Sponsors: Referred to: A BILL TO BE ENTITLED AN ACT TO PROVIDE THAT A COURT MAY CONSIDER POSTTRAUMATIC STRESS DISORDER AS A MITIGATING FACTOR WHEN SENTENCING A PERSON WHO IS A VETERAN. The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts: **SECTION 1.** G.S. 15A-1340.16(e) is amended by adding a new subdivision to read: Mitigating Factors. – The following are mitigating factors: "(e) (14a) The defendant has been diagnosed as suffering from posttraumatic stress disorder resulting from the defendant's military service and is undergoing professional treatment for that condition. As used in this section, "posttraumatic stress disorder" is defined in the same manner as in the Diagnostic and Statistical Manual of Mental Disorders, DSM-5, or subsequent editions published by the American Psychiatric Association, that occurred as a result of the defendant's service in one or more military combat zones. The defendant shall provide to the court documentary evidence that the defendant has done all of the following: Served in the Armed Forces of the United States in a combat zone, as <u>a.</u> the term is defined in Section 112 of the United States Internal
