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1 **SECTION 1.(g)** There is appropriated from the General Fund to the Department of 2 Public Instruction for the 2020-2021 fiscal year the sum of fifty-five thousand dollars (\$55,000) 3 in nonrecurring funds to provide the bonuses authorized by this section.

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#### 5 PART II. FLEXIBILITY FOR SCHOOL EMPLOYEES TO RECEIVE ANNUAL 6 SALARY IN TWELVE MONTHLY INSTALLMENTS 7

SECTION 2.(a) G.S. 115C-302.1(b) reads as rewritten:

8 Salary Payments. - State-allotted teachers shall be paid for a term of 10 months. "(b) 9 Except for career and technical education agriculture teacher personnel positions as provided for 10 in this subsection, State-allotted months of employment for career and technical education to 11 local boards shall be used for the employment of teachers of career and technical education for a 12 term of employment to be determined by the local boards of education. Beginning with the 13 2018-2019 school year, career and technical education agriculture teacher personnel positions 14 serving students in grades nine through 12 shall be for a term of employment for 12 calendar 15 months. A local board of education may fund these positions using any combination of State 16 funds, local funds, or any other funds available to the local board.

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18 Any individual teacher who is not employed in a year-round school may be paid in 12 19 monthly installments if the teacher so requests on or before the first day of the school year. 20 requests. The request shall be filed in the local school administrative unit which employs the 21 teacher. The payment of the annual salary in 12 installments instead of 10 shall not increase or 22 decrease the teacher's annual salary nor in any other way alter the contract made between the 23 teacher and the local school administrative unit. Teachers employed for a period of less than 10 24 months shall not receive their salaries in 12 installments. ...."

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### **SECTION 2.(b)** G.S. 115C-316(a)(2) reads as rewritten:

26 27 School Employees Paid on an Hourly or Other Basis. - Salary payments to "(2) 28 employees other than those covered in G.S. 115C-272(b)(1), 115C-285(a)(1) 29 and (2), 115C-302.1(b) and 115C-316(a)(1) shall be made at a time 30 determined by each local board of education. Expenditures for the salary of 31 these employees from State funds shall be within allocations made by the State 32 Board of Education and in accordance with rules and regulations approved by 33 the State Board of Education concerning allocations of State funds: Provided, 34 that school employees employed for a term of 10 calendar months in 35 year-round schools shall be paid in 12 equal installments: Provided further, 36 that any individual school employee employed for a term of 10 calendar 37 months who is not employed in a year-round school may be paid in 12 monthly 38 installments if the employee so requests on or before the first day of the school 39 year. requests. Such request shall be filed in the administrative unit which 40 employs the employee. The payment of the annual salary in 12 installments 41 instead of 10 shall not increase or decrease said annual salary nor in any other 42 way alter the contract between the employee and the said administrative unit. 43 Employees may be prepaid on the set pay date for days not yet worked. An 44 employee who fails to attend scheduled workdays or who has not worked the 45 number of days for which the employee has been paid and who resigns or is 46 dismissed shall repay to the local board any salary payments received for days 47 not yet worked. An employee who has been prepaid and who continues to be 48 employed by a local board but fails to attend scheduled workdays may be 49 subject to dismissal or other appropriate discipline. The daily rate of pay shall 50 equal the number of weekdays in the pay period. Included within the term of 51 employment shall be provided for full-time employees annual vacation leave

On a day that employees are required to report for a workday but pupils are not required to attend school due to inclement weather, an employee may elect not to report due to hazardous travel conditions and to take one of his annual vacation days or to make up the day at a time agreed upon by the employee and his immediate supervisor or principal. 21 (c) Selection of CTE Grade Expansion Grant Recipients. – For the 2017-2018 fiscal year, the Commission shall accept applications for a grant until November 30, 2017. For subsequent 22 23 fiscal years that funds are made available for the Program, CTE grade expansion grants, the 24 Commission shall accept applications for a grant until August 1 of each year. The Commission 25 shall consult with the North Carolina Career and Technical Education Foundation, Inc., to select 26 recipients in a manner that considers diversity among the pool of applicants, including geographic 27 location, location of industries in the area in which a local school administrative unit is located, 28 and the size of the student population served by the unit, in order to award funds to the extent 29 possible to grant recipients that represent different regions and characteristics of the State. The 30 Commission shall recommend recipients of the grants to the State Board of Education. The State 31 Board, upon consultation with the Superintendent of Public Instruction, shall approve the 32 recipients of grant awards.

33 Allocation of Funds. – Of the funds available for the Program in each fiscal year, the (d) 34 Commission shall first allocate funds to applicants who received CTE grade expansion grant 35 funds for the prior fiscal year for up to seven years. After funds are allocated to prior fiscal year 36 grant recipients, any remaining funds may be used by the Commission to select new grant 37 recipients. recipients as provided in G.S. 115C-64.16(a1).
