2 AN ACT TO REOUIRE USE OF AUTOMATED EXTERNAL DEFIBRILLATORS AND 3 BLEEDING CONTROL AS PART OF REQUIRED FIRST AID TRAINING FOR PUBLIC 4 SCHOOL STUDENTS, TO REQUIRE INSTRUCTION IN FIRST AID AND EMERGENCY CARE EDUCATION IN HIGH SCHOOL, TO REQUIRE THAT FIRST 5 6 AID TRAINING BE OFFERED TO ALL SCHOOL EMPLOYEES, TO REQUIRE THE PLACEMENT OF TRAUMA KITS IN PUBLIC SCHOOLS, TO REQUIRE A 7 PRESENTATION ON THE USE AND LOCATION OF TRAUMA KITS DURING 8 9 SCHOOL SAFETY EXERCISES, TO REQUIRE TRAINING OF SCHOOL PERSONNEL WHO ARE REASONABLY EXPECTED TO USE TRAUMA KITS, TO PROVIDE 10 11 REQUIREMENTS CONCERNING THE MAINTENANCE OF TRAUMA KITS, AND TO 12 PROVIDE CERTAIN IMMUNITY FROM CIVIL LIABILITY RELATED TO TRAUMA 13 KITS.

The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:

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PART I. FIRST AID TRAINING FOR ALL STUDENTS

SECTION 1.(a) Article 8 of Chapter 115C of the General Statutes is amended by adding a new section to read:

"§ 115C-81.22. First aid and emergency care education.

- (a) <u>Instruction shall be provided in first aid and emergency care education from kindergarten through grade 12. First aid and emergency care shall include, but is not limited to, the teaching of the following:</u>
 - (1) Cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR).
 - (2) Heimlich maneuver.
 - (3) Use of an automated external defibrillator, when equipment is available.
 - (4) Beginning in grade six, bleeding control.
- (b) Instruction in cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) and the Heimlich maneuver shall be given using hands-on training with mannequins so that students pass a test approved by the American Heart Association or the American Red Cross. For the purposes of this subsection, schools shall do all of the following:
 - (1) Use an instructional program developed by the American Heart Association, the American Red Cross, or other nationally recognized programs that is based on the most current national evidence-based emergency cardiovascular care guidelines for CPR.

(SRMP), including a presentation on 24 the location and use of any trauma kits placed in the school. The drill shall include a practice 25 school lockdown due to an intruder on school grounds. Each school is encouraged to hold a 26 tabletop exercise and drill for multiple hazards included in its SRMP. Schools are strongly 27 encouraged to include local law enforcement agencies and emergency management agencies in 28 their tabletop exercises and drills. The purpose of the tabletop exercises and drills shall be to 29 permit participants to (i) discuss simulated emergency situations in a low-stress environment, (ii) 30 clarify their roles and responsibilities and the overall logistics of dealing with an emergency, and (iii) identify areas in which the SRMP needs to be modified." 31 32 **SECTION 2.(g)** Article 8C of Chapter 115C of the General Statutes is amended by 33 inserting a new section to read: 34 "§ 115C-105.52A. Trauma kits. 35 Definitions. – For purposes of this section, the following definitions shall apply: (a) 36 Trauma kit. – A first aid response kit that is stored in a school in a public (1) 37 school unit and contains (i) at least all of the items listed in subsection (b) of 38 this section and (ii) any, all, or none of the items listed in subsection (c) of this 39 section. 40 Public school unit. – Any of the following: **(2)** 41 A local school administrative unit. a. 42 A charter school. b. 43 A regional school. <u>c.</u> 44 A school providing elementary or secondary instruction operated by d. one of the following: 45 The State Board of Education, including schools operated 46 1. 47 under Articles 7A and 9C of this Chapter. 48 The University of North Carolina, including schools operated <u>2.</u> under Articles 4, 29, and 29A of Chapter 116 of the General 49 50 Statutes. Required contents. – A trauma kit shall contain at least all of the following items: 51 (b)

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- 1 <u>f. A comment forum with 24-hour discussion monitoring in which instructors participate.</u>
 - Curriculum shall adhere to best practices for active shooter preparedness and response as provided by the Federal Bureau of Investigation, the Federal Commission on School Safety, and the United States Department of Homeland Security.
 - (3) Address the proper application of pressure to stop bleeding, the proper application of dressings and bandages, additional pressure techniques to control bleeding, and the proper application of tourniquets.
 - Incorporate any training modules for active shooter preparedness and response recommended by the Federal Bureau of Investigation, the Federal Commission on School Safety, and the United States Department of Homeland Security. Training modules for active shooter preparedness and response shall be led by persons who have completed the Active Shooter Threat Instructor Training Program provided by the United States Department of Homeland Security.
 - (f) Inventory. The principal or equivalent administrator of each school within a public school unit shall inspect every trauma kit in the school each year to ensure that materials, supplies, and equipment are not expired. The principal or equivalent administrator shall replace any expired materials, supplies, or equipment, as necessary.
 - Online usage tool; restocking. No later than January 1, 2020, the Department of Public Instruction shall create an online usage tool to permit principals or equivalent administrators within public school units to provide information on the use and contents of all trauma kits located in a school. After each use of a trauma kit, the principal or equivalent administrator shall replace any used materials, supplies, or equipment, as necessary, and inform the Department via the online usage tool of the date of the use, the reason for the use, and any components of the trauma kit that were replaced as a result. No later than August 1, 2021, and each year thereafter, the Department shall report the most up-to-date information provided via the online usage tool to the Joint Legislative Education Oversight Committee and the Fiscal Research Division.
 - (h) <u>Liability. No public school unit, nor its members, employees, designees, agents, or volunteers shall be liable in civil damages to any party for any act or omission related to the use of a trauma kit placed in a school in accordance with this section, unless that act or omission amounts to gross negligence, wanton conduct, or intentional wrongdoing."</u>

SECTION 2.(h) There is appropriated from the General Fund to the Department of Public Instruction for the 2019-2020 fiscal year the sum of ten million dollars (\$10,000,000) in nonrecurring funds to provide, in accordance with this section, (i) at least one trauma kit in each classroom of every school located in a public school unit, as defined in G.S. 115C-105.52A(a)(2), as enacted by this section, (ii) training in the use of trauma kits, and (iii) an online usage tool to track use of trauma kits in public schools.

SECTION 2.(i) This section becomes effective July 1, 2019, and applies beginning with the 2019-2020 school year.

PART III. EFFECTIVE DATE

SECTION 3. Except as otherwise provided, this act is effective when it becomes law and applies beginning with the 2019-2020 school year.

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
