2 AN ACT TO EXPAND THE INVESTIGATIVE AUTHORITY OF LOSS PREVENTION
3 WORKERS AND TO CLARIFY REQUIREMENTS AND DEFENSES FOR
4 PROSECUTION OF OBTAINING PROPERTY BY FALSE PRETENSES.

5 The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:

6 SECTION 1.(a) G.S. 74C-3 reads as rewritten:

7 "§ 74C-3. Private protective services profession defined.

8 ...

9 (b) "Private protective services" shall not include any of the following:

10 ...

11 (14) An employee of a security department of a private business or other employee
12 whose primary duty involves loss prevention or that conducts investigations
13 exclusively on matters internal to the business affairs of the ~~business-business~~
14 or related to the location, disposition, or recovery of lost or stolen property
15 reasonably believed to be owned by the business.

17 SECTION 1.(b) This section becomes effective October 1, 2019.

18 SECTION 2.(a) G.S. 14-100 is amended by adding a new subsection to read:

19 "(b1) In any prosecution for violation of this section, the State is not required to establish
20 that all of the acts constituting the crime occurred in this State or within a single city, county, or
21 local jurisdiction of this State, and it is no defense that not all of the acts constituting the crime
22 occurred in this State or within a single city, county, or local jurisdiction of this State."

23 SECTION 2.(b) This section becomes effective December 1, 2019, and applies to
24 offenses committed on or after that date. Prosecutions for offenses committed before the effective
25 date of this act are not abated by this act, and the statutes that would be applicable but for this act
26 remain applicable to those prosecutions.

27 SECTION 3. Except as otherwise provided, this act is effective when it becomes
28 law.
