SECT	TION 5.(a) The DPS Health Services Section	and the Office of State Human
Resources shall j	ointly study the salaries of all in-prison health s	services employees to determine
what adjustments	s are necessary to increase the salaries of new l	hires and existing employees of

SECT	(ION 5.(b) DPS shall establish a vacancy rate b	benchmark for each correctional
facility and shall	create a plan to reduce the vacancy rates. DPS sh	nall consider initiatives to reduce

(7) Streamlining and potentially eliminating duplicative or unnecessary steps in the hiring process.
SECTION 5.(c) DPS shall establish methods to measure the effectiveness of the
initiatives to reduce vacancy rates required in subsection (b) of this section and estimate the
budgetary impact and anticipated savings from DPS's reduced reliance on outside contracted
providers. By February 1, 2020, DPS shall submit its findings on salaries and vacancy rates,
including any proposed legislation and the need for assistance required from the Office of Human
Resources and the Office of Rural Health in the Department of Health and Human Services to
accomplish the objectives outlined in subsections (a) and (b) of this section to the Joint
Legislative Oversight Committee on Justice and Public Safety.
SECTION 6.(a) The DPS Health Services Section shall establish performance
measures for its current telemedicine pilot program to inform a business case for potential
expansion of the pilot program. As part of the business case, the Health Services Section shall
quantify savings achieved from telemedicine visits compared to in-person visits from medical
staff by collecting information as to which procedures, such as intake screenings, sick calls,
triage, or chronic disease management, are most conducive to being treated through telemedicine.
The Health Services Section shall propose an implementation plan to expand the use of
telemedicine with accompanying estimated cost savings, which at a minimum shall include
prison facilities that rely extensively on community hospital facilities.
SECTION 6.(b) By April 1, 2020, and annually thereafter, the DPS Health Services
Section shall report on its business case for telemedicine, including expenditures and savings, to
the Joint Legislative Oversight Committee on Justice and Public Safety. DPS Health Services
Section shall not expand the pilot program until the results of the current pilot program can be
demonstrated and reported to the General Assembly.
SECTION 7. This act becomes effective July 1, 2019.
