1 A BILL TO BE ENTITLED
2 AN ACT TO ESTABLISH THE NORTH CAROLINA GAMING COMMISSION.
3 The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:
4 **SECTION 1.(a)** Recodification; Name Change; Technical and Conforming
5 Changes. – The Revisor of Statutes shall recodify Part 2 of Article 37 of Chapter 14 of the General
6 Statutes, Bingo and Raffles, Article 68 of Chapter 143 of the General Statutes, Regulation of
7 Boxing, and Chapter 18C of the General Statutes, North Carolina State Lottery, into a new
8 Chapter 18E of the General Statutes to be entitled "Gaming," as enacted by Section 2 of this act.
9 The Revisor may also recodify into the new Chapter 18E of the General Statutes other existing
10 statutory laws relating to gaming that are located elsewhere in the General Statutes as the Revisor
11 deems appropriate. The new Chapter 18E of the General Statutes shall have the following
12 structure:

30 **SECTION 1.(b)** When recodifying pursuant to this section, the Revisor is authorized
31 to change all references to the North Carolina State Lottery Commission, State Bureau of
32 Investigation, and Alcohol Law Enforcement Branch of the Department of Public Safety, as
33 appropriate, to instead be references to the North Carolina Gaming Commission. The Revisor
34 may separate subsections of existing statutory sections into new sections and, when necessary to
35 organize relevant law into its proper place in Chapter 18E of the General Statutes, as amended



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1 by this act, may rearrange sentences that currently appear within subsections. The Revisor may
2 modify statutory citations throughout the General Statutes, as appropriate, and may modify any
3 references to statutory divisions, such as "Chapter," "Subchapter," "Article," "Part," "section,"
4 and "subsection"; adjust the order of lists of multiple statutes to maintain statutory order; correct
5 terms and conform names and titles changed by this act; eliminate duplicative references to the
6 Lottery Commission, State Bureau of Investigation, or Alcohol Law Enforcement Branch of the
7 Department of Public Safety that result from the changes authorized by this section; and make
8 conforming changes to catch lines and references to catch lines. The Revisor may also adjust
9 subject and verb agreement and the placement of conjunctions. The Revisor shall consult with
10 the North Carolina State Lottery Commission, State Bureau of Investigation, and Alcohol Law
11 Enforcement Branch of the Department of Public Safety on this recodification.

12 **SECTION 2.** The General Statutes are amended by adding a new Chapter to read:

13 **"Chapter 18E.**

14 **"Gaming.**

15 **"Article 1.**

16 **"Gaming Commission.**

17 **"§ 18E-100. Gaming Commission established.**

18 There is created the North Carolina Gaming Commission to establish and oversee the
19 operation of gaming in this State. The Commission shall be located in the Department of
20 Commerce for budgetary purposes only; otherwise, the Commission shall be an independent,
21 self-supporting, and revenue-raising agency of the State. The Commission shall reimburse other
22 governmental entities that provide services to the Commission.

23 **"§ 18E-101.** Reserved.

24 **"§ 18E-102. Definitions.**

25 As used in this Chapter, unless the context requires otherwise:

26 (1) "Commission" means the North Carolina Gaming Commission.

27 (2) "Commissioner" means a member of the Commission.

28 (3) "Director" means the person selected by the Commission to be the chief
29 administrator of the North Carolina Gaming Commission.

30 (4) "Person" means any natural person or corporation, limited liability company,
31 trust, association, partnership, joint venture, subsidiary, or other business
32 entity.

33 **"§§ 18E-103 through 18E-111.** Reserved.

34 **"§ 18E-112. Commission membership; appointment; selection of chair; vacancies;**
35 **removal; meetings; compensation.**

36 (a) The Commission shall consist of nine members, five of whom shall be appointed by
37 the Governor, two of whom shall be appointed by the General Assembly upon the
38 recommendation of the President Pro Tempore of the Senate, and two of whom shall be appointed
39 by the General Assembly upon the recommendation of the Speaker of the House of
40 Representatives. Commissioners may be removed by the appointing authority for cause.

41 (b) The Governor shall select the chair of the Commission from among its membership,
42 who shall serve at the pleasure of the Governor.

43 (c) Of the initial appointees of the Governor, two members shall serve a term of one year,
44 two members shall serve a term of two years, and one member shall serve a term of three years.
45 All succeeding appointments shall be for terms of four years. Members shall not serve for more
46 than two successive terms.

47 (d) Vacancies shall be filled by the appointing authority for the unexpired portion of the
48 term in which that vacancy occurs.

49 (e) The Commission shall meet at least quarterly upon the call of the chair. A majority of
50 the total membership of the Commission shall constitute a quorum.

1 (f) Members of the Commission shall receive per diem, subsistence, and travel as
2 provided in G.S. 138-5 and G.S. 138-6.

3 **"§ 18A-113. Qualifications of Commissioners.**

4 (a) Of the members of the Commission, the appointing authorities shall ensure that:

5 (1) At least one member shall have a minimum of five years' experience in law
6 enforcement. Notwithstanding subsection (c) of this section, a member
7 -serving in this slot may be an elected law enforcement official.

8 (2) At least one member shall be a certified public accountant.

9 (3) At least one member shall have retail lottery sales experience as an owner or
10 manager.

11 (4) At least one member shall have experience in treating gambling addiction.

12 (5) At least one member shall be an advocate for players.

13 (b) In making appointments to the Commission, the composition of the State with regard
14 to geographic representation and gender, ethnic, racial, and age composition shall be considered.

15 (c) A member of the Commission may not hold an elective office or be a candidate for
16 an elective office. If any Commissioner takes any of the following actions, that Commissioner
17 vacates office as a member of the Commission and the vacancy shall be filled as provided by
18 G.S. 18E-112:

19 (1) Files a notice of candidacy under G.S. 163A-972 through G.S. 163A-978 or a
20 petition under G.S. 163A-980.

21 (2) Is nominated to fill a vacancy among party nominees under G.S. 163A-987 or
22 G.S. 163A-988.

23 (3) Files a petition as an unaffiliated candidate under G.S. 163A-1005.

24 (4) Files a declaration of intent as a write-in candidate under G.S. 163A-1006.

25 (5) Is nominated by party convention under G.S. 163A-953.

26 (d) No legislator, as defined in G.S. 163A-152 and G.S. 163A-254, or former legislator
27 may serve on the Commission while in office or within 12 months after leaving office.

28 **"§ 18E-114. Reserved.**

29 **"§ 18E-115. Meetings; records.**

30 (a) Meetings of the Commission shall be subject to Article 33C of Chapter 143 of the
31 General Statutes. A majority of the total membership of the Commission shall constitute a
32 quorum. No action may be taken except by a majority vote at a meeting at which a quorum is
33 present.

34 (b) Records. – Except as provided in this Chapter, records of the Commission shall be
35 open and available to the public in accordance with Chapter 132 of the General Statutes.
36 Personnel records of the Commission are subject to Article 7 of Chapter 126 of the General
37 Statutes.

38 **"§ 18E-116. Reserved.**

39 **"§ 18E-117. Powers and duties of the Commission.**

40 (a) The Commission shall have the following powers and duties:

41 (1) To regulate and oversee gaming, as authorized by the General Assembly.

42 (2) To prescribe the nature of gaming advertising which shall comply with the
43 following:

44 a. All advertising shall include resources for responsible gaming
45 information.

46 b. No advertising may intentionally target specific groups or economic
47 classes.

48 c. No advertising may be misleading, deceptive, or present any lottery
49 game as a means of relieving any person's financial or personal
50 difficulties.

- 1 d. No advertising may have the primary purpose of inducing persons to
2 participate in any gaming.
- 3 (3) To conduct a background investigation, including a criminal history record
4 check, of applicants for the Director of the Commission, which may include a
5 search of the State and National Repositories of Criminal Histories based on
6 the fingerprints of applicants.
- 7 (4) To charge a fee, not to exceed the cost of the criminal record check, of the
8 licensees and contractors.
- 9 (5) To specify the authority, compensation, and role of the Director, and to specify
10 the authority, selection, and role of the other employees of the Commission,
11 in accordance with Article 3 of this Chapter.
- 12 (6) To approve and authorize the Director to enter into agreements with other
13 states to operate and promote multistate gaming operations consistent with the
14 purposes set forth in this Chapter.
- 15 (7) To specify the number and value of prizes for winning tickets or shares in
16 lottery games, including cash prizes, merchandise prizes, prizes consisting of
17 deferred payments or annuities, and prizes of tickets or shares in the same
18 lottery game or other lottery games.
- 19 (8) To adopt rules necessary to carry out the provisions of this Chapter in
20 accordance with Chapter 150B of the General Statutes.
- 21 (9) Any other powers necessary for the Commission to carry out its
22 responsibilities under this Chapter.
- 23 (10) To study the feasibility of authorizing new gaming activities that the
24 Commission deems appropriate.
- 25 (b) Article 15 of Chapter 143B of the General Statutes shall not apply to the Commission.
- 26 (c) The Commission shall have no authority to regulate or oversee any gaming conducted
27 pursuant to a compact entered into between the State and a federally recognized Indian tribe.
- 28 "**§ 18E-118.** Reserved.
- 29 "**§ 18E-119. Reports.**
- 30 The Commission shall send quarterly and annual reports on the operations of the Commission
31 to the Governor, the State Treasurer, and the General Assembly. The reports shall include
32 complete statements of revenues, prize disbursements, expenses, net revenues, and all other
33 financial transactions involving funds collected or disbursed under this Chapter, including the
34 occurrence of any audit.
- 35 "**§ 18E-120.** Reserved.
- 36 "**§ 18E-121. Audits.**
- 37 (a) The State Auditor shall conduct annual audits of all accounts and transactions of the
38 Commission and any other special postaudits the State Auditor considers to be necessary.
- 39 (b) Biennially, at the beginning of the calendar year, the Commission shall engage an
40 independent firm experienced in security procedures, including computer security and systems
41 security, to conduct a comprehensive study and evaluation of all aspects of security in the
42 operation of the Commission. At a minimum, such a security assessment should include a review
43 of network vulnerability, application vulnerability, application code review, wireless security,
44 security policy and processes, security/privacy program management, technology infrastructure
45 and security controls, security organization and governance, and operational effectiveness.
- 46 (c) The portion of the security audit report containing the overall evaluation of the
47 Commission and of lottery games in terms of each aspect of security shall be presented to the
48 Commission, to the Governor, and to the General Assembly.
- 49 (d) The portion of the security audit report containing specific recommendations shall be
50 confidential, shall be presented only to the Director and to the Commission, and shall be exempt
51 from Chapter 132 of the General Statutes. The Commission may hear the report of such an audit,

1 discuss, and take action on any recommendations to address that audit under
2 G.S. 143-318.11(a)(1).

3 (e) Biennially, at the end of the fiscal year, in addition to the audits required by this
4 section, the Commission shall engage an independent auditing firm that has experience in
5 evaluating the operation of lotteries to perform an audit of the lottery as operated under
6 Subchapter II of this Chapter. The results shall be presented to the Commission, to the Governor,
7 and to the General Assembly.

8 (f) In addition to the other audits required by this section, the Commission may engage
9 an independent auditing firm that has experience in evaluating the operation of various gaming
10 activities to perform an audit of various games under this Chapter.

11 "§§ 18E-122 through 18E-124. Reserved.

12 "§ 18E-125. Enforcement.

13 (a) The Commission may apply to the superior court for an injunction to restrain any
14 person from violating the provisions of this Chapter or its rules. Actions under this section may
15 be brought in Wake County or the county where the licensee maintains its principal place of
16 business or the county where the alleged acts occurred.

17 (b) Whenever the Commission has reasonable cause to believe that a violation of any of
18 the provisions of this Chapter may have occurred, the Commission may, upon its own motion or
19 upon complaint of any person, investigate to determine whether a violation has occurred.

20 (c) At any time during normal business hours, the Commission or the Department of
21 Public Safety, Alcohol Law Enforcement Branch, may inspect an establishment of a licensee.
22 The inspection may include the examination of records, equipment, and proceeds related to the
23 operation.

24 "Article 2.

25 "North Carolina Gaming Commission Employees.

26 "§ 18E-201. Selection of the Director; powers and duties.

27 (a) The Commission shall select a Director to operate and administer the functions of the
28 Commission and to serve as the Secretary of the Commission. Except as to the provisions of
29 Article 6 and Article 7 of Chapter 126 of the General Statutes, the Director shall be exempt from
30 the North Carolina Human Resources Act.

31 (b) The Director shall have the following powers and duties, under the supervision of the
32 Commission:

33 (1) To provide for the reporting of payment of prizes to State and federal tax
34 authorities and for the withholding of State and federal income taxes from
35 lottery game prizes as provided in State and federal law.

36 (2) To conduct a background investigation, including a criminal history record
37 check, of applicants for employment with the Commission, licensees, and
38 contractors, which may include a search of the State and National Repositories
39 of Criminal Histories based on the fingerprints of applicants.

40 (3) To set the salaries of all Commission employees, subject to the approval of
41 the Commission. Except for the provisions of Article 6 and Article 7 of
42 Chapter 126 of the General Statutes, all employees of the Commission shall
43 be exempt from the North Carolina Human Resources Act.

44 (4) To enter into contracts upon approval by the Commission.

45 (5) To provide for the security and accuracy in the operation and administration
46 of the Commission, including examining the background of all prospective
47 employees, licensees, and contractors.

48 (6) To coordinate and collaborate with the appropriate law enforcement
49 authorities regarding investigations of violations of the laws relating to the
50 functions of the Commission and make reports to the Commission regarding
51 those investigations.

- 1 (7) To confer with the Commission on the operation and administration of the
2 lottery under Subchapter II of this Chapter and make available for inspection
3 by the Commission all books, records, files, documents, and other information
4 of the lottery.
- 5 (8) To enter into agreements with other states to operate and promote multistate
6 lotteries consistent with the purposes set forth in Subchapter II of this Chapter
7 and upon the approval of the Commission.
- 8 (9) To study the functions of the Commission, and gaming, and to collect
9 demographic and other information concerning those matters and make
10 recommendations to improve operations and administration to the
11 Commission, to the Governor, and to the General Assembly.
- 12 (10) To provide monthly financial reports to the Commission.

13 **"§ 18E-202.** Reserved.

14 **"§ 18E-203. Employees of the Commission.**

15 All of the following apply to the Director and all other employees of the Commission:

- 16 (1) No employee of the Commission may have a financial interest in any licensee
17 or contractor, other than an interest as part of a mutual fund.
- 18 (2) No employee of the Commission with decision-making authority shall
19 participate in any decision involving the licensee or contractor with whom the
20 employee has a financial interest.
- 21 (3) No employee of the Commission who leaves the employment of the
22 Commission may represent any licensee or contractor before the Commission
23 for a period of one year following termination of employment with the
24 Commission.
- 25 (4) No employee of the Commission who leaves the employment of the
26 Commission may represent any lottery contractor, potential contractor, or
27 retailer, as defined in Subchapter II of this Chapter, before the Commission
28 for a period of one year following termination of employment with the
29 Commission.
- 30 (5) A background investigation shall be conducted on each applicant for
31 employment with the Commission.
- 32 (6) The Commission shall bond all employees with access to Commission funds
33 or revenue or security.

34 **"§ 18E-204.** Reserved.

35 **"§ 18E-205. Gifts.**

36 (a) No Commissioner, the Director, any employee of the Commission, or a member of
37 the immediate family residing in the same household as any of these individuals may accept any
38 economic opportunity, gift, loan, gratuity, special discount, favor, hospitality, or service,
39 excluding food and beverages having an aggregate value not exceeding one hundred dollars
40 (\$100.00) in any calendar year from any person regulated by this Chapter.

41 (b) This section shall be supplemental to Subchapter II of Chapter 163A of the General
42 Statutes."

51 **SECTION 4.** G.S. 18B-500 reads as rewritten:

1 **"§ 18B-500. Alcohol law-enforcement agents.**

2 ...

3 (b) Subject Matter Jurisdiction. – After taking the oath prescribed for a peace officer, an
4 alcohol law-enforcement agent shall have authority to arrest and take other investigatory and
5 enforcement actions for any criminal offense. ~~The primary responsibility of an agent shall be~~
6 ~~enforcement of the ABC and lottery laws and G.S. 14-313 regarding youth access to tobacco~~
7 ~~products offense:~~

8 (1) Occurring, encountered, or otherwise discovered on the premises of, or
9 elsewhere when such conduct relates to a location under application for, or
10 holding a permit issued by, the North Carolina Alcoholic Beverage Control
11 Commission or the North Carolina Gaming Commission.

12 (2) Encountered or otherwise discovered while investigating or enforcing matters
13 for the North Carolina Alcoholic Beverage Control Commission or the North
14 Carolina Gaming Commission or encountered or otherwise discovered while
15 investigating or enforcing the provisions of this Chapter, Chapter 18E of the
16 General Statutes, G.S. 14-313, or Parts 1 and 2 of Article 37 of Chapter 14 of
17 the General Statutes.

18 (3) Encountered or otherwise discovered while carrying out any duty or function
19 assigned to the Division by law.

20 (4) Occurring in an agent's presence.

21 (5) When assisting another law enforcement agency.

22 (b1) Authority. – Alcohol law-enforcement agents have full power and authority as peace
23 officers to execute criminal process, and respond to and take enforcement action for any crime
24 of violence or breach of the peace, and any additional duties as may from time to time be directed
25 by the Governor or the Secretary of the Department of Public Safety when needed for security
26 purposes at a public event, or to protect persons or property because of a disaster or state of
27 emergency.

28 (b2) Primary Responsibilities. – The primary responsibilities of an alcohol
29 law-enforcement agent are the enforcement of this Chapter, Chapter 18E of the General Statutes,
30 G.S. 14-313, and Parts 1 and 2 of Article 37 of Chapter 14 of the General Statutes.

31"

32 **SECTION 5.(a)** The North Carolina Gaming Commission shall study the feasibility
33 of authorizing sports betting and steeplechases for operation in this State. As part of its study, the
34 North Carolina Gaming Commission shall address all of the following:

35 (1) Examine any restrictions on such activities in this State.

36 (2) Examine the effects of authorizing such activities on existing tribal games in
37 this State, if any.

38 (3) Investigate the positive and negative impacts of authorizing such activities in
39 this State, including whether any additional resources may be needed for
40 assistance to those with gambling addictions.

41 (4) Examination of potential revenues and expenditures for the State, if such
42 activities are authorized.

43 (5) Recommendations of types of regulation of such activities, including any to
44 protect players.

45 (6) Examine whether gambling losses should be eligible for deduction on State
46 income tax filings.

47 (7) Any other matters the North Carolina Gaming Commission deems relevant.

48 **SECTION 5.(b)** The North Carolina Gaming Commission shall report its findings,
49 together with any proposed legislation, to the Joint Legislative Oversight Committee on the State
50 Lottery on or before February 15, 2020.

1 **SECTION 6.** Except as otherwise specifically provided in this act, each enumerated
2 commission, board, or other function of State government transferred to the North Carolina
3 Gaming Commission, as created in this act, is a continuation of the former entity for purposes of
4 succession to all the rights, powers, duties, and obligations of the former. Where the former
5 entities are referred to by law, contract, or other document in their former name, the North
6 Carolina Gaming Commission, as created in this act, is charged with exercising the functions of
7 the former named entity.

8 **SECTION 7.** No action or proceeding pending on August 31, 2019, brought by or
9 against the North Carolina Lottery Commission, the State Bureau of Investigation, the Alcohol
10 Law Enforcement Branch of the Department of Public Safety, or the Boxing Advisory
11 Commission shall be affected by any provision of this act, but the same may be prosecuted or
12 defended in the name of the North Carolina Gaming Commission, as created in this act. In these
13 actions and proceedings, the North Carolina Gaming Commission or its Executive Director, as
14 appropriate, shall be substituted as a party upon proper application to the courts or other
15 administrative or quasi-judicial bodies.

16 Any business or other matter undertaken or commanded by any State program or
17 office or contract transferred by this act to the North Carolina Gaming Commission pertaining to
18 or connected with the functions, powers, obligations, and duties set forth herein, which is pending
19 on August 31, 2019, may be conducted and completed by the North Carolina Gaming
20 Commission in the same manner and under the same terms and conditions and with the same
21 effect as if conducted and completed by the original program, office, or commissioners or
22 directors thereof.

23 **SECTION 8.** The consolidation provided for under this act shall not affect any
24 ongoing investigation or audit. Prosecutions for offenses or violations committed before August
25 31, 2019, are not abated or affected by this act, and the statutes that would be applicable but for
26 this act remain applicable to those prosecutions.

27 **SECTION 9.** Rules, forms, policies, procedures, and guidance adopted by the North
28 Carolina Lottery Commission, the State Bureau of Investigation, the Alcohol Law Enforcement
29 Branch of the Department of Public Safety, or the Boxing Advisory Commission shall remain in
30 effect until amended or repealed by the North Carolina Gaming Commission.

31 **SECTION 10.** The authority, powers, duties and functions, records, personnel,
32 property, and unexpended balances of appropriations, allocations, or other funds, including the
33 functions of budgeting and purchasing, of the North Carolina Lottery Commission are transferred
34 to the North Carolina Gaming Commission, as created in this act. The authority, powers, duties
35 and functions, records, personnel, property, and unexpended balances of appropriations,
36 allocations, or other funds, including the functions of budgeting and purchasing, of the bingo and
37 raffle functions of the State Bureau of Investigation are transferred to the North Carolina Gaming
38 Commission, as created in this act. The authority, powers, duties and functions, records,
39 personnel, property, and unexpended balances of appropriations, allocations, or other funds,
40 including the functions of budgeting and purchasing, of the boxing regulatory functions of the
41 Alcohol Law Enforcement Branch of the Department of Public Safety and the Boxing Advisory
42 Commission are transferred to the North Carolina Gaming Commission, as created in this act.
43 The Director of the Budget shall resolve any disputes arising out of this transfer.

44 **SECTION 11.** The appropriations and resources of the North Carolina Lottery
45 Commission, including any office space, are transferred to the North Carolina Gaming
46 Commission, and the transfer shall have all the elements of a Type I transfer under G.S. 143A-6.

47 **SECTION 12.** The members of the North Carolina Lottery Commission, as
48 appointed pursuant to G.S. 18C-111, shall operate as the North Carolina Gaming Commission
49 until the expiration of those terms of office under G.S. 18C-111 and Governor and the General
50 Assembly appoint, as each term expires, the membership of the North Carolina Gaming
51 Commission as provided in this act.

1 **SECTION 13.** The appropriations and resources of the bingo and raffle functions of
2 the State Bureau of Investigation are transferred to the North Carolina Gaming Commission, and
3 the transfer shall have all the elements of a Type I transfer under G.S. 143A-6.

4 **SECTION 14.** The appropriations and resources of the boxing regulatory functions
5 of the Alcohol Law Enforcement Branch of the Department of Public Safety and the Boxing
6 Advisory Commission are transferred to the North Carolina Gaming Commission, and the
7 transfers shall have all the elements of a Type I transfer under G.S. 143A-6. Notwithstanding the
8 Type I transfer, the following three receipt-supported positions within the Alcohol Law
9 Enforcement Division of the Department of Public Safety may be converted to General Fund
10 support within funds available to the Division: Administrative Specialist (Position 60084337),
11 Special Agent (Position 60084392), and Special Agent in Charge (Position 60084305). The
12 following positions within the Alcohol Law Enforcement Division of the Department of Public
13 Safety are transferred to the North Carolina Gaming Commission: Administrative Specialist II
14 (Position 60084319), Administrative Specialist (Position 60084390), and Administrative
15 Specialist (Position 65024367).

16 **SECTION 15.** The North Carolina Gaming Commission shall report to the Joint
17 Legislative Commission on Governmental Operations and the Joint Legislative Lottery
18 Oversight Committee on or before April 1, 2020, and again on or before March 1, 2021, as to
19 recommendations for statutory changes necessary to further implement this consolidation.

20 **SECTION 16.** This act becomes effective September 1, 2019.
