unexpended and unencumbered until appropriated by 31 32 the General Assembly, unless the expenditure of overrealized receipts in the fiscal year in which 33 the receipts were collected is authorized by G.S. 143C-6-4. Overrealized receipts are

appropriated in the amounts necessary to implement this subsection.

35 **SECTION 1.2.(c)** Funds may be expended only for the specified programs, 36 purposes, objects, and line items or as otherwise authorized by the General Assembly.



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#### OTHER RECEIPTS FROM PENDING AWARD GRANTS

3 **SECTION 1.3.(a)** Notwithstanding G.S. 143C-6-4, the Department of 4 Transportation may, with approval of the Director of the Budget, spend funds received from 5 grants awarded subsequent to the enactment of this act for grant awards that are for less than two 6 million five hundred thousand dollars (\$2,500,000), do not require State matching funds, and will 7 not be used for a capital project. The Department of Transportation shall report to the Joint 8 Legislative Commission on Governmental Operations within 30 days of receipt of such funds.

9 The Department of Transportation may spend all other funds from grants awarded 10 after the enactment of this act only with approval of the Director of the Budget and after 11 consultation with the Joint Legislative Commission on Governmental Operations.

12 **SECTION 1.3.(b)** The Office of State Budget and Management shall work with the 13 Department of Transportation to budget grant awards according to the annual program needs and 14 within the parameters of the respective granting entities. Depending on the nature of the award, 15 additional State personnel may be employed on a time-limited basis. Funds received from such 16 grants are hereby appropriated and shall be incorporated into the authorized budget of the 17 Department of Transportation.

18 **SECTION 1.3.(c)** Notwithstanding the provisions of this section, the Department of 19 Transportation may not accept a grant not anticipated in this act if acceptance of the grant would 20 obligate the State to make future expenditures relating to the program receiving the grant or 21 would otherwise result in a financial obligation as a consequence of accepting the grant funds.

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#### ESTABLISHING OR INCREASING FEES

SECTION 1.4.(a) Notwithstanding G.S. 12-3.1, the Department of Transportation is not required to consult with the Joint Legislative Commission on Governmental Operations prior to establishing or increasing a fee to the level authorized or anticipated in this act.

SECTION 1.4.(b) Notwithstanding G.S. 150B-21.1A(a), the Department of Transportation may adopt an emergency rule in accordance with G.S. 150B-21.1A to establish or increase a fee as authorized by this act if the adoption of a rule would otherwise be required under Article 2A of Chapter 150B of the General Statutes.

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Commission Contracts for Issuance of Plates and Certificates. - All registration 1 "(h) 2 plates, registration certificates, and certificates of title issued by the Division, outside of those 3 issued from the office of the Division located in Wake, Cumberland, or Mecklenburg Counties 4 and those issued and handled through the United States mail, shall be issued insofar as practicable 5 and possible through commission contracts entered into by the Division for the issuance of the plates and certificates in localities throughout North Carolina, including military installations 6 7 within this State, with persons, firms, corporations or governmental subdivisions of the State of 8 North Carolina. The Division shall make a reasonable effort in every locality, except as noted 9 above, to enter into a commission contract for the issuance of the plates and certificates and a 10 record of these efforts shall be maintained in the Division. In the event the Division is 11 unsuccessful in making commission contracts, it shall issue the plates and certificates through the regular employees of the Division. Whenever registration plates, registration certificates, and 12 13 certificates of title are issued by the Division through commission contract arrangements, the 14 Division shall provide proper supervision of the distribution. Nothing contained in this subsection allows or permits the operation of fewer outlets in any county in this State than are now being 15 16 operated.

The terms of a commission contract entered under this subsection shall specify the duration of the contract and either include or incorporate by reference standards by which the Division may supervise and evaluate the performance of the commission contractor. The duration of an initial commission contract may not exceed eight years and the duration of a renewal commission contract may not exceed two years. The Division may award monetary performance bonuses, not to exceed an aggregate total of ninety thousand dollars (\$90,000) annually, to commission contractors based on their performance.

#### PORTS/RAISING POWER LINES OVER CAPE FEAR RIVER

SECTION 4.24.(a) The nonrecurring funds appropriated in this act to the NC Ports Authority for the 2019-2020 fiscal year to raise the power lines over the Cape Fear River near Wilmington shall only be used for this purpose. The Department of Transportation shall only allocate these funds to the NC Ports Authority on a reimbursement basis after the NC Ports Authority has provided a report that outlines the costs incurred in raising the power lines.

SECTION 4.24.(b) The NC Ports Authority shall submit a status report on the use of these funds to the Joint Legislative Transportation Oversight Committee by January 1, 2020, and quarterly thereafter until the project is completed. The status report shall include: contract status, scope of work, work progress, and anticipated completion date.

#### STATE BUDGET ACT APPLIES

33 **SECTION 5.1.(a)** The provisions of the State Budget Act, Chapter 143C of the 34 General Statutes, are reenacted and shall remain in full force and effect and are incorporated in 35 this act by reference.

36 **SECTION 5.1.(b)** The budget enacted by the General Assembly is for the 37 maintenance of the Department of Transportation for the 2019-2021 biennial budget as provided 38 in G.S. 143C-3-5. This budget includes the appropriations of State funds as defined in 39 G.S. 143C-1-1(d)(25).

The Director of the Budget submitted a recommended budget to the General Assembly in the Governor's Recommended Budget and in the Budget Support Document for the Department of Transportation for the 2019-2021 fiscal biennium, dated March 2019. The adjustments to the recommended budget for the Department of Transportation made by the General Assembly are set out in this act.

45 **SECTION 5.1.(c)** The budget enacted by the General Assembly for the Department 46 of Transportation shall also be interpreted in accordance with the special provisions in this act 47 and other appropriate legislation. In the event that there is a conflict between the line-item budget 48 certified by the Director of the Budget for the Department of Transportation and the budget 49 enacted by the General Assembly for the Department of Transportation, the budget enacted by 50 the General Assembly shall prevail. 51
