A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

AN ACT TO MAKE VARIOUS CHANGES TO EDUCATION LAWS.

3 The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:

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5 PART I. FLEXIBILITY FOR SCHOOL EMPLOYEES TO RECEIVE ANNUAL 6 **SALARY IN 12 MONTHLY INSTALLMENTS** 7

SECTION 1.(a) G.S. 115C-302.1(b) reads as rewritten:

8 Salary Payments. - State-allotted teachers shall be paid for a term of 10 months. "(b) 9 Except for career and technical education agriculture teacher personnel positions as provided for in this subsection, State-allotted months of employment for career and technical education to 10 11 local boards shall be used for the employment of teachers of career and technical education for a term of employment to be determined by the local boards of education. Beginning with the 12 2018-2019 school year, career and technical education agriculture teacher personnel positions 13 serving students in grades nine through 12 shall be for a term of employment for 12 calendar 14 15 months. A local board of education may fund these positions using any combination of State 16 funds, local funds, or any other funds available to the local board.

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18 Any individual teacher who is not employed in a year-round school may be paid in 12 monthly installments if the teacher so requests on or before the first day of the school year. 19 20 requests. The request shall be filed in the local school administrative unit which employs the 21 teacher. The payment of the annual salary in 12 installments instead of 10 shall not increase or 22 decrease the teacher's annual salary nor in any other way alter the contract made between the 23 teacher and the local school administrative unit. Teachers employed for a period of less than 10 24 months shall not receive their salaries in 12 installments.Local school administrative units may 25 fulfill this requirement through a payroll deduction plan.

Notwithstanding this subsection, the term "daily rate of pay" for the purpose of 26 G.S. 115C-12(8) or for any other law or policy governing pay or benefits based on the teacher 27 salary schedule shall not exceed one twenty-second of a teacher's monthly rate of pay." 28

SECTION 2.(b) Section 2.3(b) of S.L. 2020-80 reads as rewritten: 1 2 "SECTION 2.3.(b) For the 2020-2021 fiscal year, the Department of Public Instruction shall 3 transfer the sum of three million nine hundred thousand dollars (\$3,900,000) in nonrecurring 4 funds from the cash balance in the School Bus Replacement Fund (Budget Code: 73510; Fund 5 Code: 7200) to the State Public School Fund (Budget Code: 13510; Fund Code: 1830). Funds transferred pursuant to this section are hereby appropriated to provide school lunches at no cost 6 7 to students of all grade levels qualifying for reduced-price meals in all schools participating in 8 the National School Lunch Program in the 2020-2021 school year and 2021-2022 school year. 9 These funds shall not revert at the end of the 2020-2021 fiscal year, but shall remain available until the end of the 2021-2022 fiscal year. School food services. 20 School food nutrition services shall be included in the budget of each local school (a) 21 administrative unit public school unit that provides school nutrition services, and the State Board 22 of Education shall provide for school food-nutrition services in the uniform budget format 23 required by G.S. 115C-426. 24 (b) No local school administrative unit-public school unit that provides school nutrition 25 services shall assess indirect costs to a child school nutrition program unless the program has a 26 minimum of one month's an operating balance. One month's operating balance shall be derived 27 from net cash resources divided by one month's operating costs. An 33 average month's operating balance shall be calculated and published by the Department of Public 34 Instruction for each child nutrition program and shall be equal to the average of the three prior 35 fiscal years' monthly operating balances. balance of at least three months. The Department of 36 Public Instruction shall calculate the operating balance of a school nutrition program of a public 37 school unit that provides school nutrition services. If complete and final financial reports for a 38 given year are not yet available for a child school nutrition program, the Department of Public 39 Instruction may use projected figures figures, but shall update the published average month's 40 operating balance once complete and final financial reports become available. As used in this subsection, the term "indirect costs" is as defined in the United States Office of Budget and 41 42 Management Circular A-87, as revised, and the term "net cash resources" is as defined in 7 C.F.R. 43 <u>§ 210.2.</u>2 C.F.R. § 200.414. 44 No public school unit that provides school nutrition services shall assess indirect costs (c) that are more than eight percent (8%) of a school nutrition program's annual budget per fiscal 45 46 year." 47 **SECTION 3.(b)** This section becomes effective July 1, 2021. 48 49 PART IV. 2	from the General Fund for the 2021-2022 fiscal year for the North Carolina Education and
3	Workforce Innovation Commission for the Education and Workforce Innovation Program and

5	2021-2022 fiscal year, the sum of three million one hundred seventy-one thousand one hundred
6	eighteen dollars (\$3,171,118) in recurring funds shall instead be appropriated to the Department
7	of Public Instruction for the North Carolina Education and Workforce Innovation Commission
8	for the Education and Workforce Innovation and CTE Grade Expansion Program, established

12	PART IX. STATE BOARD OF EDUCATION REQUIRED TO USE RULEMAKING TO
13	ADOPT STANDARDS
14	SECTION 9.(a) G.S. 115C-12 reads as rewritten:
15	"§ 115C-12. Powers and duties of the Board generally.
16	The general supervision and administration of the free public school system shall be vested
17	in the State Board of Education. The State Board of Education shall establish all needed rules
18	and regulations for the system of free public schools, subject to laws enacted by the General
19	Assembly. Except as otherwise provided by law, the State Board of Education shall adopt any
20	rules, regulations, policies, standards, or statements of general applicability in accordance with
21	Chapter 150B of the General Statutes. Any such rules, regulations, policies, standards, or
22	statements of general applicability are not valid unless they are adopted in substantial compliance
23	with Chapter 150B of the General Statutes. In accordance with Sections 7 and 8 of Article III of
24	the North Carolina Constitution, the Superintendent of Public Instruction, as an elected officer
25	and Council of State member, shall administer all needed rules and regulations adopted by the
26	State Board of Education through the Department of Public Instruction. The powers and duties
27	of the State Board of Education are defined as follows:
28	"
29	SECTION 9.(b) Notwithstanding G.S. 150B-21.2, the current standards that make
30	up the standard course of study adopted pursuant to G.S. 115C-12(9c) and Part 1 of Article 8 of
31	Chapter 115C of the General Statutes, which are subject to rulemaking as provided in Chapter
32	150B of the General Statutes, shall be deemed permanent rules so long as they meet the following
33	criteria:
34	(1) The standards were adopted by the State Board of Education prior to January
35	1, 2021.
36	(2) The State Board of Education submits the standards to the Codifier of Rules
37	in accordance with the formatting requirements in 26 NCAC 02C no later than
38	60 days after this section becomes effective.
39	Permanent rules submitted in accordance with this subsection shall be effective on
40	the date they are submitted to the Codifier of Rules.
41	SECTION 9.(c) Any standards that make up the standard course of study that do not
42	meet the criteria of subsection (b) of this section shall not be deemed permanent rules and shall
43	be subject to the provisions of Chapter 150B of the General Statutes. The standard course of
44	study shall continue to be revised on the time line provided in the comprehensive plan developed
45	by the State Board of Education under G.S. 115C-12(9c) and in accordance with the rulemaking
46	process under Chapter 150B of the General Statutes.
47	SECTION 9.(d) When the Codifier of Rules enters the permanent rules submitted
48	pursuant to subsection (b) of this section into the North Carolina Administrative Code, the
49	Codifier shall publish notice of the permanent rules on the internet.

50 **SECTION 9.(e)** Section 3(b) of S.L. 2019-82 reads as rewritten:

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1	"SECTION 3.(b) The requirements of G.S. 115C-81.45(d), as amended by subsection (a)
2	of this section, shall apply to all students entering the ninth grade in the 2021-2022-2022-2023
